U.S. COAST GUARD/NMFS JUNEAU FISHERIES ENFORCEMENT FOR PERIOD September 1, through November 30, 1992

1. SIGNIFICANT LAW ENFORCEMENT CASES

- a. <u>Vessel Seizures:</u>
 - 1. NONE

b. <u>Catch Seizures:</u>

1. On 08 September a Coast Guard helicopter from the CGC RESOLUTE sighted the fishing vessel ONE OCEAN running halibut through a hook stripper on deck. Upon approach of the CGC RESOLUTE, crewmembers from ONE OCEAN were observed throwing small, whole halibut and fishparts over the side. Once boarded, 25 undersized halibut were discovered, 16 of which had crucifier damage. The vessel was escorted to Kodiak where the catch offload was observed. A total of 117 undersized halibut were found, and the vessel's entire catch (18,365 lbs) was seized. In addition, the vessel was cited for possession/use of a crucifier, retaining undersized halibut, destruction of evidence and improperly marked gear.

c. Document Invalidation

1. On 21 November 92, the CGC MUNRO boarded the fishing vessel PLATONIDA and discovered that the master, Kenneth Ostebo, was a Canadian citizen. The vessel's document was invalidated (46 CFR 67.45-3 and 46 CFR 67.23, vessel not under command of a U.S. citizen) and the master was advised that continued fishing would warrant seizure of the vessel.

d. <u>Halibut Openings</u>

1. On 09 September the CGC MUSTANG observed the fishing vessel TENACIOUS off-loading their catch to ALEUTIAN DRAGON FISHERIES. The vessel was authorized a catch limit of 9,000 lbs, but unloaded a total of 11,394 lbs of halibut. CGC MUSTANG

seized the 1,242 lbs of excess halibut valued at \$1,265.85.

- 2. On 07 October a COAST GUARD HELICOPTER sighted the fishing vessel CEDRIC fishing halibut after the opening. The vessel was boarded by the CGC RUSH while it was still pulling gear. Approximately 500 lbs of halibut was discovered on board (five of which were undersized). The vessel was cited for late fishing and retention of undersized halibut.
- 3. On 07 October the fishing vessel SILVER SURFER was boarded by COAST GUARD STATION KETCHIKAN. The vessel was found to be retaining more halibut (774 lbs) than authorized by their IPHC license. The overage, valued at \$723.87, was seized.

e. <u>High Seas Driftnet Patrol</u>

- While patrolling the high seas driftnet area enroute to a Russian port call, the CGC CHASE discovered two vessels loitering well north (approximately 49-25N, 163-45E) of the September high seas driftnet area. The first vessel was sighted as it was pulling it's nets from the water. There were no markings displayed on the hull, but it was flying a People's Republic of China (PRC) flag, and had a red, five-pointed star on Numerous attempts were made to contact the vessel, the stack. but were to no avail. The second vessel was located approximately 10 NM from the first one. After numerous attempts, brief communications were finally established and the vessel responded in Manderan, claiming to be PRC. The CGC CHASE requested them to display their flag, and the vessel hoisted a PRC flag. They then broke off communications when the CGC CHASE requested a consensual boarding. Case documentation and photographs were forwarded to the Department of State for further investigation and action by the PRC.
- 2. On 27 September the Japanese Maritime Safety Agency (MSA) arrested the chief fisherman of two coastal salmon vessels for illegal fishing, based on the U.S. Coast Guard C-130 sightings and photographs of 22 May 92. A total of 22 high seas driftnet vessels were sighted fishing north of the authorized area for that month. The MSA scrutinized logbooks, records of radio communications, fuel consumption and catches of salmon in order to identify two of the vessels photographed by the Coast Guard. Japanese investigations into illegal salmon fishing by the additional 20 driftnet vessels are still ongoing. As a result of the case originated by the Coast Guard, the Fisheries Agency of Japan (FAJ) suspects that perhaps as many as 88 driftnet vessels may have participated in the illegal harvest of the high seas salmon.
- 3. On 26 September a Coast Guard C-130 detected 08 driftnet vessels well north of the authorized area. None of the vessels had any visible markings, flags or IRCS. When detected, all were in the vicinity of the Russian 200 NM limit. Since the

driftnet vessels were in such close proximity to the Russian EEZ, the Seventeenth Coast Guard District informed the Russian Maritime Border Guard of the vessels. A positive response was received from the Border Guard, expressing their appreciation for the information and that they would send an aircraft to patrol the area south of the Kamchatka Peninsula where the driftnet vessels were sighted. There were no further sightings of these vessels.

f. Stellar Sea Lion Rookeries

- 1. On 09 September the CGC RUSH boarded the fishing vessel MEGAN HOPE in the vicinity of the Buldir Island sea lion rookery. Examination of their DCPL revealed several incursions into Attu Island sea lion rookery, for which the vessel was cited. Case forwarded to NMFS for for further investigation and action.
- 2. On 25 September the CGC RUSH boarded the fishing vessel BERING STAR. The vessel was initially observed working crab pots within 2200 yards of Walrus Island, and within the sea lion rookery no transit zone. The master stated he was unfamiliar with the no transit zone, and admitted to setting crab pots within 3 NM of Walrus Island. He was cited for multiple rookery incursions. Case forwarded to NMFS for for further investigation and action.

3. OTHER AREAS OF INTEREST.

a. Donut Hole. The Coast Guard conducted 16 C-130 flights into the donut hole to monitor fishing activity by either U.S. or foreign trawlers. There were no sightings of vessels actively fishing. These observations are consistent with reports that foreign trawlers have moved out of the area after reporting poor catches in the early part of 1992. The Coast Guard will continue periodic checks of the donut hole to monitor compliance with the 1993-1994 moratorium on fishing in the donut under the conditions agreed to by the coastal states and nations conducting historical fisheries in the donut hole.



SUMMARY

Coast Guard patrols in 1992 have been successful in protecting primary U.S. interests and enforcing the provisions of the high seas driftnet agreements. The Coast Guard conducted sixteen (16) boardings of high seas driftnet vessels of which thirteen were operating within and three were operating north of the seasonal boundaries. Coast Guard boardings revealed none of the vessels were retaining salmon. The most serious violation of the agreements, involving directed fishing for salmon, were observed by aircraft and occurred well to the west and outside of the primary areas of interest for U.S. origin stocks. The May sightings of 22 small Japanese driftnetters operating outside the JA EEZ and north of the seasonal high seas boundary resulted in a major JA investigation revealing as many as 88 vessels from Hokkaido which may have been illegally fishing for salmon on the

high seas. September sightings of People's Republic of China (PRC) flagged vessels and other driftnetters sighted near the Russian zone have underscored the need for our continued patrol effort and "visit and verification" authority as we look to 1993 and beyond. Department of State is attempting to extend the "visit and verification" provisions of the KS and TW driftnet agreements and establish a similar agreement for conducting visits on fishing vessels of the PRC. The Coast Guard plans to continue patrol efforts in 1993 to monitor compliance with the UN moratorium on high seas driftnetting. Violations will be documented and forwarded to Department of State for imposing sanctions, as appropriate.



NATIONAL MARINE FISHERIES SERVICE ENFORCEMENT FOR THE PERIOD SEPTEMBER 1, 1992 THROUGH NOVEMBER 30, 1992

During the reporting period NMFS and the Coast Guard opened a total of 312 investigations. NMFS independently initiated 232 investigations. 53 of these cases originated from the observer program. 96 cases were closed as unfounded during the reporting period. An additional 124 cases were closed due to lack of enforcement resources. 49 cases were handled with written warnings and 44 summary settlement offers were issued.

127 cases were settled by voluntary abandonment of seized proceeds. These cases routinely involve overages of halibut trip limits of less than 10% and excess groundfish bycatch. Voluntary abandonments and forfeited property was valued at \$21,014.19. An additional \$2,202.77 in proceeds were forfeited in conjunction with summary settlement offers.

Observer initiated cases resulted in 18 written warnings, 1 dismissal as unfounded, 12 dismissals due to lack of enforcement resources, 12 referrals to Coast Guard Marine Safety Office, 8 referrals to the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, an 2 assignments for further investigation.

1. MFCMA Groundfish Violations:

- (a) Sept. 9, 1992 Proceeds of \$2,274.20 from the sale of sablefish from the longline vessel NANCY H were seized. The vessel is alleged to have exceeded the directed fishing standards for sablefish bycatch. The case is pending. (Homer)
- (b) Sept. 30, 1992 The longline vessel PANDAD was cited for exceeding directed fishing standards for turbot bycatch. The vessel was offered a \$750 summary settlement. Proceeds of \$424 were seized. The case is pending. (Sitka)

2. Halibut Violations:

- (a) Sept. 8, 1992 Proceeds of \$445.64 from the sale of halibut from the longline vessel GYPSY were seized. The vessel is alleged to have exceeded a trip limit by more than 10%. Investigation continues. (Hoonah)
- (b) Sept. 8, 1992 Proceeds of \$250.22 from the sale of halibut from the longline vessel ISIS were seized. The vessel is alleged to have exceeded a trip limit by more than 10%. Investigation continues. (Ketchikan)
- (c) Sept. 15, 1992 The longline vessel JESSE LEIGH was cited for exceeding a halibut trip limit by more than 10%. The vessel paid a \$342 summary settlement penalty. Proceeds of \$270.80 were seized. (Kodiak)
- (d) Sept. 30, 1992 The longline vessel JENNIE GIRL was cited for exceeding a halibut trip limit by more than 10%. The vessel was offered a \$1,333.75 summary settlement. Proceeds of \$853,60 were seized. The case is pending. (Homer)
- (e) Oct 7, 1992 Proceeds of \$481 from the sale of halibut from the longline vessel SILVER BULLET were seized. The vessel is alleged to have exceeded a trip limit by more than 10%. Investigation continues. (Sand Point)

- (f) Oct. 8, 1992 An unnamed longline skiff was cited for exceeding a halibut trip limit by more than 10%. The vessel paid a \$146.25 summary settlement penalty. Proceeds of \$116.90 were seized. (Kodiak)
- (g) Oct. 10, 1992 The longline vessel KALUGIN was cited for exceeding a halibut trip limit by more than 10%. The vessel paid a \$612 summary settlement penalty. Proceeds of \$409.33 were seized. (Kodiak)
- (h) Oct. 10, 1992 Proceeds of \$3,324.63 from the sale of halibut from the longline vessel AARON were seized. The vessel is alleged to have exceeded a trip limit by more than 10%. Investigation continues. (Sand Point)
- (i) Oct. 10, 1992 The longline vessel WESTERN STAR was cited for exceeding a halibut trip limit by more than 10%. The vessel paid a \$2,174 summary settlement penalty. Proceeds of \$1,405 were seized. (Kodiak)
- (j) Oct. 11, 1992 The longline vessel SUSITNA was cited for exceeding a halibut trip limit by more than 10%. The vessel was offered a \$1,504 summary settlement. Proceeds of \$1,078 were seized. (Sand Point)
- (k) Oct. 11, 1992 The longline vessel METEOR was cited for exceeding a halibut trip limit by more than 10%. The vessel was offered a \$517 summary settlement. Proceeds of \$339.87 were seized. The case is pending. (Kodiak)
- (1) Oct. 11, 1992 The longline vessel MOROZ HOMER was cited for exceeding a halibut trip limit by more than 10%. The vessel was offered a \$504 summary settlement. Proceeds of \$312.82 were seized. The case is pending. (Kodiak)
- (m) Oct. 12, 1992 The longline vessel EMARK was cited for exceeding a halibut trip limit by more than 10%. The vessel was offered a summary settlement of \$291. Proceeds of \$203.43 were seized. The case is pending. (Kodiak)
- (n) Oct. 15, 1992 The longline vessel SEA LATCH was cited for no IPHC license and for transport and sale of halibut taken in violation of federal law (Lacey Act). The vessel landed 5,610 lbs. of halibut. The vessel was eligible for a 1900 lb. trip limit. The vessel is alleged to have split the landing onto separate fish tickets for three vessels. Proceeds of \$6,283.20 were seized. The case is to be referred to U.S. District Court. (Homer)
- (o) Oct. 15, 1992 The longline vessel AMUR was cited for maintaining an inaccurate logbook, and transport and sale of halibut taken in violation of federal law (Lacey Act). The vessel landed 5,446 lbs. of halibut. The vessel was eligible for a 3,000 lb. trip limit. The vessel is alleged to have split the landing onto separate fish tickets for two vessels. Proceeds of \$5,469.79 were seized. The case is to be referred to U.S. District Court. (Homer)
- (p) Nov. 6, 1992 The longline vessel EMILY NICHOLE was cited for exceeding a halibut trip limit by more than 10%. The vessel was offered a summary settlement of \$4,863.75. Proceeds of \$4,474.65 were seized. The case is pending. (Prince Rupert, B.C.)
