U. S. COAST GUARD ENFORCEMENT REPORT 4/1/94 - 5/31/94

- 1. ENFORCEMENT/SAFETY SUMMARY.
- A. INTERNATIONAL FISHERIES.
- 1. HIGH SEAS DRIFTNETS. For 1994, Coast Guard air and cutter patrols have observed no activity in violation of the UN Moratorium on High Seas Driftnetting. As of 1 June, 105 cutter days and 115 C-130 hours have been used to cover the high threat areas of the North Pacific. The Coast Guard has also maintained close coordination with NMFS and enforcement representatives of the North Pacific Anadromous Fisheries Commission (NPAFC) to ensure the effective use of our combined patrol resources. Coordination has included support for Canadian aircraft deployments staged in the the Aleutians, exchange of patrol/sighting information with both the Fisheries Agency of Japan (FAJ) in Tokyo and Russian Maritime Border Guard (MBG) reps in Petropovlovsk, and an at sea meeting last week between a Coast Guard High Endurance Cutter (WHEC) and an FAJ Patrol Vessel. NPAFC players report the same -- no activity in the North Pacific; end result, anadromous stocks and other marine life are protected on the high seas. Additionally a People's Republic of China (CH) shiprider is currently deployed on a WHEC in the patrol area. International cooperation has been the key factor in ensuring success in both 1993 and 1994.
- 2. DONUT. The Coast Guard continues to monitor the Central Bering Sea to ensure compliance with the moratorium on fishing as agreed to by the coastal states (U.S. and Russia) and four primary fishing countries (Japan, Poland, Republic of Korea, and China). Coast Guard patrols have observed no fishing activity by either signatory or other flag states this year. The Coast Guard District Seventeen law enforcement branch is currently working with NMFS and our Headquarters staff in Washington D.C. to develop standard boarding and reporting procedures in support of the ad referendum agreement on fishing in the Central Bering Sea (Donut).
- 3. DIXON ENTRANCE. On 25 May U.S. and Canadian law enforcement officials met in Ketchikan to discuss summer fishing activity in the Dixon Entrance disputed area. The U.S.

delegation was comprised of Coast Guard, NMFS, and INS reps from Juneau and Ketchikan; the Canadian (CA) delegation was comprised of Department of Fisheries and Oceans (DFO), CA Coast Guard, and RCMP reps from Prince Rupert. This meeting is held annually and is intended to reduce the likelihood of law enforcement incidents in the disputed maritime border area during the summer salmon season. Information was exchanged on projected fisheries openings and effort, aircraft and cutter patrol schedules, and points of contact.

### B. DOMESTIC FISHERIES.

1. GOA SABLEFISH OPENING. Coast Guard cutters and aircraft patrolled the GOA enforcing the fair start and closure associated with the 18-28 May sablefish fishery, while providing a Search and Rescue(SAR) presence on the grounds. High and Medium Endurance cutters patrolled the Central and Western GOA; Group Ketchikan Patrol Boats (WPB's) worked the area Yakutat to Dixon Entrance. Kodiak C-130's and helos deployed to Cordova provided aircraft surveillance in the Central/Western GOA; Sitka helos and a falcon jet deployed from Astoria, OR provided air cover off SEAK; 84 boardings were conducted; two vessels had catches seized for major violations; a total of 11 boardings resulted in fisheries violations. The fleet continues to show high compliance with major lifesaving equipment regulations; the Coast Guard did not have to terminate the voyage of any vessels involved in the fishery.

NATIONAL MARINE FISHERIES SERVICE ENFORCEMENT REPORT FOR THE PERIOD APRIL 01, 1994 THROUGH MAY 31, 1994

During the reporting period NMFS and the Coast Guard opened a total of 168 investigations. NMFS initiated 115 investigations.

Further actions were also taken on 395 pending case during the reporting period. 118 investigations were closed as unfounded. 49 investigations were closed due to lack of enforcement resources. 96 cases were handled with written warnings. 4 cases were settled with summary settlement penalties totalling \$4,150. 37 cases were settled through voluntary abandonment with property valued at \$20,671. 48 cases were referred to NOAA General Counsel. General Counsel issued 15 Notices of Violation assessing a total of \$71,216 in penalties. An additional 28 Notices of Violation were settled by General Counsel with penalties totalling \$179,208.

### IFO PROGRAM PREPARATIONS

Two Special Agent fraud investigators have been hired for the IFQ program. Two more positions have been announced and we anticipate filling these by July 30.

The 19 Enforcement Officer positions have been announced and the actual selection process is anticipated to begin in two weeks. Basic training is scheduled to begin in October with completion scheduled in early spring.

The initial application process has begun. A review process and spot checks are being conducted. Very few problems have been identified to date and few problems are anticipated.

#### 2ND MAJOR FRAUD INVESTIGATION CONCLUDED

Pacific King Fisheries, Inc., Tsunemi Teneda, and Bruce Morgan have been sentenced in Federal District Court after a three year investigation by NMFS Special Agents. Pacific King, as a result of a plea agreement with the U.S. Attorney's office in Anchorage, agreed to pay a \$2,000,000 combined criminal/civil penalty. This fine is the largest in NMFS history. The plea related to Pacific King submitting false documents to the NMFS regarding pollock roe retention in the 1991 "A" season fishery. In addition, Tsunemi Teneda, Vice President of Pacific King, was sentenced to 11 months and 20 days in a Federal correctional facility. Following incarceration, Teneda will serve one year home confinement and will have to pay a \$15,000 fine. Morgan, master of Pacific King's trawler RESOLUTE, was sentenced to 8 months imprisonment followed by 8 months home detention. defendants plead guilty to various felony charges relating to their fishing activities in the Bering Sea off Alaska.

# FISHING CORPORATION VICE PRESIDENT RECEIVES PRISON SENTENCE AND \$15,000 FINE

Anchorage, Alaska - Acting United States Attorney Karen L. Loeffler announced that on June 3, 1994, TSUNEMI TANEDA, a Director and the Vice President of Pacific King Fisheries, Inc., was sentenced in federal court to imprisonment for 11 months 20 days followed by 12 months in home detention plus a fine of \$15,000.

The sentence was pursuant to a plea agreement in which Taneda pleaded guilty to the charge of conspiring to violate federal roe retention regulations. These regulations are designed to limit the practice of "roe stripping," in which the eggs are stripped from pollock and the remainder of the fish is discarded.

During February, 1991, Pacific King's fishing vessel Resolute illegally retained approximately 67 metric tons of pollock roe taken from the Bogoslof District of the Bering Sea. The roe had a market value of \$690,000.

Pacific King Fisheries and Bruce Morgan, captain of the Resolute, were sentenced in April pursuant to plea agreements on related charges.

The prosecutions of Pacific King, Morgan and Taneda were the result of an extensive two-year investigation by Special Agent John Kingeter of the National Marine Fisheries Service. Assistant U.S. Attorney Karen Loeffler and Special Assistant U.S. Attorney Blaine Hollis handled the prosecutions.

# FISHING CORPORATION FINED \$1.35 MILLION

Anchorage, Alaska - United States Attorney Robert C. Bundy announced that on Tuesday, Pacific King Fisheries, Inc. and Bruce Morgan, the master of Pacific King Fisheries' trawler Resolute, were sentenced in federal court, by United States District Court Judge John W. Sedwick.

The sentences were pursuant to plea agreements entered into in January. Pacific King Fisheries pled guilty to submitting false documents regarding the amount of pollock and pollock roe taken from the Bogoslov District of the Bering Sea fishery by the fishing trawler Resolute in February 1991. Pacific King also pled guilty to operating a U.S.-flagged fishing vessel in violation of vessel documentation laws. Pacific King admitted that, during the February 1991 fishing trip, the Resolute was under the command of a non-U.S. citizen and that the individual acting as the CEO of Pacific King was also not a U.S. citizen. Mr. Morgan pled guilty to submitting false documents in violation the Lacey Act. The documents concealed the illegal retention of roe by the vessel during the February 1991 fishing trip.

Judge Sedwick sentenced Pacific King to pay a fine of \$1,350,000, concurrently on both counts (Pacific King also paid a \$650,000 civil settlement to the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) as part of its plea agreement). Bruce Morgan was sentenced to imprisonment for eight months, followed by an additional eight months in home detention.

Tsunemi Taneda, the vice president and a member of the board of Pacific King, will be sentenced by Judge Sedwick on June 3, 1994.
