This letter is to notify you of my decision to approve Amendment 24 to the Fishery Management Plan (FMP) for the Groundfish Fishery of the Bering Sea and Aleutian Islands Area (BSAI). Amendment 24 was adopted by the North Pacific Fishery Management Council at its June 1993 meeting. This amendment is effective through December 31, 1996, and authorizes the explicit allocation of Pacific cod among gear groups and the seasonal apportionment of the amount of Pacific cod allocated to vessels using hook-and-line or pot gear. The intent of Amendment 24 is to provide stability to the Pacific cod fisheries while allowing various components of the industry to optimize their utilization of the resource.

The final rule implementing Amendment 24 includes the following management measures:

- 1. Allocates the BSAI Pacific cod initial total allowable catch (TAC) (.85 TAC) and subsequent allocations of Pacific cod from the operational reserves, among gear types as follows: 2 percent to vessels using jig gear; 44 percent to vessels using hook-and-line or pot gear; and 54 percent to vessels using trawl gear. In monitoring the use of these gear allocations, all cod catch and cod bycatch by each of the three gear groups would be counted against its allocation;
- 2. Provides the Secretary of Commerce (Secretary), after consultation with the Council, authority to seasonally apportion the amount of the Pacific cod TAC allocated to vessels using hook-and-line or pot gear. Seasonal apportionments would be divided among three successive 4-month periods and established through the annual September-December specifications process; and
- 3. Provides the Director, Alaska Region, NMFS (Regional Director), authority to reallocate Pacific cod from vessels using trawl gear to vessels using hook-and-line or pot gear, and visa versa, anytime during the year the Regional Director determines that one gear group or the other will

not be able to harvest its allocation of Pacific cod. That portion of the jig gear allocation that is expected to go unharvested may be transferred to vessels using trawl and hook-and-line or pot gear at the beginning of the third 4-month period.

The rule implementing Amendment 24 also establishes seasonal apportionments of the amount of the 1994 Pacific cod TAC proposed to be allocated to vessels using hook-and-line or pot gear. These apportionments were recommended by the Council during its December 1993 meeting.

ALASKA DEPARTMENT OF FISH AND GAME REPORT TO THE NORTH PACIFIC FISHERY MANAGEMENT COUNCIL

January 10, 1994

Fisheries managed under delegated authority of the State of Alaska since the last council meeting include crab, salmon and demersal rockfish.

BERING SEA KING AND TANNER CRAB FISHERIES: The directed Bering Sea C. bairdi Tanner crab fishery closed on January 1, 1994. Preliminary information indicates approximately 12.2 million pounds has been harvested in the directed fishery that opened on November 20. In addition, over 3.0 million pounds was harvested incidental to the Bristol Bay red king crab fishery, bringing the preliminary total harvest to 15.2 million pounds, approximately 4.2 million pounds less than the pre-season guideline harvest level. The C. opilio Tanner crab fishery will open by regulation on January 15 with a pre-season harvest guideline of 105.8 million pounds.

The Adak red and brown king crab fishery that opened November 1 continues, with approximately 657,000 pounds of red king and 112,000 pounds of brown king crab harvested. Unless closed earlier by emergency order, the red king crab fishery will close by regulation on February 15. After the closure of the red king crab fishery, additional effort will concentrate on the brown king crab stocks in the area.

SALMON TROLL FISHERY: The 1994 troll chinook accounting began on October 1, 1993, but the opening was delayed ten days. The catch to date is 34,000 fish, the second highest catch reported for the first half of the winter accounting period.

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SOUTHEAST ALASKA DEMERSAL SHELF ROCKFISH FISHERY: The directed DSR hook and line fishery reopened January 1 under the 1994 harvest objectives. New Board of Fisheries regulations will extend the winter lingcod closure line outward from the surfline to the three mile base line, which makes the state's cod pot fishing regulations consistent with federal regulations for the Eastern Gulf.

State management boundaries were altered to bring consistency with the federal regulatory district boundaries. Additionally, the state has adpopted a framework authority to modify directed fishing standards for rockfish by emergency order.
