RE: C-2 BSAI PSC Halibut bycatch reductions for the Amendment 80 Fleet, Freezer Longline Fleet, and the Limited Access Trawl Fleet

#### Chairman Hull,

This June at the NPFMC meeting in Sitka, Alaska, a decision will be made on the amount of the reduction of halibut bycatch allocated across the board to the above fishing interests. If the level is set over a 10% reduction, we are very concerned about the impact to the many support sector business here in Unalaska as well as a significant drop in our fish tax and sales tax revenues mainly from marine fuel sales, so critical to our continued economic stability in the Aleutian Islands.

The City of Unalaska is committed to sustainable, accountable fisheries management as a rule and has observed real progress in terms of avoided bycatch in our Bering Sea Fisheries over the past eight years by multiple participants. When the NPFMC rationalized the multispecies fisheries in the Bering Sea under Amendment 80 in 2008, it allocated shares of target and bycatch species to each vessel resulting in positive changes to the fishery:

- 1) Full time Observer coverage for the Amendment 80 fleet, Freezer Longline fleet and the Limited access trawl vessels.
- 2) Sharing hotspot information regarding high halibut areas to be avoided between vessels in real time.
- 3) Designing, testing and using halibut excluders as well as slowing the trawl speed to allow halibut to escape.
- 4) Working to implement a deck sorting program that removes the halibut on the deck instead of putting everything in the holding tanks (as now required) which results in a high mortality rate.

The majority of our BSAI Pacific cod catcher vessels, AFA CP's, Amendment 80CP's, and Pacific Cod Freezer Longline CP partners are diligently working to reduce halibut bycatch and stay in business at the same time. A substantial reduction in the allowable halibut bycatch numbers for these vessels could be extremely negative to coastal communities that depend on a stable, year round fishing effort. The negative result of putting at significant risk our current level of local businesses, jobs, and revenue is of great concern to us. Please take into consideration the adverse effects of cutting the existing halibut bycatch cap by anything over the 10% level on our business community and City. Instead, please strongly encourage the Fleet to continue working on a deck sorting program designed to bring down halibut mortality numbers and to continue to improve the efficiency and use of halibut excluders before making such a major policy change.

Our law firm represents numerous companies and individuals who are involved in the fishing industry in the North Pacific. Our clients include the owners of several vessels operating in the Amendment 80 sector, as well as several companies that provide goods and services to those vessel owners.

We understand that, at the June Council meeting, the Council will consider the adoption of very significant reductions in the halibut prohibited species cap for the Amendment 80 fleet and a corresponding reallocation of halibut quota to other vessels.

I'm writing to encourage the NPFMC to take meaningful action to decrease halibut bycatch in the trawl fisheries. As you are well aware, the directed fisheries have taken on a heavy burden of conservation during this time of declining halibut abundance. In Area 2C where we operate, the longline harvesters have seen their catch limits slashed by more than 50% and charter anglers are down to a bag limit of one halibut of a restricted size. In the Bering Sea, bycatch exceeds directed harvest by more than double in pounds and nearly by five times in the number of individual halibut killed.

Of the roughly one million halibut killed as bycatch in the Bering Sea annually, 70-80%, would migrate to the south and east to populate grounds throughout Alaska, British Columbia and the lower 48. In all these areas, sport and directed commercial fisheries have accepted the the responsibility of conservation by way of slashed catch limits and ever tightening regulations, yet trawl bycatch remains relatively unchanged.

Charter operators have the opportunity to interface with the portion of the pubic who harvest halibut aboard our vessels. While most guided anglers don't relish increased restriction on their take, they are willing to accept cuts for conservation and rebuilding of the resource. The often ask me if the sacrifice is fairly shared by the commercial fleet. How do I explain to them that they are now limited to one fish of a restricted size while bycatch continues at unchanged levels in trawl fisheries? How can we convey a sense of fairness in conservation when more halibut are dumped overboard and wasted than are landed in the entire sport harvest?

I urge you to set trawl bycatch limits to a level representative of the burden placed on other harvesters. It's time to spread the conservation burden of halibut equally and fairly across all user groups.

I am writing to you about the proposed Bering Sea Aleutian Islands (BSAI) Halibut reductions (Agenda item C-2 223<sup>rd</sup> Plenary Session of the North Pacific Fishery Management Council – Sitka June 2015).

North Star Terminal & Stevedore Co., LLC (North Star) is opposed to reductions in the Halibut PSC for the Amendment 80 sector as this would have a direct impact upon our stevedore operations in Dutch Harbor and negatively impact our Company and stature in the other Alaska communities we serve (Anchorage, Homer, Valdez, and Seward).

Do not allow the anomaly in the halibut fishery biomass to negatively impact the Amendment 80 sector's operations. We further question the International Pacific Halibut Commission's (IPHC) management, lack of transparency/notification of issues, unobserved catch, and arbitrary size limit that has driven the issue at hand before the NPFMC. We note that the Amendment 80 fleet operates under the NPFMC and has full transparency, 200% Federal Observer Coverage, and has reduced bycatch while maximizing directed fishery retention.

The Amendment 80 fleet is important to our livelihood and our Union Stevedores and support staff rely on the year around employment afforded by this fleet. It is imperative that you balance the economic value of this fishery (direct and to coastal communities) to the State and Country – if you do, I trust that you will come to the same conclusion we have that any reduction in PSC to this sector, predicated upon the questionable IPHC standards, would not be in Our best interest nor meet the standards of the Magnuson Stevens Act.

#### **RE: Bering Sea Halibut PSC**

#### Dear Chairman Hull:

On behalf of the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union (DSFU), I am writing to you today with profound concerns regarding the Bering Sea halibut PSC limits. Past inaction by the Council to seriously address this issue has led to a previous Emergency Action proposal in area 4CDE and ultimately left the Secretary of Commerce threatening intervention.

According to the BSAI Net Weight Mortality Table, there was a halibut target IFQ reduction of 26% from 2013 to 2014, meanwhile the trawl PSC of nearly 6 million pounds is left unchanged. Furthermore, trawl total mortality exceeded the directed halibut fishery by 12% in 2013 and just over 60% in 2014. Despite voluntary efforts by the trawl industry to reduce halibut bycatch and the subsequent mortality, the opposite appears to be occurring. For this reason, we urge the Council to move forward with the 50% halibut PSC reduction which was initiated at the February meeting.

Rendering to one Amendment 80 company, Fishermen's Finest, Inc., they point out a recent contract to build a new factory trawler and the impacts of lower halibut PSCs and their ability to pay off associated loans. A fishermen's Finest employee also mentions their "rust buckets" have not seen a replacement in their fleet since 1988. Meanwhile, many of our members are working on boats nearly 100 years old. Sure we would like to work on newer boats too, but the fear of instability in fisheries politics that the trawl industry is just beginning to feel, is something we have feared for nearly two decades. Thus, virtually no one in the halibut industry is building a new boat. The trawl sector mentions the thousands of jobs and millions of dollars at risk with lowering halibut PSC limits. As far as jobs, what isn't widely published by the trawl industry is that fish such as Rock and Yellow fin sole are caught in Alaska and shipped to China for processing. So, are any of these same crewmembers able to invest in their industry? I seriously doubt it. Many of our members, all of whom are United States citizens have invested in halibut IFQs. These same members are finding it increasingly difficult to make IFQ mortgage payments and continue to invest in the halibut fishery, especially given the inaction by the Council thus far to seriously address halibut PSC. As a result, the DSFU supports the following:

- Increased observer coverage and/or development of electronic monitoring on <u>all</u> vessels regardless of size or fishery, especially in the GOA where there is less observer data as compared to the Bering Sea.
- Closing the "tender loophole" within the observer program.
- EFP to allow deck sorting of trawl caught halibut as long as there are scales and observer monitoring on deck.
- Encourage the IPHC to lower the minimum retainable size of halibut from 32 inches to 30 inches within the directed halibut fishery.

A few from the trawl industry have offered to discredit IPHC science, saying that the halibut stock is not in the decline that IPHC scientists suggest. However, with the exception of 2C fishermen who have no trawl fisheries and 2B which has 100% bycatch accountability, I don't know of any halibut fishermen who feel the IPHC is crying wolf. As fishermen, we have personally experienced declines in halibut CPUEs and the necessity of decreased TACs.


This issue has gone on far too long. It is not our intention to suggest putting anyone in the trawl industry out of business. We simply ask that the United States trawl industry develop ways to fish cleaner, thus lowering their bycatch before they ultimately put halibut fishermen out of business. The Canadian trawl industry has found ways to operate cleaner while still making a living and supporting a rebounding directed halibut fishery.

We strongly urge the Council to adopt a 50% halibut PSC reduction during final action in June. If the Council chooses to ignore or adopt less than a 50% reduction in halibut PSC, I urge you all to read the book "The Last Fish Tale" by Mark Kurlansky which points out the demise of the Gloucester, Massachusetts cod fishery by trawlers and how Gloucester went from a thriving fishing community to a community dependent on tourism. The writing is on the wall gentlemen.

As you prepare to consider halibut bycatch restrictions in the Bering Sea, I am writing to encourage you to find a solution that is equitable and fair to all user groups. Over the last 10 years, the change in the coast wide management system and declining stocks have drastically reduced the number of pounds of halibut in area 2C that are available for harvest. Commercial IFQ holders have seen their quotas reduced by more than half, and anglers using the services of a guide have seen their limit go from two fish of any size down to one fish of substantially reduced size (current regulations have a slot limit allowing anglers one small fish or one trophy fish). Although less restrictive, area 3A users are experiencing similar circumstances.

Many conservation-minded users of the resource recognize that when stocks are depleted a reduction in harvest may be necessary. They can stomach the tight regulations until they realize that not all user groups who harvest halibut stocks are held to same conservation-based restrictions. The coast wide management regime in place recognizes the migration of halibut from one stat area to the other. Tagging studies have shown that 70-90% of the juvenile halibut in the Bering Sea will migrate to other areas as adults. Knowing this, and seeing the stock decline in other areas, should necessitate bycatch reductions, allowing more of the small fish in the Bering Sea to recruit as adults into the directed fishery in the Bering Sea and other areas. Failing to address this issue, leaving Bering Sea bycatch limits at the same level as they were ten years ago, leaves the conservation burden on only part of the user groups who depend on the resource.

I urge you to make changes to the bycatch limits, restricting trawl bycatch to a level representative of the burden placed on other harvesters, and spreading the conservation burden of halibut across all user groups. Halibut is a valuable and prized species in Alaska. It will take the efforts and sacrifice of all user groups to ensure the perpetuity of the stock and the economic stability of all harvesters.

Dear board,

My name is Tor Benson. I am a second generation fisherman from Petersburg Alaska. I have have a bachelors degree in biology from Oregon State and eight years of experience longlining for halibut in southeast (2C).

I understand this is a complicated issue but I encourage the board to implement a 33% cut in the bycatch for halibut for the amended 80 fleet. I read all 50 comments that are currently post about this issue.

The reason I support such a cut is the long term growth potential of all those wasted halibut. The Bering sea is a nursery ground for halibut and salmon. The 7 million pounds of bycatch of juvenile fish is a substantial portion of the recruitment for the adult biomass.

I have read the comments of the businesses that support the amended 80 fleet in the Bering sea. The amended 80 fleet is much better at coordinated efforts and lobbying as apposed to 3000 individual commercial halibut fisherman. But the local economic impact for the longline fleet should be taken into account as well. Of the 3579 longline job in 2014, 2462 were held by Alaskan residents.

The amended 80 fleet is an unofficial user ground of the halibut fishery because of the halibut bycatch and as such must make cuts during low recruitments times. 3A and 2C saw their quotas cut by 70% over the last seven years because of a reduced harvestable biomass. I'm not asking for such a drastic cut for the amended 80 fleet but we need more juvenile halibut to reach adult size and reducing bycatch is a viable option. If the juveniles continue to be caught before they reach adult size we will continue to delay the recovery of the halibut stock.

I think there is no greater motivator for innovation than lost revenue. If as the amended 80 fleet claims a 33% bycatch reduction will cause a 33% loss in revenue then I believe it will give everyone incentive to find better ways to leave those juvenile halibut alive and in the water.

### **RE: Bering Sea Halibut PSC**

Dear Chairman Hull:

On behalf of the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union (DSFU), I am writing to you today with profound concerns regarding the Bering Sea halibut PSC limits. Past inaction by the Council to seriously address this issue has led to a previous Emergency Action proposal in area 4CDE and ultimately left the Secretary of Commerce threatening intervention.

According to the BSAI Net Weight Mortality Table, there was a halibut target IFQ reduction of 26% from 2013 to 2014, meanwhile the trawl PSC of nearly 6 million pounds is left unchanged. Furthermore, trawl total mortality exceeded the directed halibut fishery by 12% in 2013 and just over 60% in 2014. Despite voluntary efforts by the trawl industry to reduce halibut bycatch and the subsequent mortality, the opposite appears to be occurring. For this reason, we urge the Council to move forward with the 50% halibut PSC reduction which was initiated at the February meeting.

Rendering to one Amendment 80 company, Fishermen's Finest, Inc., they point out a recent contract to build a new factory trawler and the impacts of lower halibut PSCs and their ability to pay off associated loans. A fishermen's Finest employee also mentions their "rust buckets" have not seen a replacement in their fleet since 1988. Meanwhile, many of our members are working on boats nearly 100 years old. Sure we would like to work on newer boats too, but the fear of instability in fisheries politics that the trawl industry is just beginning to feel, is something we have feared for nearly two decades. Thus, virtually no one in the halibut industry is building a new boat. The trawl sector mentions the thousands of jobs and millions of dollars at risk with lowering halibut PSC limits. As far as jobs, what isn't widely published by the trawl industry is that fish such as Rock and Yellow fin sole are caught in Alaska and shipped to China for processing. So, are any of these same crewmembers able to invest in their industry? I seriously doubt it. Many of our members, all of whom are United States citizens have invested in halibut IFQs. These same members are finding it increasingly difficult to make IFQ mortgage payments and continue to invest in the halibut fishery, especially given the inaction by the Council thus far to seriously address halibut PSC. As a result, the DSFU supports the following:

- Increased observer coverage and/or development of electronic monitoring on <u>all</u> vessels regardless of size or fishery, especially in the GOA where there is less observer data as compared to the Bering Sea.
- Closing the "tender loophole" within the observer program.
- EFP to allow deck sorting of trawl caught halibut as long as there are scales and observer monitoring on deck.
- Encourage the IPHC to lower the minimum retainable size of halibut from 32 inches to 30 inches within the directed halibut fishery.

A few from the trawl industry have offered to discredit IPHC science, saying that the halibut stock is not in the decline that IPHC scientists suggest. However, with the exception of 2C fishermen who have no trawl fisheries and 2B which has 100% bycatch accountability, I don't know of any halibut fishermen who feel the IPHC is crying wolf. As fishermen, we have personally experienced declines in halibut CPUEs and the necessity of decreased TACs.

This issue has gone on far too long. It is not our intention to suggest putting anyone in the trawl industry out of business. We simply ask that the United States trawl industry develop ways to fish cleaner, thus lowering their bycatch before they ultimately put halibut fishermen out of business. The Canadian trawl industry has found ways to operate cleaner while still making a living and supporting a rebounding directed halibut fishery.

We strongly urge the Council to adopt a 50% halibut PSC reduction during final action in June. If the Council chooses to ignore or adopt less than a 50% reduction in halibut PSC, I urge you all to read the book "The Last Fish Tale" by Mark Kurlansky which points out the demise of the Gloucester, Massachusetts cod fishery by trawlers and how Gloucester went from a thriving fishing community to a community dependent on tourism. The writing is on the wall gentlemen.

Tired of working for someone else, I started my first charter business out of Ninilchick back in the late 80's. I moved to Amook Island in Uyak bay, on the West side of Kodiak Island in 1994 and started Spirit of Alaska Wilderness Adventures. This salt water fishing and hunting lodge has witnessed and felt the dramatic drop in halibut stocks over the past 15+ years. At first the commercial sector putting the blame on the charter fleet. Commercial sector dodging the blame bullet, but getting there allocation cut by more than 50%. While the hole time it's been the trawl industry raping, pillaging and throwing \$ in all directions to keep the focus off them. It's time to make them accountable for there actions.. I have been extremely fortunate because of where I live, we have hung on by the skin on our teeth by diversify, moving away from salt water fishing, and focus our attention more and more, on photography, wildlife viewing and more eco orientated activities to stay in business. Watching the increase in pressure on halibut over the years, plus the blind eye of poor management on this once incredible resources has allowed the trawl fleet too decimate the halibut stocks in the Bering Sea and right here in our front yard, Shelikof straight. This is no matter how you cut it WRONG! If something isn't done now there will be no tomorrow. Yes this resource has bounced back before, but how many time can it do it? I recommend a 75% reduction in the trawl fleet halibut by catch straight across the board. Emergency order. If the trawl fleet wont stand up and clame responsibility and start fishing clean. Here is one of my proposal:




