Short-tailed Albatross

The 15 short-tailed albatross chicks translocated from Torishima Island to Mukojima Island in Japan have all fledged and have all survived past the "drifting" phase of their post-fledging dispersal. Tagged parentally-reared chicks from Torishima experienced some apparent mortality during this drifting phase. Thus far, 25 of 25 chicks moved from Torishima to Mukojima have been successfully hand-reared and all have successfully fledged. This year, seven of the 15 translocated chicks and 7 parentally-reared chicks from Torishima are carrying PTT backpacks. This project has thus far been supported by the North Pacific Research Board, the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the Japan Ministry of the Environment, Yamashina Institute of Japan, Japan's Asahi News Corporation, the Sapporo Beer Company, the Suntory Fund (also a producer of fine albatross-friendly fermented beverages) and the Mitsui Fund. This translocation project is the highest priority recovery task as identified by the Short-tailed Albatross Recovery Team. The objective is to continue the translocation operation for an additional 3 years, although funding for the continuation of this project is not yet fully secured.

Walrus

The walrus/fisheries issue in Bristol Bay is not on the agenda for this meeting; it will come back up at the October meeting. We are working with Bill on the discussion paper requested at the last council meeting on this issue. Walrus are just starting to use the Bristol Bay haulouts. Round Island numbers are low (29-45 walrus for 5/14 -5/17). Togiak Refuge flew a survey on May15. No walrus were reported at Hageimeister, Cape Pierce or Newenham. Walrus number should begin to ramp up as the ice recedes farther north.

The Service recently settled with the Center for Biological Diversity on the following timeline for evaluating walrus under the ESA. A 90 day finding is due out by September 10, 2009. If the Service makes a positive 90-day finding, then a status evaluation and listing recommendation is due out in September 2010.

Sea Otters

The sea ofter critical habitat public comment period was reopened on May 8 through July 1. We will release the Draft Economic Analysis of sea ofter critical habitat next month. We will also hold a public hearing on June 18 at the Z. J. Loussac library in Anchorage.

The Southwest Alaska Sea Otter Recovery Team will submit a draft plan for a full editorial review in early June. The Service hopes to have a draft plan available for public review and comment in the Fall. The economic analysis for proposed Sea Otter Critical Habitat will be available to the public soon.

Endangered and Threatened Wildlife and Plants; Designation of Critical Habitet for the Southwest Alaska Distinct Population Segment of the Northern Sea Otter (Enhydra lutris kenvoni)

AGENCY: Fish and Wildlife Service. Interior.

ACTION: Proposed rule; reopening of public comment period: notice of public hearing.

SUMMARY: We, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service), announce the reopening of the public comment period on our proposal to designate critical habitat for the southwest Alaska Distinct Population Segment (DPS) of the northern sea otter (Enhydra lutris ken you) under the Endangered Species Act of 1973, as amended (Act), This action will provide all interested parties with an additional opportunity to submit written comments on our December 16, 2006, proposed rule to designate approximately 15, 225 square kilometers (km²) (5, 679 square miles (mi2)) as critical habitat.

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION:

Background

On December 16, 2008, we published a proposed rule to designate approximately 15.225 square kilometers (km²) (5.879 square miles (mi²)) as critical habitat for the southwest Alaska DPS of the northern sea otter (73 FR 26454). We accepted public comments on this proposed rule for 60 days. ending on February 17, 2009. During that period, we received 15 submissions from various individuals, communities, and creativities. Becomigation but the and organizations. Recognizing that the original public comment period partially overlapped with the holiday season, we are reopening the public comment period to provide additional time for concerned individuals to provide input on the proposed designation.

We intend that any final action resulting from this proposal will be as accurate and as effective as possible.

Therefore, we request comments or suggestions on this proposed rule. We particularly seek comments concerning:

(1) The reasons why we should or should not designate habitat as "critical habitat" under section 4 of the Act (16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.), including whether there are threats to the species from human activity, the degree of which can be expected to increase due to the designation, and whether the benefit of designation would outweigh threats to the species caused by the designation, such that the designation of critical habitat is prudent.

(2) Specific information on:

 The amount and distribution of habitat of the southwest Alaska DPS of the northern sea ofter.

 What areas occupied at the time of listing and that contain features essential for the conservation of the species we should include in the designation and why, and

 What areas not occupied at the time of listing are essential to the conservation of the species and why.

(3) Land use designations and current or planned activities in the subject areas and their possible impacts on proposed critical habitat.

(4) Any foreseeable economic, national security, or other potential impacts resulting from the proposed designation and, in particular, any impacts on small entities, and the benefits of including or excluding areas that exhibit these impacts.

(5) Any areas that might be appropriate for exclusion from the final designation under section 4(b)(2) of the Act.

(6) Special management considerations or protections that the proposed critical habitat may require.

(7) Whether we could improve or modify our approach to designating critical habitat in any way to provide for greater public participation and understanding, or to better accommodate public concerns and comments.

We are also in the process of preparing a draft Economic Analysis of the proposed critical habitat designation, which will be made available for public review and comment. We will publish a separate Notice of Availability for the draft Economic Analysis.

Public Comments Solicited

We will accept written comments and information we receive on or before July 1, 2009. You may submit comments and materials concerning the proposed rule by one of the methods listed in the ADDRESSES section.

If you submit a comment via http:// www.regulations.gov. your entire comment-including your personal identifying information—will be posted on the Web site. If your submission is made via a hardcopy that includes personal identifying information, you may request at the top of your document that we withhold this information from public review. However, we cannot guarantee that we will be able to do so. We will post all hardcopy comments on http://www.regulations.gov. Comments previously submitted on the December 16, 2008 proposed rule (73 FR 76454) need not be resubmitted, as they have been incorporated into the public record and will be fully considered in preparation of the final rule. Comments submitted during this reopened comment period also will be incorporated into the public record and will be fully considered in the final rule.

Electronic Filing of Trade Documents for Fishery Products

AGENCY: National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS), National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), Commerce.

ACTION: Advance notice of proposed rulemaking; request for comments.

SUMMARY: NMFS issues this advance notice of proposed rulemaking to announce that it is revising procedures to file import and export documentation for certain fishery products to meet requirements of the SAFE Port Act of 2006. the Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act. other applicable statutes, and obligations that arise from U.S. participation in regional fishery management organizations. Specifically, NMFS intends to integrate the collection of trade documentation within the government—wide International Trade Data System and require electronic information collection through the automated internet portal maintained by the United States Customs and Border Protection. NMFS is seeking advance public comment on the feasibility of electronic reporting by parties involved in an import or export transaction for applicable seafood products. DATES: Written comments must be received by August 6, 2009.
