ENFORCEMENT REPORT FOR THE PERIOD 12/5/2000 THROUGH 2/6/2001

National Marine Fisheries Service Alaska Enforcement Division

During the period since the last Council meeting, the Alaska Enforcement Division has opened fifty-seven (57) new cases.

Stellar Sea Lions

Critical Habitat - All of the initial investigations on last year's incursions are completed. The cases have been forwarded to NOAA General Council. A total of forty-three (43) vessels were investigated. Seventeen (17) cases were dismissed as unfounded. This year, to avoid a similar situation, we will be monitoring observer data, reviewing logs, and assisting in patrols when we have the opportunity. We also expect VMS to play a significant role in our enforcement effort.

Cases Involving Observers

There are indications that there are many vessels in the 30% coverage fleet who are not complying with observer coverage. We are looking into the extent of the problem and how best to address it.

Of the fifty-seven (57) cases opened this period, thirty-six (36) were observer related. The Anchorage Office continues to review observer affidavits and prioritize complaints for investigation.

IFO

Major Cases: Kenai Customs owners, James Hill, Sr, and James Hill, Jr. were indicted in September on one count of conspiracy and four counts of Lacey Act violations. The investigation turned up evidence that halibut, with a retail value of up to \$200,000, was purchased by Kenai Customs in 1997. The evidence shows that Kenai Customs concealed the payments for the illegal purchases by writing checks for services not rendered by the fisherman. At a Change of Plea Hearing on January 4th, James Hill, Sr. agreed to a sentence of 15 months in jail and agreed to pay a \$8,000 fine. Dockside Boardings and Compliance: Our efforts last year showed a high level of compliance in the manned ports. This year, we will attempt to make more visits to unmanned ports.

We also have indications that there were many "D" class quota holders fishing their quota on vessels over 35 feet last year. We are analyzing the extent of this and how best to address this "fishing up" issue. Our Officers will be paying more attention to this during their boardings.

Record Keeping and Reporting Effort

Our office is currently tracking eight (8) vessels with VMS. These vessels are fishing in the Atka Mackerel fishery.

Community Oriented Policing and Problem Solving (COPPS)

We will have a booth at COMFISH in Kodiak in March. We invite everyone to stop by and talk to our Officers and Agents.
