1. U. S. COAST GUARD FISHERIES ENFORCEMENT EFFORT FOR 1987. Through 30 November, the Coast Guard in Alaska had expended 540 cutter days and 1,416 aircraft patrol hours in 1987 to enforce the Magnuson Fisheries Conservation and Management Act (MFCMA) and the provisions of international fisheries treaties to which the United States is a party, including the International Pacific Halibut Convention (IPHC) and the Convention on High Seas Fisheries of the North Pacific Ocean (INPFC).

2. MFCMA ENFORCEMENT SUMMARY.

- a. The following is a summary of Magnuson Act enforcement action taken since the last written report to the Council:
 - 1) 2 September 1987. USCGC STORIS issued a report of violation to the U.S. longliner MARY ELLEN for directed fishing for sablefish in a closed area. Vessel's catch of 6646 lbs of sablefish was seized.
 - 2) 12 September 1987. USCGC STORIS issued report of violation to the U.S. stern trawler REBECCA IRENE for directed fishing for sablefish in a closed area. Vessel's catch of 44,871 lbs of sablefish was seized. Vessel was later arrested and released on \$500,000 bond pending trial.
 - 3) 1 October 1987. USCGC STORIS issued a report of violation to the U.S. stern trawler AMFISH for failure to send weekly catch reports.
 - 4) 11 November 1987. USCGC MORGENTHAU issued written warning to Japanese longliner EIKYO MARU NO. 12 for improper boarding ladder.
 - 5) 12 November 1987. USCGC STORIS issued a report of violation to U.S. longliner POLAR MIST for failure to send "begin", "cease", "shift" messages, and weekly catch reports.
- b. Through 30 November, 59 MFCMA reports of violation and written warnings had been issued during calendar year 1987, 48 to foreign and 11 to U.S. fishing vessels operating in the waters off Alaska. Summary by country follows:

- 3. HALIBUT (IPHC) ENFORCEMENT SUMMARY. For all IPHC openings in 1987, U.S. Coast Guard halibut enforcement efforts totalled 83 cutter days and 311 aircraft patrol hours. 71 vessels were boarded, and the following IPHC reports of violation were issued:
 - a. 2 May 1987. USCGC RUSH issued report of violation to MINNOW for fishing prior to opening. Vessel and catch of 84,000 lbs of processed halibut seized.
 - b. 3 May 1987. USCGC STORIS issued report of violation to ZACHARY R for not having IPHC permit aboard.
 - c. 19 August 1987. USCGC YOCONA issued report of violation to CONSTITUTION for not maintaining catch log, automatic hook remover aboard, and longline buoys not marked. Catch of 29,925 lbs of halibut seized.
 - d. 2 September 1987. USCGC MUSTANG issued report of violation to MERIDIAN for fishing in a closed area.
 - e. 2 September 1987. AIRSTA KODIAK sighted BABE setting gear prior to halibut opening. NMFS issued report of violation.
 - f 3 September 1987. USCGC STORIS issued report of violation to LINDA MARIE for retention of undersized halibut.
 - g. 3 September 1987. USCGC MUSTANG issued report of violation to SEA GYPSY for retention of undersized halibut.
 - h. 4 September 1987. USCGC MUSTANG issued report of violation to ORIOLE for retention of undersized halibut.
 - i. 11 September 1987. USCGC STORIS issued report of violation to scallop vessel PHOENIX for retention of halibut while fishing for other species.
 - j. 2 October 1987. AIRSTA KODIAK sighted PAMPERO fishing in a closed area. NMFS issued report of violation.
 - k. 23 November 1987. USCGC STORIS issued report of violation to crab vessel CAPT BILLY for retention of halibut while fishing for other species.

Numerous abandoned halibut longlines were reported and recovered by USCG patrol vessels after each halibut opening. Gear and catch were transferred to NMFS upon completion of patrol.

4. FOREIGN FISHING ACTIVITY IN THE INTERNATIONAL WATERS OF THE BERING SEA.

- a. Since the last report to the Council the Coast Guard conducted seven surveillance flights in the vicinity of the international waters of the Bering Sea and USCGC MORGENTHAU patrolled in parts of the area. 28 Japanese, 32 South Korea, 9 Polish, 6 PRC, and 5 USSR fishing vessels (80 total) were identified operating in the "donut hole". MORGENTHAU was planning to consensually board the Japanese stern trawler KOYO MARU 3/JDXF, until the vessel's parent company directed them to not allow the boarding as they were in "open waters." No other boardings were attempted or conducted. Large haulbacks from this vessel and the USSR stern trawler ZELENOGRAD/EVVA were observed by MORGENTHAU.
- b. So far during 1987 the Coast Guard has conducted a total of 16 C-130 flights and 3 surface patrols in the "donut hole", identifying 34 Japanese, 34 South Korean, 30 Polish, 6 PRC, and 6 USSR vessels operating in the area (110 total). The following is a list of those vessels:

A graphic display of foreign fishing vessel sightings in and around the "donut hole" from July - November 1987 is attached as enclosure (5) to this report.

5. HIGH SEAS SQUID GILLNET ENFORCEMENT.

Four C130 surveillance flights were conducted from September through November to monitor high seas squid gillnet vessels in the North Pacific. On 8 September, 16 Japanese squid

gillnet vessels were sighted operating from 9 to 68 nautical miles north of the boundary imposed by Japanese domestic regulations (46N for September). 6 of these vessels were engaged in fishing. 7 vessels had covered their identifying markings.

b. During 1987 Coast Guard patrols sighted a total of 95 Japanese and one Taiwanese high seas squid gillnet vessels north of the boundaries imposed by each country on their fishermen to minimize interceptions of U.S. origin salmon. One South Korean vessel was also sighted north of the Japanese boundary (South Korean domestic regulations prohibit the retention of salmon, but do not impose boundary restrictions).

6. DOMESTIC FISHING VESSEL DOCUMENTATION/LICENSING VIOLATIONS.

In November USCGC STORIS boarded many uninspected U.S. F/V's in Dutch Harbor AK, and found numerous licensing, documentation, and admeasurement violations. ALASKAN HERO was boarded on 13 November and detained for operating without the required number of U.S. licensed officers aboard. The vessel was released when properly licensed officers were hired.

From 16-19 November AMALASKA I, AMALASKA II, NORPAC I, NORPAC III, NORPAC III, and BERING I were boarded. All vessels had been in South Korean shipyards for conversion/refit work. Work done had altered the structure/tonnage of all vessels. There were various tonnage, admeasurement, licensing and pollution violations on all vessels. Fraudulent use of documents was suspected in each case because invalid documents were presented by vessel masters to U.S. customs agents for purposes of U.S. port entry clearance. On 20 November, the UYAK I (formerly STATE REBEL) was boarded in Kodiak. Tonnage/admeasurement violations due to conversion of ballast tanks to fish holds were discovered. All vessels were ordered not to operate until in compliance with the admeasurement and documentation laws of the U.S. Licensed masters of AMALASKA II, NORPAC II, and NORPAC III were charged for suspension and revocation hearings.

On 21 November NORTHWEST ENTERPRISE was boarded by STORIS. The vessel had been converted in 1983 from crabber to catcher/processor in Seattle. Vessel structure/compartment use had been changed since conversion. Tonnage/pollution violations were noted. Vessel was detained and later released because it had been readmeasured after the conversion. Tonnage opening violations pend.

From the number of violations discovered, it appears that vessel licensing and documentation laws are being disregarded by some of the domestic trawler fleet. This appears to be especially true of vessels which have been converted from offshore supply vessels to fishing vessels. Frequently, this

conversion raises the gross tonnage above 200 gross tons and subjects the vessels to licensing requirements of the Officer's Competency Certificates Convention, 1936. In some of the cases major alterations to ballast systems indicate a lack of concern for vessel safety.
