NATIONAL MARINE FISHERIES SERVICE ENFORCEMENT FOR THE PERIOD APRIL 1, 1992 THROUGH JUNE 1, 1992

During the reporting period NMFS and the Coast Guard opened a total of 77 investigations. NMFS independently initiated 50 investigations. 19 of these cases originated from the observer program. 42 cases were closed during the reporting period.

NMFS ability to deal with routine cases continues to be thwarted by the continuing accrual of more complex criminal and civil investigations. During the last year no less than half of the NMFS field agents in Alaska have been involved in complex investigations. These investigations include VIP cases, intentional misreporting, criminal fraud, Lacey Act violations, and criminal conspiracies. The nature of these investigations are such that they generally preclude an agent from handling a larger number of more routine cases. NMFS has been seeking assistance from other regions and is recruiting for more agents.

Recruitment of agents has meet with a host of obstacles. With a few exceptions we have been unable to coax experienced agents from other regions to move to Alaska. This leaves us in the position of recruiting untrained personnel and candidates who are not current government employees. Clearance procedures for new agents, which are classified as critical-sensitive by personnel rules, are onerous and time consuming. However, we have had some successes.

In July we will transfer a senior Special Agent from the Northwest Region to Juneau. This position will facilitate case review procedures and speed up referral of cases for prosecution. Two of our existing uniformed Resource Enforcement Officers have been converted to agent positions and will be transferred to the Sitka office. A second agent has been recruited for the Homer office. This agent entered training in June and is expected to report for duty in August. Two new uniformed officers have been recruited for the Kodiak office and are to enter training this summer. A uniformed officer has been recruited for Dutch Harbor. This officer is not expected to be on board until this winter. We are additionally recruiting for one agent at Dutch Harbor, one uniformed officer at Kodiak, and two agents at Juneau.

A summary of NMFS initiated enforcement actions follows:



1. MFCMA Groundfish Violations:

- (a) April 20, 1992 The trawl vessel ONE OCEAN was cited in Kodiak for exceeding Pacific cod bycatch limitations by 126%. \$3,842 in proceeds from the sale of 17,774 lbs. of Pacific cod were seized. The case is to be referred to NOAA General Counsel.
- (b) April 21, 1992 The trawl vessel ST. JANET was cited in Kodiak for exceeding Pacific cod bycatch limitations by 79%. \$762 in proceeds from the sale of 3,550 lbs. of Pacific cod were seized. The case is to be referred to NOAA General Counsel.
- (c) April 28, 1992 The trawl vessel PACIFIC STAR was cited in Kodiak for exceeding Pacific cod bycatch limitations by 27%. \$404 in proceeds from the sale of 2,741 lbs. of Pacific cod were seized. The case is to be referred to NOAA General Counsel.
- (d) April 28, 1992 The trawl vessel MISS ANGEL was cited in Kodiak for exceeding Pacific cod bycatch limitations by 73%. \$1,223 in proceeds from the sale of 6,478 lbs. of Pacific cod were seized. The case is to be referred to NOAA General Counsel.
- (e) April 29, 1992 The trawl vessel GREEN HOPE was cited in Kodiak for exceeding Pacific cod bycatch limitations by 29%. \$504 in proceeds from the sale of 2,297 lbs. of Pacific cod were seized. The case is to be referred to NOAA General Counsel.
- (f) Since our last report, NMFS has cited a number of vessels for exceeding bycatch limitations of the Vessel Incentive Program during 1991. All 1991 VIP investigations have been completed and are being referred to General. Vessels cited include the CONSTELLATION, CONCEPCION, PACIFIC ENTERPRISE, ALASKA RANGER (2 counts), and the ALASKA 1 (2 counts). The PACIFIC ENTERPRISE was additionally cited for failing to log discards (18 counts) an failure to report discards in weekly catch reports (2 counts). A total of 6 VIP cases were deemed to be actionable during 1991.

NMFS Enforcement initiated 4 VIP investigations during the second quarter of 1992. These four vessels were participating in the Bering Sea flatfish fishery in February. The Observer Program has additionally identified twelve more vessels with bycatch rates over the standard of 25 kg per ton of groundfish. Six of these cases may be assigned as investigations upon analysis of edited observer data and debriefing of observers. Analysis of the other six cases has

shown that four of these vessels have a 95% confidence level lower bound below 25 kg per ton, and two vessels have too few hauls for calculation of a lower bound. All twelve vessels were participating in the Bering Sea Pacific cod fishery in April.

U.S. COAST GUARD/NMFS JUNEAU FISHERIES ENFORCEMENT FOR PERIOD April 01, through May 31, 1992

1. ACCOMPLISHMENTS.

a. <u>Invalidation of USCG Documentation:</u>

(1) On April 10, USCGC YOCONA conducted a boarding of fishing vessel Alaska Venture to investigate reports that foreign citizens were in control of the vessel. Thorough investigation by YOCONA revealed that the Japanese "fish master" exerted extensive control over the vessel. Based on the evidence of foreign control, the Coast Guard invalidated the vessel's document.

b. Catch Seizures:

(1) On May 22, USCGC ACUSHNET seized the catch of fishing vessel Sara Dawn after it was determined that the vessel was fishing in federal waters without a federal fisheries permit or logbook. The vessel was directed to Yakutat where the catch was sold and the case forwarded to NMFS.

c. Significant Aircraft Sightings:

- (1) On April 27, a deployed C-130 from Air Station Sacramento, CA sighted the tug Petro Challenger within the no transit zone of Ikun Island sealion rookery. The vessel was sighted within 2 NM of the rookery and was directed to leave the area. The case was forwarded to NMFS for penalty action.
- (2) On April 30, a Kodiak based C-130 located two Panamanian (PM) flagged stern trawlers fishing in the donut hole. These vessels were of concern to the U. S. in light of the current negotiations to regulate fishing by traditional distant water fishing countries in the donut to protect U. S. and Russian pollock stocks. On 05 May, USCGC RUSH relocated the Panamanian trawlers NO. 75 Penta Marie and Golden Dragon NO. 307. Although PM registered, both claimed Korean ownership. Information on these vessels was passed to Department of State.

d. <u>High Seas Driftnet:</u>

- (1) On May 13, a Kodiak based C-130 located a suspected Panamanian driftnet vessel, 3EUXB, transitting in position 37-31N, 178-37W. Although the vessel was in the authorized driftnet area for South Korean and Taiwanese driftnet fishing, this was our first sighting of a Panamanian flagged driftnet vessel. Photos of the vessel were forwarded to the Dept of State for a confirmation of the vessel's nationality.
- (2) On May 20, a Kodiak based C-130 sighted 22 probable Japanese driftnet vessels well north of current squid driftnet boundaries but very near INPFC Japanese landbased salmon area. Several of the vessels were observed actively working gear but they dropped their nets and began evasive maneuvers when overflown by the C-130. Fish, suspected of being salmon, were observed on deck of several vessels.
- (3) On May 22, a Kodiak based C-130 attempted to relocate driftnet vessels sighted on May 20. The C-130 was able to locate driftnet vessel Yuko Maru as it was being boarded by Japanese enforcement vessel Hakaryu Maru. The enforcement vessel passed to the C-130 that Yuko Maru was being investigated for illegal fishing and that the vessel had been targetting salmon. Information was received May 23 from the Hakaryu Maru that the Yuko Maru was arrested for illegal salmon fishing.
