Dear Mr. Chairman and Council members:

This letter transmits a collection of documents that demonstrate (1) Alaskan individuals oppose the IFQ program for the charter halibut fishery; (2) all the people evaluating the proposed program as a public policy issue (the legislature, the governor, the Board of Fisheries) agree that such a program would be BAD public policy.

Enclosed are:

1. **Petitions.** These petitions were made available to people attending the Great Alaska Sportsman Show, April 5-8, 2001. These petitions include the names and signatures of 805 people, who are opposed to the Charter Boat IFQs for halibut. Of those people, 179 also said they were willing to testify against the IFQ program at the Council meeting this week.
2. **Letter to Council from individuals.** Twenty people who talked with us at the Great Alaska Sportsman Show felt so strongly opposed to IFQs that they asked to sign individual letters to the Council.
3. **Letters to the Editor/Articles in the Anchorage Daily News.** Several people who have learned about the proposed program have written letters to the editor, and the Anchorage Daily News has attempted to analyze the issues in a few articles.
4. **Letter to the Council from Alaska Board of Fisheries.** The Alaska Board of Fisheries opposes the charter IFQ program. It has concluded that the adoption of IFQs would not be in the public interest. The Board of Fisheries sees no compelling need to give a public

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resource to a private group of individuals at this time, particularly in the light of the Council/Board Joint Protocol on LAMPs. Also, the Chairman of the Board of Fisheries believes that adoption of the proposed IFQ plan would breach the terms and conditions of the Joint Protocol on LAMPs.

5. **Letter to the Council from Alaska State Legislature.** Four members of the Alaska Legislature, including the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House, oppose the proposed IFQ program for the halibut charter industry. They conclude that the program under consideration would adversely affect charter anglers, other fisheries, smaller coastal communities and tourism.

6. **Position paper from Governor Knowles' office.** Governor Knowles and the State of Alaska executive branch agencies oppose the proposed IFQ program for the halibut charter industry

RFA agrees that there is no justifiable rationale to impose an IFQ management scheme on the halibut charter fishery in Alaska. RFA joins all the parties whose comments are transmitted with this letter, in opposition to this program.

I oppose the imposition of an IFQ program on the Alaska halibut charter industry. I am concerned about potential impacts on anglers, on communities, on tourism. Halibut is "Alaska's favorite fish." There is no justifiable rationale to impose an IFQ management scheme on the halibut charter fishery in Alaska.

An IFQ management scheme for charter fishing will give the public's fish to a few charter boat operators and hurt the sport fishermen, Alaska communities and tourism. Privatization of this public resource will lead to higher cost for the sport angler, who may be charged for the fish he or she catches. Also, it will result in less opportunity to fish for halibut AT ANY PRICE. Furthermore, under an IFQ program, some charter operators may go after only big fish. Some may go after only small ones. Reducing the number of halibut harvested on their boat, if the halibut allocation is a constraint, is a logical way for a charter operator to reduce costs. Anglers from out of state are likely to find no one with a private boat to take them fishing.

An IFQ program would transfer the ownership of the sport-caught fish from the angler to the charter operator, giving them an ownership right in a public resource. A quota system could cause other substantial and largely unpredictable changes as quota owners search for ways to maximize the profits associated with quota rights. There could be mass exodus from the charter industry, if charter operators can sell or lease quota share or IFQs to commercial fishermen.

The Charter IFQ program is not justifiable, regardless of the momentum behind it. I thank you for working to preserve fishing opportunities for future generations of anglers (both those who live here and those tourists who come, in part, to fish here).

There are better ways to control overfishing near population centers. Let the state Board of Fish do its job, through Local Area Management Plans.

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

Halibut quota is one fishy idea

If the Alaska Halibut Charter Individual Fishing Quota plan passes, think of the possibilities.

The measure would allow operators to catch only a certain amount of halibut each year, and in turn, it would encourage charter captains to take clients to "chicken patches," the term for areas where smaller halibut are found. Smaller daily catches would enable operators to take out more clients at \$150 a pop throughout the year before reaching their quotas.

A charter captain might decide that any fish over a certain size, say 35 pounds, will be charged for by the pound in order for a fisher to keep it, or instead the fish must be released. The reason for this is simple: Big fish tallied against the charter's individual fishing quota, or IFQ, will lessen the number of fishers the charter can take out during a summer.

It seems logical to assume a sport fisher actually is fishing for the captain and catching his halibut on his IFQ -- halibut that he may or may not choose to 1) release if they are too big; 2) retain if they are small enough; or 3) sell back to the fisher. From this perspective, the sport fisher basically becomes a deckhand for the charter.

If IFQs come to pass, a fisher should make sure the rules of the charter are understood before getting on the boat.

A limited number of IFQs will be available, making them a marketable commodity. The winners will be IFQ brokers. Search the Internet for "IFQ broker Alaska" and see how many brokers are listed. There is a lot of money to be made.

Since charter IFQs will be limited in number, a corner on the market could be created. Larger charter companies likely will acquire as many IFQs as possible so that their organizations can flourish. Eventually, charter costs will rise, and fishers still may have to buy back their fish.

Check out the North Pacific Fishery Management Council's Web site. The October newsletter shows the council is considering provisions to allow the transfer of charter IFQs to the commercial sector. If this happens at the rate of 25 percent per year, as stated on the site, it will not take long for charter operators planning to retire to sell IFQs to the commercial industry. Once a charter IFQ goes commercial, it probably will never belong to a charter boat again. Supply and demand will govern charter prices. I can only speculate that the long-term goal of the commercial fishermen who run the council is to have people buy halibut at stores.

Each year, commercial fishers waste more halibut through bycatch, the accidental catching of one species while fishing for another, than the combined catches of sport fishers.

The council may take the IFQ measure to a vote next week. But it has received very little comment from the public. If this does not change, it can only assume the plan has widespread approval.

The council's two advisory bodies will meet beginning Monday, and the council convenes April 11. All meetings are open to the public. Visit the group's Web site at www.fakr.noaa.gov/npfmc <<http://www.fakr.noaa.gov/npfmc>> for the agenda, dates and times.

Opponents should voice their opinions to the council, the governor, the U.S. Secretary of Commerce and whoever else can help preserve one of Alaska's prized public resources. Halibut are a public resource and should not be governed privately by the commercial fishing industry and the council.

Opposition mounts over quota issue **HALIBUT: Fish Board against private shares for charter boats.**

The Alaska Board of Fisheries is opposed to assigning individual fishing quotas to halibut charter boats, Chairman Dan Coffey said Thursday.

"There's a whole host of questions that need to be answered before we take any regulatory action," he said.

The federal panel that regulates offshore fishing in Alaska, the North Pacific Fishery Management Council, is scheduled to vote in mid-April on whether to give catch rights to 1,100 Southeast and Southcentral charter boats.

The individual shares could be bought and sold and could be highly valuable.

Proponents say the plan would settle a long-running quota fight between commercial and charter fleets and would give charter boats a way to grow their businesses by buying additional shares. Commercial fishermen already operate under an individual quota system.

Coffey, in a letter to North Pacific Council chairman David Benton, wrote that the seven-member board sees "no compelling need to give a public resource to a private group of individuals at this time."

Coffey said the board is about to hold a series of public meetings around the state on the idea of local area management plans, or LAMPs, that could offer a better way to manage the competition for halibut. Such planning, already done in Sitka, allows all commercial, recreational and subsistence fishermen to map out a plan to share local halibut stocks, especially those closest to port, where overfishing tends to occur.

If the council goes ahead with the individual quota program, the LAMP meetings would be undermined, Coffey said.

Coffey's letter adds to mounting opposition to the quota plan, which many charter boat operators and commercial fishermen favor as a way to settle an old fish fight.

Other charter operators are opposed, especially those who would stand to receive small or no shares based on their history in the industry.

This month, powerful members of the Legislature, including Senate President Rick Halford, R-Chugiak, and House Speaker Brian Porter, R-Anchorage, came out against the quota plan, saying it could lead to higher charter rates for passengers.

An economist working for the council, however, has suggested that the cost of trips might not increase and could even drop.

All sides are waiting to see where Gov. Tony Knowles stands. Alaska's governor by law names six members of the 11 voting federal council members.

Near-shore halibut fishery sees IFQ as only hope for stability

Mr. Randa implies that the captain can keep the clients' fish caught on the charter boat. Hogwash. How long would I stay in business if I kept my clients' fish? If Mr. Randa had done his homework he would have known that under this IFQ plan it would be illegal for the captain to keep clients' fish.

This may be a case of sour grapes. I would be willing to wager that the majority of Mr. Randa's business takes place on the Kenai and Kasilof rivers. That would mean that his IFQs may be less than hoped for. This does not mean he won't be able to operate exactly as he has in the past. If his business grows he will have the opportunity to purchase more IFQ shares.

Mr. Randa also forgot to mention that he holds one of the coveted upper-Kenai River permits. Less than 20 guides are allowed to guide this portion of the river. Having this permit has stabilized his fishery. So why would he have a problem with trying to help stabilize our fishery?

The IFQ plan is not perfect, but it is the only hope we have of saving our near-shore halibut fishery. If this plan gets shot down, look for more part-time unprofessional guides getting into our fishery, selling cheap trips (two per day) to pull more people here to overharvest the halibut stocks in our near-shore fishery.

Fisheries are public resources and should be managed accordingly

Solutions exist for allocating fish, but it's about allocating money

The halibut IFQ issue is, as Bob Penney stated, one of allocation ("Quota system raises too many questions," March 18). But let's be honest here -- it is about the allocation of dollars, not fish. If there is a biological need to establish a finite number of halibut taken, then the biologists can simply take that number and divide it by the number of sportfishing licenses issued annually. Each sport fisherman would have a tag to punch (much the same as is done with king salmon and caribou). When the anglers reach their annual limit (10, 20, 100 fish?) they would be done halibut fishing for that year, or they could switch to catch and release.

The number of halibut caught would be regulated to protect the biomass, and it would have no effect on charter boats. Most people can only afford one charter trip in a summer at any rate, so the number of paying customers would not decrease.

Even better: make the limits weighted in favor of residents, because locals tend to fish many more days and utilize the meat, whereas tourists tend to fish once or twice during a short stay and would only take few fish in any case.

Daily News: Will customers pay more if charter boats go to an IFQ plan?

Bob Ward: If the council allocates a sufficient amount of fish to the charter boat industry to supply the recreational demand, there is no reason to see an increase in price. If the council does not provide sufficient fish, which in turn causes the charter operator to have to purchase quota, there will be an increase.

Q. Will charter anglers continue to be able to catch and keep up to two halibut?

A. My intent in making the IFQ proposal was to continue the recreational fishing just like it is. Two halibut a day, any size. If the angler wants to release a 20 pounder and keep fishing for a 100 pounder, that's up to the angler. But the council has the choice of issuing quotas as either pounds of fish or numbers of fish. With pounds, I'd be inclined to preserve my quota by taking you only to where there are smaller fish. I don't want that.

A. Is it right that charter boats, in receiving IFQs, are essentially getting a private hold on the people's fish?

Q. I happen to be homesteading the halibut charter boat industry. The history of my business is what is earning me access rights. I've been on the water for 15 years.

A. The council might give some IFQ shares not only to boats, but to 37 rural communities that hope to develop a charter boat industry. Do you agree with that idea?

Q. Hate it. Sending fish to Old Harbor will not send customers to Old Harbor to catch them. History has shown that fishermen in those communities have already sold their commercial rights. Now they see some more fishing rights being established and they want those, too. They figure they would be something else they could sell out.

Q. IFQs could be bought and sold not just among charter captains but between the charter and commercial fleets, correct?

A. We are asking the council for a three-year prohibition on selling charter quota to commercial. One reason is, I feel charter quota will be worth substantially less than commercial quota. A bunch of charter boats could liquidate and then if customer demand went up, the remaining charter boats would have to buy quota back at this inflated rate.

Q. Which might bump up prices for charter customers.

A. Yes.

Q. I know that some charter operators have asked the council to work quickly toward an IFQ plan. Are we rushing into this?

A. The reason it's on a fast track is because the council, other agencies and some of us in the charter industry feel that this allocation battle needs to be put to rest. This does that.

Q. Will the council approve charter IFQs next month?

A. I feel bad for Mr. Penney. He is going to lose his first issue.

Daily News: Will anglers pay more if charter boats receive individual quotas?

Bob Penney: The arithmetic speaks for itself. There will be consolidation in the industry. People will go out of business. If some charter boat captain pays \$48,000 to \$85,000 for new quota share, somebody is going to bear the cost for that capital expense and the interest. If it's not the angler, then who is it?

Q. Is there a risk that charter boat customers might no longer be able to catch and keep two fish a day?

A. And will they not have to pay more for a 50 pounder? Or for a 100 pounder? You're not catching your fish anymore. You're catching that man's quota.

Q. Initially, charter fishermen likely would receive quota shares based on their time and catch record in the business. These shares would be free. Is that OK?

A. If we're going to give away these quotas, can we give them away for seven years or 10 years and then have them revert back to the public? I want to know. If they're sold, is there a way the public can get half of the income?

The bottom line is this is a food fishery for tens of thousands of Alaska residents. We go out in the summer to get meat for the freezer. You better know all the answers before you give rights to a public, natural resource forever to a guy driving a boat.

Q. Should commercial and charter operators be able to trade IFQs?

A. One of my primary concerns is this quota system has never been done in any recreational fishery in our nation's history, much less transfers from sport to commercial. There isn't any person who has a firm idea of how that's going to work. How can we settle on something like that unless we know the consequences?

Q. What about setting aside some quota for rural communities?

A. I have to learn more about it. One of the first questions in my mind is, if we're reserving quota for a community, I wonder why there isn't a fishery there already?

Q. Some charter boat operators at least want a ban on any new boats coming into the trade, if not an IFQ program. How about that?

A. I have a hard time understanding the need. This fishery is not out of control. In fact, the harvest in Cook Inlet has declined. It's not an escalating thing. This is an allocation issue.

Q. You're a well-known political ally of Gov. Tony Knowles, who by law chooses six of the 11 voting members of the federal council. Have you expressed your feelings to him on the charter boat issue?

A. No comment.

Q. Do you feel like you're an underdog on IFQs?

A. I don't know of any group that's supporting this issue other than the Homer charter boat association.

Halibut charters face individual fishing quotas without public input

On Monday, the North Pacific Fisheries Management Council began final action on a federal program to include the halibut charter fisheries into the existing individual fishing quota commercial program. Before them are these questions:

1. Maintain the status quo?
2. Or implement this IFQ system giving this public resource to existing charter operators who operated in past years?

Currently there is no shortage of fish and, since 1994, there has been a declining trend in numbers of charter businesses. But many existing halibut charter operators see this as a way to own a valuable public resource, stifle competition and achieve a higher rate for their services. They are being encouraged by commercial halibut IFQ holders who want the sportfish catch limited.

If the plan is implemented, the public will pay more and have fewer charter businesses to choose from. How can this happen? The council says it has received few negative comments from the public. Who knew? Certainly not our out-of-state visitors. Certainly few Alaskans unless you're a commercial fisherman or halibut charter operator. There is no organized campaign against it. The public cannot vote on it. It could simply pass by the council (dominated by commercial fishermen) and become law.

Don't let them do this. Write a letter to North Pacific Fisheries Management Council, 605 West Fourth Avenue, Suite 306, Anchorage, 99501-2252. It wouldn't hurt to send a copy to Sen. Ted Stevens and the Alaska Department of Fish and Game.

Beware: Individual fishing quotas remove resources from public

On Feb. 6 I attended the joint Board of Fisheries and North Pacific Fishery Management Council meeting. One of the topics discussed was a proposal to create individual fishing quotas for the halibut charter operators. A council member said that this proposal had been in the works for many years and that the council should go ahead with it because they had received very little negative input from the public. It surprised me that the council might assume the lack of input was an indication that this proposal may be in the best interest of the public.

IFQs are a relatively new concept to Alaska fisheries. Most stakeholders in many fisheries in Alaska look to IFQs to reduce competition and increase their financial position within the fishing community. When you convert from open access to an IFQ system, you're removing a public resource and privatizing it. This would remove a great deal of the economic market factors, create consolidation within the charter business, and eliminate opportunity for the general public to participate due to increased costs.

This proposal was generated within the charter operator sector, which has the most to gain from privatizing this resource. The NPFMC's job is to explore other options instead of creating an industry of IFQ brokers.

I would encourage the public to make their wishes known through the many forums available. This IFQ proposal will be put out for public comment before the council takes action at its April meeting in Anchorage.

Occasional angler about to take it in the shorts

Ready for the \$250 halibut charter?

With the North Pacific Fisheries Management Council charging ahead with a plan to stick it to the little guy, these sorts of inflated prices may not be far away.

Once the council gives charter-boat skippers an ownership interest in Alaska halibut stocks something many expect to happen this year there's no telling how high day-fishing charges might rise.

With supplies fixed and demand steadily increasing, there's only one place for prices to go up, up, up. A first-year economics student with a basic understanding of the laws of supply and demand can predict what will happen.

If you've got the bucks to buy your own fishing boat, of course, this doesn't matter. The political appointees to the very political fisheries management council are sharp enough to recognize that any sort of regulation taking on halibut-fishing boat owners would cause a ruckus.

Those people have a vested interest in maintaining their opportunities to fish. They've got thousands of dollars, sometimes hundreds of thousands of dollars, tied up in their boats.

You don't tell wealthy folk you're cutting back on their recreational opportunities without catching an earful. They would make an issue of the fact that the amount of halibut caught, killed and tossed back into the ocean by the commercial fishery as bycatch is greater than the catch in the sport fishery.

They would hammer away at the fact something ought to be done about this before more restrictions are imposed on anglers. They might even argue that a slow, steady transition from commercial to sport fishing for halibut is in the long-term economic interest of the state.

Who wants to get into all that? The council certainly doesn't.

So, seeking to protect commercial fishermen, it went after the easy target.

The charter boat angler.

Who is the charter boat angler?

A secretary, an office worker, a park ranger, a bank clerk, a clerk, a tourist or one of dozens of other occasional anglers. They go fishing once or twice a summer. The rest of the time they give little thought to the sport. Oh, they might think about the next summer and the next charter, but they don't dwell on 'fishtics.' This is understandable. Anglers who fish with charters have no compelling economic incentive to pay attention. Most of them probably don't even know that the council

and charter boat skippers are in collusion to create a system almost guaranteed to boost charter prices by eliminating competition in the marketplace.

Suffice to say, there aren't many charter businesses getting rich. That could change, though. The system the council is hellbent on establishing

will also encourage bigger charter companies to gobble up smaller charters

to survive. Anglers will pay for that in the end, too.

In fairness to charter boat operators, it must be noted that little of this was their idea. This program began with a group of commercial fishermen, halibut longliners in this case, worried about sharing halibut with anyone.

If you saw the movie 'The Perfect Storm,' you saw how longliners tend to think: Fill the boat with fish and head for port. Better to risk death than to think about losing a big payday. They're no different when it comes to fishery allocation. They measure their fish in dollars, and they don't want a bunch of office wonks out their on weekends cutting into the payday. So they found a way to stop it.

Freeze the catch of charter boats, and never mind what might be in the state's best interest. All indications are that the best thing for the Alaska economy would be to let the charter boat business grow slowly and steadily as it has been doing for a decade. All indications are that a halibut caught by an angler who lives here or, better yet, flies here to vacation, pumps a lot more money into the economy than a halibut caught by a commercial fishermen, often from Outside, and then shipped Outside for sale.

A slow, relatively painless shift from one sort of fishing to the other would seem to be good for the Alaska economy, but nobody knows for sure. This is because the Knowles administration, in the pocket of commercial fishing interests on this issue since the get-go, has never pressed the council to consider the economic implications of setting a quota for charter catches.

There is no better time to do that than now.

Charter-boat skippers, it must be noted, never asked for any of this. In fact, they started off opposing restrictions, but the opposition largely disappeared when commercial fishermen began talking about cutting the charter skippers in on what are called IFQs Individual Fishing Quotas.

Think of IFQs as bearer bonds. Each fisherman gets so many. They cash them in the form of halibut carcasses. For longliners, this is easy. So many pounds of halibut equals so many dollars in cash.

For charter boat skippers, however, it's going to be more complicated. Will the council give charters their IFQs in individual fish, which is the way the product is now sold to the charter boat anglers, or in poundage, as is done with the rest of the commercial fleet?

If it's the latter, how long before charters set limits on the size of fish an angler can keep? Suddenly the cost of your charter could not only go from \$150 to \$250 a day, but you could be limited to two fish under 20 or 30 pounds unless you want to pay a "trophy fee" of so much per pound for a bigger fish.

Once the charter boats effectively own their little chunk of the annual halibut catch, they can do what they want with it. Have no doubt, they are not going to set things up so they go broke. It is even possible to envision a scenario in which increasing numbers of Alaska halibut anglers, looking at steadily inflating fees for charters, try to beat the system by investing in small Cook Inlet skiffs. If you think the Deep Creek launch is dangerous now, consider what it could be like if more people start using smaller boats.

That would be the perfectly ironic ending for a public-policy fiasco that began with the creation of IFQs to end a commercial-fishing derby driven by a race to catch as many halibut as possible during short fishery openings. That, everyone agreed, was dangerous. That, everyone agreed, led to needless deaths.

Will a system that encourages anglers to abandon charters in favor of cheaper ways of getting at the fish be safe?

Maybe, in the name of safety, the council should be doing just the opposite of what it proposes. Why not restrict the private boat fleet, where the accident rate is highest, and free the charter boat fleet, where the accident rate is lowest, to catch as much halibut as possible?

Re: Halibut IFQs

Dear Chairman Benton:

The purpose of this letter is to state clearly and unequivocally to the North Pacific Fisheries Management Council, that the Alaska Board of Fisheries, at this time, opposes the concept of IFQs for the halibut charter boat operators. Undoubtedly, you and other council members have heard the all of the arguments against the IFQs, so I won't reiterate them in this letter. However, the Council should be aware that individual Board members have heard the same arguments, have discussed these issues among themselves and with members of the public and, as a result, believe that the adoption of IFQs would not be in the public interest at this time. Frankly, we see no compelling need to give a public resource to a private group of individuals at this time, particularly in the light of the Council/Board Joint Protocol on LAMPs.

As chairman of the Alaska Board of Fisheries and as one of the authors of the Local Area Management Plan Protocol, I believe that if the Council adopts the proposed IFQ plan in April, the Council will breach the terms and conditions of the Joint Protocol on LAMPs. A copy of the Protocol is attached to this letter for your review and consideration. It is clear that the agreed upon approach to LAMPs is absent from the current process of providing for IFQs for the charter boat operators. In part, this occurred because of funding problems for the Board, but those problems are now resolved.

As you may be aware, the Alaska legislature recently made a special appropriation of \$55,000.00 for the Board to continue its work on LAMPs under the Joint Protocol as well as to allow the Board to work on the halibut subsistence issues. At about the same time, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House sent a letter asking that the Board be allowed the time to complete its LAMPs process before the Council takes action on this matter. Thus, both the legislature of the State of Alaska and the Board of Fisheries are asking the Council to honor the Joint Protocol and to proceed with the development of LAMPs.

If the Council approves IFQs for the halibut charter boat operators at its April meeting, it will undermine the Joint Protocol and the public process. Further, such action will bring into serious question the Board's ability to work with the Council on issues of mutual concern. As you are well aware, when there have been issues between the Board and the Council in the past which have created friction between our respective bodies, the Board has always responded to the Council's concerns. The Council should understand that the Board is voicing a very real and substantial concern here. Speaking as the Chairman of the Board, I hope and expect the Council will respond accordingly.

A Board committee, consisting of Ed Dersham, Grant Miller and I, will conduct public meetings in April and early May in Sitka, Cordova, Kodiak and Anchorage. A copy of our schedule is attached for your review. This public process will include a discussion of IFQs along with the numerous other issues which led to the development of the Joint Protocol and the establishment of the LAMPs process. Many Board members have already heard from many private individuals concerning these proposed IFQs. Almost universally, once the concept is explained to the person and once they understand that there are substantial unresolved questions concerning the effect of such action, that person is opposed to the idea of IFQs for the charter boat operators.

After this extensive public process in four (4) cities involving eight (8) days of public testimony, the full Board will meet in Anchorage to develop a report and recommendations for the Council. We will submit our report to the Council for its consideration by June of this year. Further, we hope to complete our work on the LAMPs process this upcoming Board cycle so that a full report, with recommendations, can be forwarded to the Council as per the Protocol for action next year (2002).


As you may also be aware, the Board and the public have already invested substantial time and effort in this process since the adoption of the Joint Protocol. Because of budget constraints last year, the Board was unable to proceed with this project for

one year, but with the recent appropriation, the budget problem is resolved. The work that will take place in the next six (6) weeks will be a substantial culmination of previous work by the Board and the public. As noted above, a full report will be sent to the Council detailing the information and opinions gathered during this up coming process. This series of public hearings should lead to the eventual adoption of local area management plans which meet the needs of the individual communities. For the Council to act on this important an issue before the Board's work is done would not only be in contravention of the Joint Protocol, but would be bad public policy.

We urge you and your fellow Council members to allow the LAMPs process envisioned by the Joint Protocol to proceed, to allow for public comment and to await the outcome the report from the Board before you act to create an IFQ system for charter boat operators.

Thank you for your consideration of this request.

Board/Council Protocol on Local Area Management Plans

In February 1998, the Alaska Board of Fisheries and the North Pacific Fishery Management Council adopted the following protocol to guide the successful development, processing, and implementation of local area fisheries management plans. Though the protocol covers development of local area management plans for all species of interest in a local area, the Council's main purview will be over halibut and those species covered by one of the Council's fishery management plans.

Scope and Content of Proposals

It is the expectation of the Board and Council that any proposals submitted for review will be well thought out and reflect the efforts and a high degree of consensus of representatives of all users of the fish species in the local area covered by the proposed plan. Local commercial, sport, charter and subsistence representatives, and others as appropriate should be involved in the development of proposals, preferably using a local advisory committee or task force approach. When submitting a proposal, users should be identified and their involvement in the process documented. During development, appropriate agency staff (NMFS, ADF&G, Council, Board, IPHC, etc.) should be contacted to provide guidance and legal limitations so that the proposal has a much higher likelihood of not facing difficulties in the review process. Proposals should encompass all shared fish stocks in the local area and should address as appropriate, catch and possession limits, gear types, effort limitation, closed areas, seasons and overall boundaries of the local area plan. Proposers should anticipate that the local plan, if approved, likely will be implemented for no less than three years before there will be another opportunity to revise it. They should also be aware that the schedule below spans over a year from the April deadline for proposals to implementation sometime in the spring or summer of the following year or longer.

Schedule for Proposal Review and Implementation

The following schedule is an example of the procedural steps through which a proposal will go. The schedule of activities after the July mailing of proposals to the ADF&G advisory committees and public will depend on the complexity of the proposal, the scope of the required analysis, availability of data and staff to complete an adequate analysis, and other issues before the Board or Council.

November: Board of Fisheries calls for proposals (each area is on a specific three-year cycle). The Board will identify its interests in the call for proposals, including a paragraph on how halibut fisheries are handled, and other legal requirements. (Alternatively, the call for proposals could be statewide, but still on a three-year cycle.)

April: Deadline for proposals (e.g. April 10, 1998). Staff would screen proposals to evaluate if they meet the Board's call for proposals.

July: In early July, all proposals for a specific area would be grouped together, and along with all other proposals, sent out to the Board's mailing list for comment. ADF&G advisory committees and public would have the opportunity to comment by the prescribed deadline. Their comments would be numbered and made available to the Board for their deliberation. Agency staffs would meet and develop concerns for consideration by the joint Board/Council committee at its July meeting. They would weigh management, enforcement and legal issues and whether the proposal violates any of the provisions of the North Pacific

Halibut Act of 1982, the Magnuson-Stevens Act national standards, or other applicable law.

After July, any local area management plan proposal would go through the following sequence:

1. Agency staffs would work together to develop information needed for the Board to make its decision. This would include economic, biological impact information, as well as legal guidance on the ultimate viability of the proposed course of action. The goal is to have sufficient information available to meet the Board's needs and to allow for timely development of an environmental and regulatory assessment that would meet federal requirements once the halibut portion of the plan is forwarded to Council and NMFS review.
2. Joint Board/Council committee meets to review proposal and supporting information. (Most likely in September)
3. Joint Board/Council committee reports to the Council and the Council develops preliminary comments for November Board meeting. (Most likely at Council's October meeting)
4. At its fall or winter meeting, Board considers proposals, public, agency, and Council comments, and deliberates proposal, possibly using a Board committee to work with interested parties during the meeting to develop a unified plan. If the committee successfully resolves outstanding issues, the Board could take final action. If, however, major issues remain unresolved, the Board has the option of sending the proposed plan out for further public involvement and development, perhaps via a task force or other working group. Final action then would be postponed until rescheduled by the Board.
5. Council would receive the Board's proposal along with available analyses and identification of any legal issues. The Council will then send the proposal out for public review. (Timing of this step would depend on staff availability to perform analysis and other issues on Council's agenda.)
6. Council schedules final action on proposed area plan. Final plan would then be submitted to NMFS for review and approval of the halibut portion.
7. Final local area management plan approved by NMFS and implemented as soon as possible, for a minimum of three years.

(Approved by North Pacific Council on February 4, 1998, and by the Alaska Board of Fisheries on February 8, 1998.)

Thank you for your letter of March 28 expressing the Board's position on the halibut charter IFQ program that the Council will be considering at our upcoming meeting. I appreciate the concerns expressed in your letter, and recall those concerns as the subject of considerable discussion at our Joint Council/Board of Fish meeting this past February. Per the terms of our Protocol Agreement, we discussed this and a host of other issues of mutual interest. Issues and concerns were identified in those discussions, and the Board informed the Council that preliminary results of the LAMP process may be provided to the Council at our June meeting. There was also discussion, from both Board and Council members, reflecting the need for LAMP development whether or not the Council approved an IFQ program. We also agreed that, if the Council approved the analysis for public release following our February meeting, the Board may wish to review that analysis and provide additional comment to the Council prior to our final decision in April.

Your recent letter accomplishes that intent, so I disagree that we would somehow be violating our Protocol Agreement by taking action on this issue in April. Nevertheless, I do believe the Board's position to be an important consideration in the Council's decision. In order to assist our deliberations, and to complete our Administrative Record relative to this issue, could you please provide to us any records, meeting minutes, or other supporting documentation where the Board reviewed our analysis and discussed this issue to arrive at the position indicated in your March 28 letter. I believe that would be very useful to the Council's decision process.

I understand that you will be at the Council meeting, and look forward to further discussions on this important matter at that time.

Dear Chris:

The staff of the International Pacific Halibut Commission has reviewed the EA/RIR for the Halibut Sport Charter IFQ proposal. We commend your staff for their efforts at analyzing this proposal. As with other recent halibut-related issues the Council has addressed, we see the proposal to include the sport charter fishery into the existing IFQ plan as primarily allocative. However, we have examined several components under consideration by the Council and have the following comments and recommendations:

Pounds vs. Numbers – IPHC will continue to manage the resource and conduct its stock assessment in pounds regardless of the Council decision. We would prefer to have the Council work in pounds for coherence with the commercial allocation framework but could accommodate numbers if the Council chooses to issue IFQs in numbers of fish. Should the latter be adopted, we expect that average weight information collected by ADF&G will form the basis of converting between pounds and numbers of fish. The procedure for this is probably best left to a technical group of agency staff to develop. We would be willing to participate in this effort. In the absence of a comprehensive sampling program to determine the average weight of sport-caught halibut, the Commission would probably use the average weight from our commercial fishery sampling.

Reporting – The matter of reporting the IFQ harvest by a sport charter vessel is our biggest concern. We can find no persuasive argument for not holding a charter IFQ holder to the same standard of reporting as a commercial IFQ holder. A key component of the charter IFQ reporting program should be validation. The ADF&G logbook has yet to be assessed for its value as an accurate vehicle for fishery-wide reporting, so it is not an appropriate tool for vessel-specific catch monitoring, at this point. We strongly recommend that the Council look at options that include port monitors or other independent catch monitoring programs.

A particular Commission concern about reporting is the potential for “leakage” of halibut catch from the guided to the unguided sector with implementation of an IQ system, or as the GHL is approached. Since the total unguided catch is unregulated, such a process subverts the intent of the GHL/IQ program. We addressed this in our letter to you last February, wherein we advocated


an overall sport allocation, within which guided and unguided catches and their attendant wastage estimates, would be sub-divided. At issue here is the catch of halibut from lodge or charter operations where the clients may be effectively guided, even though a guide may not be physically aboard the vessel. For example, a 'shepherd' boat with a guide for a series of rental boats, or detailed client instruction at the dock. Each condition should be recognized as guided catch. If the resultant catch is not correctly and appropriately allocated to the guided sector, the catch accounting for the GHL or IQs will be incorrect. This scenario further underscores the need for an independent reporting and monitoring program.

An attendant issue with Reporting is the issue of expenses and/or cost-recovery vehicles to fund the needed data capture and processing programs. We find no discussion of the cost of these programs, which will likely involve ADF&G and NMFS. We are especially concerned, after the experience with enforcement of the commercial IFQ program, that it will be difficult for agencies to fund the necessary monitoring and enforcement of a program after the program has been designed and adopted by the Council.

A final comment is that the problem statement and the depletion problems concerning the sport charter fishery areas that are reported regularly to the Commission and the Council do not appear to be substantially addressed by an IFQ program. Certainly an IFQ program will help to promote economic efficiency and perhaps stabilize the growth of the sport charter fishery for halibut. Excessive vessel effort and resultant localized depletion, frequently cited for many areas, will not be affected by an IFQ solution. Creation of Local Area Management Plans (LAMPs) seems to be a far more effective tool for this type of problem and we would encourage the development of those plans.

PROPOSED CHARTERBOAT MORATORIUM APPROVED

(posted April 3, 2001) - The Gulf Council on Thursday, March 29, 2001 approved the provisions of a proposed 3-year moratorium on issuance of new charter of headboat vessel permits in the recreational for-hire fisheries for reef fish, coastal migratory pelagics (mackerels, cobia, and dolphin if not transferred into a Dolphin/Wahoo FMP), and dolphin/wahoo (if proposed FMP is implemented). The provisions were approved by a vote of 10 to 7, and the entire amendment was approved for submission to the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) by a vote of 11 to 6. NMFS must still approve the amendment before any regulations are implemented. The public will have an opportunity to comment to NMFS on the proposed regulations once they are published, and before any final regulations are approved and implemented. The provisions of the moratorium approved by the Council are as follows:

A. Duration of Moratorium

Establish a 3-year Moratorium on the issuance of charter/headboat (for-hire) vessel permits, unless sooner replaced by a comprehensive limited access system. Effective the date that this Amendment is implemented.

B. Permit and Endorsements

Create a new charter/headboat (for-hire) vessel permit for the Gulf EEZ with endorsements for reef fish, coastal migratory pelagic and dolphin/wahoo (if implemented). A vessel decal for the permitted vessel will be required. All permits and/or endorsements will be permanently numbered (this is so the permits/endorsements can be tracked through history).

C. Eligibility

Provide a fully transferable permit and endorsements to the following:

1. Vessels who obtained or have applied for reef fish and/or coastal pelagic permits prior to 03/29/01.
2. Any person who can demonstrate to NMFS they had a charter/ headboat(for-hire) vessel under construction prior to 03/29/01 with copy of contract and/or receipts for expenditures of at least \$5,000.00.
3. Provide for Historical Captain Permits as follows:
Any U.S. Coast Guard licensed captain, who can demonstrate to NMFS, they were licensed by the USCG and operated, (as a Captain), a for-hire fishery permitted vessel prior to 03/29/01, but did not have a fishery permit issued in their name, and must qualify for the permit within 90 days of enactment and demonstrate at least 25% of their earned income came from recreational for hire fishing in 1 of the last 4 years ending with 3/29/01. They will be issued a letter of eligibility to be replaced by permit/endorsements to be used only on a vessel that they operate as a captain.

D. Permit transfers

All permits/endorsements will be fully transferable with or without the vessel but without any increase in the passenger capacity.

E. Re-issuance of Permits

Permits/endorsements not renewed or permanently revoked will not be re-issued by NMFS.

F. Appeals Process

Individuals or Corporations can appeal to the RA to resolve issues related to the NMFS permit office records that pertain to initial eligibility.

G. Permit and Endorsement Renewal Conditions

1. Renewal will be every two years provided vessel complies with G2.
2. All vessels holding permits and/or endorsements will be included in an active sampling frame and participate in one of the approved fishing data surveys. Surveys include, but are not limited to :
 - A: Charterboat Telephone Survey
 - B: Beaufort Headboat Survey
 - C: Texas Parks & Wildlife Survey
 - D: Subsequently approved appropriate data collection system.

Chairman Benton:

We wish to express our concern with a proposal currently being considered by the North Pacific Fishery Management Council to incorporate the halibut charter industry into the existing commercial halibut IFQ program. The Council is scheduled to take final action on this proposal at its April 2001 meeting. At this time we strongly urge you to oppose this proposal and to ask the Council to oppose this proposal for the following reasons.


1. Alaskan anglers who utilize charters to obtain halibut for their families will be negatively impacted by this proposal. Between 1996 and 1999 Alaskans harvested over 200,000 halibut for their and their family's consumption from charter boats. These anglers don't own a boat and choose to access their common property halibut resource by purchasing a charter. The Council's preliminary analysis predicts reduced options for access, higher prices, and a system that benefits the IFQ holder the most when the recreational angler harvests the least. Also, the right to harvest a fish under an IFQ program would no longer belong to the client; rather it would belong to the captain. We think many Alaskan anglers would find this untenable.
2. We feel there could be significant and undefined impacts on state managed fisheries. By incorporating sport charters into the existing IFQ system, the Council would effectively limit entry into the recreational charter fishery for halibut. The Council does not have the authority, however, to limit participation in charter fisheries for other species. New entrants will have little option but to target state managed species in fresh and salt water. State-managed species that could be affected include chinook, coho, pink, and chum salmon, rockfishes, lingcod, Pacific cod, and sharks. Many of these stocks are either fully allocated or have conservation issues. We believe this sets up the potential for "cause and effect management" between two different management authorities.
3. We feel the potential impact to coastal Alaskan communities has not been adequately assessed and could be significant. Many Alaskan coastal communities have invested significantly in infrastructures to support the charter industry. These communities depend significantly on revenues generated from the provisions of charter services. Indications are that there could be significant shifts in quota shares under an IFQ program, with larger communities benefiting and smaller communities suffering. Insufficient information is currently available to assess the impact to these smaller coastal communities under an IFQ program.
4. We feel that tourism could be negatively impacted by this proposal. The tourism industry is only now being alerted to this issue and has expressed concern over potential impacts. We cannot stress the importance tourism has on the economies of our coastal communities.

5. Last, but perhaps most important, we feel that this decision is being made with little opportunity for public input. Although the Council has been discussing halibut allocation for the past seven years it has only recently (February 2000) discussed the idea of managing the charter fishery under an IFQ program. The IFQ proposal came forward from the industry as a reaction to the Council's adoption of the guideline harvest level (GHL) and has been on the Council fast track ever since. As a past chair of the Council you know that this is substantially less time than the Council takes for most regulatory actions, and far too little time for such a broad first foray into the regulation/privatization of a recreational fishery. We believe this process has moved too far, too fast on scant information and with virtually no public involvement in the process. The Gulf of Mexico Fishery Management Council is considering adopting a moratorium on charter entry. To assure for adequate public comment they have scheduled a series of 10 community meetings in the affected area. No such public comment process has occurred to date on this proposal.

In summary, we strongly urge you to oppose final action on this proposal in April and to ask the Council to oppose this proposal. We also urge you to support the Alaska Board of Fisheries' Local Area Management Planning process. This process involves the public to formulate recommendations on this issue for the Council review. We believe the biological concerns like local area depletion and the socioeconomic concerns like consolidation and opportunity the Council is trying to address are best solved on a more localized basis. The Alaska Board of Fisheries favors this approach and has scheduled meetings for this spring to take testimony and formulate recommendations for the Council's recent action on halibut subsistence. We have provided the necessary funding to assure this occurs.

We also recommend that the state oppose the charter halibut GHL and ask the Secretary to reject it. The GHL issue is under growing scrutiny from the national recreational angler advocacy groups and is sure to come under fire in the secretarial review process. Both the IFQ and GHL represent restrictions on the traditional open access and reasonably regulated fishery.



STATE POSITION ON HALIBUT CHARTER IFQ/MORATORIUM ISSUE

Thursday April 5, 2001

The Alaska Department of Fish and Game recently completed a review of the "Public Review Draft Halibut Charter IFQ or Moratorium Program" issued by Council staff. The State does not support the implementation of an IFQ program for Alaska's halibut charter fishery. The State supports the implementation of the guideline harvest level (GHL) regulations that were adopted by the Council in February 2000.

Under the GHL regulations, the charter fleets in Southeast and Southcentral Alaska receive 125 percent of their average harvest estimates between 1995 and 1999. No restrictions are to be implemented until the charter harvest exceeds these threshold levels. If the GHL is exceeded, harvest restrictions will be implemented the following season, or two seasons later, depending on how much the GHL is exceeded.

Based on harvest and effort trends in the charter fishery during recent years the State believes the regulations within the GHL program may be adequate to address future growth in the harvest of halibut in the charter fishery. However, as an added measure of protection, the State believes the Council should adopt a moratorium to restrict new entrants into the halibut charter fishery. This moratorium would be invoked if the GHL level is reached in either regulatory area 2C or 3A.

The State also supports an expedited and time certain local area management planning (LAMP) process by the Alaska Board of Fisheries to address localized depletion and user group conflicts. The State would encourage the Board to complete this process and report back to the Council by February 2003 or earlier if possible.
