#### I. High Seas Drift Net (HSDN) Enforcement

There was no HSDN enforcement activity conducted over the reporting period. The next HSDN enforcement patrol is scheduled to last 90 days, with a month of supporting flights by USCG HC-130 aircraft and a month of support by a Canadian Air Force aircraft. In addition, a major high endurance cutter, CGC MELLON, will be on patrol in the area for approximately 80 days.

#### II. U.S./Russian Maritime Boundary Line (MBL) Enforcement

Activity along the MBL was light over the reporting period with an average of three fishing vessels operating within 20 miles of the MBL in December 2014 and no activity within 20 miles of the MBL during January through March 2015. There were no surface or air patrols of the MBL for the purpose of incursion detection during December 2014 through March 2015, due to the low levels of fishing vessels operating near the line. However, there were three surface patrols and six air patrols in the vicinity of the MBL in response to the sinking of the South Korean F/V 501 ORYONG and the subsequent search and rescue (SAR) activities. CGC MUNRO patrolled from 03-05 December 2014 and reported a total of 12 sightings of foreign F/Vs (FFVs), all located within the RS EEZ. CGC ALEX HALEY patrolled from 05-07 and 11-13 December 2014 and reported no sightings of FFVs. There was one HC-130 flight per day from 01-06 December 2014 in support of the SAR case, with no incursions detected.

#### III. U.S./Canadian EEZ Boundary (Dixon Entrance) Enforcement

There were three suspected incursions detected by AIS along the southern U.S./Canadian EEZ boundary, west of Dixon Entrance in January 2015. These three suspected incursions were by the F/V OCEAN PEARL (CA) between 06-08 January. A USCG HC-130 was diverted to investigate the F/V OCEAN PEARL, however the vessel was in the Canadian EEZ at the time it was sighted. Notifications were made to the Canadian Department of Fisheries and Oceans (DFO), with a request for their assistance and investigation. DFO agents opened an investigation and met the OCEAN PEARL at their next offload in Port Edward, BC on 14 January. Based on preliminary results of the investigation, DFO directed that 10 percent of the landed value of OCEAN PEARL's catch be seized, to approximate what appears to have been harvested illegally in the U.S. EEZ. The total value of the seizure is still being determined by DFO.


#### IV. Steller Sea Lions (SSL) and Critical Habitat Enforcement

The Coast Guard monitors more than 151 critical habitat areas around the state each month as part of routine cutter and aircraft patrol activity. One violation of SSL critical habitat was detected north of Kodiak Island by CGC SPAR during the reporting period.

#### V. Fishing Vessel Boarding Statistics

There were 180 domestic fisheries and fishing vessel safety boardings conducted by the U.S. Coast Guard during the reporting period. These boardings resulted in a total of 27 safety violations onboard twenty vessels and one federal fisheries violation onboard one vessel. Figures 1 and 2 show the historic trends for boardings and violations.

#### VI. Halibut and Sablefish Enforcement

The IFQ halibut and sablefish fisheries opened at 1200 local time on 14 March. The Seventeenth District focused enforcement efforts around the region on monitoring the season opener. Air Station Kodiak and Air Station Sitka flew two MH-60 flights and two patrol boats patrolled Southeast Alaska during the weekend of the opener. There were twelve boardings of vessels targeting halibut over the reporting period. There were no fisheries violations during any of the IFQ halibut or sablefish boardings.

There were eight boardings of vessels fishing recreational or subsistence halibut during the reporting period. There was one fisheries violation on one vessel for harvesting halibut while the season was closed.

#### VII. Crab Fisheries


The Coast Guard focused commercial vessel safety enforcement activities on the Bering Sea crab fisheries, with CGC ALEX HALEY and CGC MUNRO conducting twelve boardings on vessels targeting Bering Sea Snow Crab and three boardings on vessels targeting Eastern Bering Sea Tanner Crab. There were two safety violations found during these boardings, one for lack of proper lifesaving equipment markings and one for unserviceable lifering buoys. In addition, a Coast Guard helicopter was forward deployed to Cold Bay for search and rescue standby.

#### VIII. Commercial Fishing Vessel Safety/Search and Rescue Cases

During the reporting period, 27 safety violations were detected on twenty vessels. There were two voyage terminations during the reporting period. A comprehensive list of violations can be found in Appendix C.

There were 17 SAR cases involving fishing vessels in U.S. waters, resulting in fourteen lives saved, no lives lost, and one vessel sinking. Appendix A provides a comprehensive list of search and rescue cases involving fishing vessels over the reporting period.

Figure 4. Annual HC-130 Hours





Figure 5. Annual Major Cutter Days




Figure 6. Dec – Mar HC-130 Hours
