REPORT TO THE NORTH PACIFIC FISHERIES MANAGEMENT COUNCIL CONCERNING U.S. COAST GUARD FCMA ENFORCEMENT

- 1. Recent FCMA Infractions. Since the last council meeting nine reports of violation (civil penalty procedure) and six citations (written warning) have been issued. In addition, three foreign fishing vessels have been seized for severe FCMA infractions. A brief summary of each infraction follows.
- a. 18 July. USCGC MORGENTHAU issued a citation to the Japanese stern trawler RYUJIN MARU No. 11 for failure to provide appropriate notification of its operations to begin fishing.
- b. 18 July. USCGC MORGENTHAU issued a citation to the Korean stern trawler HEUNG YANG HO for failure to properly maintain its daily cumulative catch log by failure to log its catch within twelve hours of the day of catch.
- c. 20 July. USCGC MORGENTHAU issued two reports of violation to the Japanese stern trawler MUTSU MARU No. 52 for failure to sort its catch of a prohibited species (herring) in a timely manner and return the catch with a minimum of injury.
- d. 20 July. USCGC MORGENTHAU issued a citation to the Japanese stern trawler RYUJIN MARU No. 11 for failure to properly maintain its daily cumulative catch log by the failure to account for 4.2 MT of turbot.
- e. 20 July. USCGC MORGENTHAU issued a report of violation to the Japanese factory vessel SOYO MARU for failure to log its catch of a prohibited species (herring).
- f. 4 August. USCGC MORGENTHAU issued a report of violation to the South Korean stern trawler JINAM No. 308 for failure to provide appropriate notification of its operations to begin transferring its catch.
- g. 6 August. Air Station Kodiak issued a report of violation to the South Korean stern trawler DAE SUNG HO for fishing in an area where their allocation had been reached.

- 16 August. USCGC CAMPBELL issued a citation to the South Korean stern trawler No. 7 SANG WON for failure to provide a safe ladder for the authorized boarding party.
- 20 August. USCGC RUSH issued a report of violation to the Japanese stern trawler YURYO MARU No. 8 for keeping two separate daily cumulative catch logs for a six day period thereby failing to properly meet its requirement to maintain an accurate daily cumulative catch log.
- 24 August. USCGC RUSH seized the Japanese stern trawler FUKUI MARU No. 8 near Attu, Alaska, for gross underlogging (37 percent) of its turbot catch. \_ case pending
- k. 5 September. USCGC MIDGETT issued a report of violation to the South Korean factory vessel BOOK NEUNG for failure to provide a safe ladder for the authorized boarding party.
- 5 September. USCGC MIDGETT issued a citation to the Japanese longliner EIKYU MARU No. 82 for failure to properly maintain its daily cumulative catch log by logging its cumulative catch by allocation year rather than permit year.
- 5 September. USCGC MIDGETT issued a report of violation to the South Korean stern trawler JINAM No. 308 for failure to provide a safe ladder for the authorized boarding party.
- 6 September. USCGC MIDGETT seized the South Korean stern trawler No. 7 SANG WON in the Bering Sea for gross underlogging (22 per cent) of its pollock catch.
- 8 September. USCGC MIDGETT issued a citation to the Taiwanese stern trawler GOLDEN DRAGON No. 1 for failure to properly maintain its daily cumulative catch log by the failure to include catches from its previous 1981 trips.
- USCGC RUSH seized the South Korean stern 14 September. trawler JINAM No. 305 near Seguam Island, Alaska, for gross underlogging (23 per cent) of its atka mackeral and yellowfin sole catch.
- 15 September. USCGC CAMPBELL issued a report of violation to the Japanese stern trawler KAIYO MARU No. 12 for overlogging (48 per cent) its catch of pollock.

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#### SUMMARY OF SE ALASKA COASTAL PATROL ACTIVITIES

Since the last council meeting the combined air-sea Coast Guard effort in southeast Alaska has resulted in numerous foreign fishing vessel boardings in the adjacent fisheries conservation zone. Utilizing the three patrol vessels (95-foot) home ported in southeast Alaska, the helicopter (HH-3F) facilities of Air Station Sitka, and the patrol cutters STORIS and MELLON, eight boardings have been made this summer on Japanese stern trawlers in the area from Cape Edgecumbe north to Cape Fairweather. No FCMA infractions were found during the enforcement boardings and all vessel masters and crews were cooperative toward the authorized Coast Guard boarding teams.

Fisheries patrols are scheduled through September for the southeast Alaska patrol vessels and with patrol cutters transitting through Juneau enroute to Kodiak the area of Japanese fishing operations will continue to be patrolled. By centering the law enforcement efforts of the 95-foot vessels in Sitka, they have been able to execute effective boardings, consult with National Marine Fisheries Service personnel for additional information and expertise, and respond to inquiries and requests from the domestic fishing fleet while receiving the necessary logistic support. As a result of the combined air-sea Coast Guard operation the FCMA enforcement effort in southeast Alaska has increased without the loss of time and cutter resources in other fisheries areas.
