Herein I repeat (except for my mailing address and phone number) what I submitted through your web site.

I used to commercial fish, primarily out of Kodiak, Alaska. I chartered a foundation, the Sails, Oars, Arms Restitution Trust, whose main thrust is to press for a no-fuel halibut longline fishery. The question, I believe, to ask the NMFS and the related Council (ours is the North Pacific Fishery Management Council) what the definition of "efficient" (critical, in the original Federal Register language) could possibly be in an industry that needs inefficiency (fish have to evade/escape). We wish to buy IFQ's and have their management be for no-fuel harvest (as was done early-on in the halibut fishery).

I am now a student at the University of Alaska Anchorage (buried in homework). I contested the IRS (book: The Great Income Tax Hoax, by Irwin Schiff), left fishing, seriously injured myself, but I hope to address the upcoming Council meeting here in Anchorage in a few days, and wish to point to your organization as one to follow as we transition away from the monopoly game in fisheries, and to something more rational for entry-level operations/fishers and communities.
