Dear Chairman Olson,

We are writing to let you know of our concerns regarding the Council's proposed Gulf of Alaska Chinook Salmon Bycatch measures for our pollock fishery.

We have reviewed the Advisory Panel minutes from your January, 2011 meeting, we strongly support the AP's suggestion that the Council slow this process down.

If the Council proceeds on this super fast track, we will be unable to attend either of the next two meetings where this issue will be refined and finalized. The June meeting in Nome occurs during our June salmon fishery, and the October meeting in Dutch Harbor occurs during our fall pollock season. We cannot afford to give up fishing time to participate in these meetings.

The Council went through a full Environmental Impact Statement process when adopting the Chinook bycatch rules for the Bering Sea pollock fishery. We understand that that process took more than 3 years. During that time the Bering Sea pollock fleet was able to work together to propose a program that would work for them. We believe that the Bering Sea pollock fishermen deserved this time to work through the process, and we believe that we deserve the same opportunity.

No one was more surprised than we were after the 2010 C and D season chinook bycatch numbers were announced. We continue to believe that in the Western Gulf, those numbers were inflated because the rate established by observers on the 3 vessels that had observer coverage does not reflect the numbers that were reported on our fish tickets. After talking to Martin Llofled during the December, 2010 meeting we finally began to understand how those numbers were derived, and now we would like to find a way to insure that future numbers are accurate.

We completely support requiring all Western Gulf pollock fishermen to retain all their salmon. During the December, 2010 meeting we discussed the idea of putting together a pilot observer program that would allow NMFS to develop faith in the numbers that are put on our fish tickets. As we discussed funding a program like this, the Mayor and Assembly were reluctant because according to the schedule the Council has outlined, final action would be taken before NMFS and the Council could see the results of a pilot program. We are currently waiting for a proposal from Archipelago to put Electronic Monitoring Equipment on 5 vessels in the C and D season.

This is extremely important to us, because if the Council adopts a hard cap for chinook bycatch we must certain that these salmon are accurately counted.

We are also very concerned about the proposed requirement for mandatory cooperatives. None of us has any experience with coops and we have no idea how such a coop would even work out here. We don't believe that there will be enough time between now and when you have scheduled final action for us to learn how to put such coops together.

While we understand why the Council believes that dealing with Chinook bycatch is important, we can't believe that the Council would rush us into a complex set of regulations without any opportunity for us to participate in your process. Most local fishermen are unfamiliar with the Council and those that have been to meetings find it difficult and somewhat intimidating.

Finally, last year's Chinook bycatch was not a normal event here. There is no trend to predict that it will happen again. Please consider setting up outreach meetings in King Cove and Sand Point

in order to provide us with the kind of efforts that were made during the Bering Sea chinook process. And allow those of us in the Western Gulf of Alaska the kind of time an issue like this deserves. It seems like the folks out in the Bering Sea worked things out in an orderly way, and we'd like to do that too.

Dear Chairman Olson,

The Aleutians East Borough supports local pollock fishermen's request that the Council take more time to develop regulations that will address Chinook salmon bycatch in the Gulf of Alaska pollock fishery.

These regulations will impact fishermen in King Cove and Sand Point who operate small pollock trawlers and provide winter employment and revenue to their communities and the Aleutians East Borough.

These fishermen and the Aleutians East Borough understand the need to set up a program that effectively monitors and curbs Chinook salmon bycatch. However, we support the fishermen's desire to see these regulations proceed with adequate involvement of those who will be most affected.


Last year's bycatch caught everyone by surprise. It was extremely unusual, and something we all hope will never happen again. Local fishermen were aware that they had gained an unwanted spot light and began talking about how to address this problem. They asked the Council to require retention of all salmon in the pollock fishery to insure that every salmon is counted.

After the Council's December meeting, the fishermen discussed putting together a pilot program to carry observers. Our fishermen remain convinced that the current method of extrapolating bycatch numbers from a few larger vessels with observer significantly over estimates the numbers, and they believe that the more NMFS understands their fishery the more NMFS will be comfortable relying on the numbers recorded on fish tickets. However, given the shortened time frame for Council action they gave up this idea since the data and information gained from such a program would not be available before the Council took final action.

Our pollock fleet consists of limit seiners which have been modified to allow trawling. They have no experience with carrying observers or employing electronic monitoring. Information gained from a pilot program would have provided valuable information that would have helped the fleet and NMFS decide what kind of regulations would provide the best protection for salmon while insuring that the pollock fishery continues.

Local fishermen believe that they deserve the same opportunity that the BSAI pollock fleet had to craft a program that will be appropriate for their fishery, and the Aleutians East Borough supports them in this request.

Dear Chairman Olson,

The Ketchikan Guided Sport Fish Assoc. (KGSA) represents over 40 members in the Ketchikan area. Our membership ranges from charter fishermen and lodges to B&B owners, hotels and local sportsmen and subsistence users. We urge the North Pacific Fishery Management Council to adopt measures to reduce chinook salmon bycatch in Gulf of Alaska pollock trawl fisheries.


The Magnuson-Stevens Act, National Standards require balancing optimum yield with minimizing bycatch and minimizing adverse impacts to fishery dependent communities. Chinook salmon bycatch taken incidentally in GOA pollock fisheries is a major concern, accounting for the greatest proportion of chinook salmon taken in GOA groundfish fisheries.

In 2010, the incidence of observed chinook bycatch in the directed fishery reached unprecedented levels, which are unacceptably high. To date there are no control measures to reduce chinook bycatch. This results in a lack of incentive for the trawl fleet to alter their behavior to reduce this waste.

We favor a Prohibited Species Cap (PSC) limit of 15,000 Chinook salmon for the Gulf of Alaska. This amount represents a reasonable cap which will provide immediate incentive to reduce chinook salmon bycatch. We also recommend a mandatory cooperative, which will provide the fleet with mechanisms to achieve this goal. We also support expanded observer coverage for trawl vessels, which currently lack observers to provide additional data necessary for sound management decisions.

The chinook salmon in the Gulf of Alaska is an important part of what defines our Alaskan communities and economy. This level of bycatch on migrating chinook salmon is unacceptable and puts undue hardship on all commercial, recreational, personal use, and subsistence harvesters from California to Alaska.

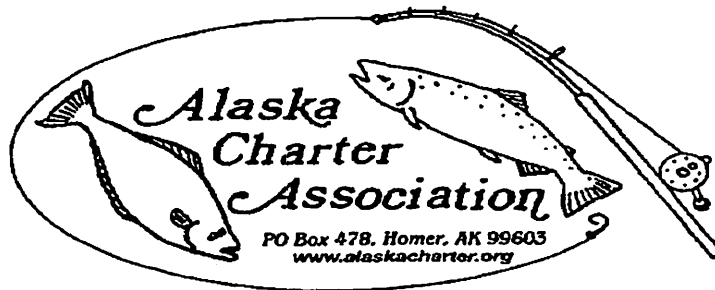

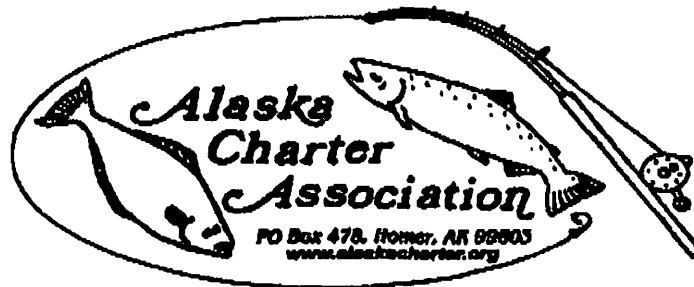

Dear Ms. Lindeman:

I am writing on behalf of a group of vessel owners operating out of Sand Point, Alaska, regarding the suite of alternatives being considered by the North Pacific Fishery Management Council to address chinook salmon bycatch in the Gulf of Alaska (GOA) pollock fishery. The owners have already communicated their concerns to the Council directly, and this letter is intended to supplement theirs.

The owners agree with the importance of addressing the issue of chinook bycatch in their pollock fishery. Data presented to the Council indicate that in 2010, the bycatch level in Pollock trawl fishery exceeded 40,000 fish, most of which were taken during one month in the western GOA. Although the owners have some questions about the accuracy of these data, and believe that this bycatch may well have been an anomaly, not a trend, they recognize the importance of the Council taking a proactive approach to examining this issue and determining what management measures should be implemented to control their bycatch of chinook salmon.

The owners do have concerns, however, regarding the schedule the Council has established for developing an amendment. As indicated in the final Council motion on this agenda item at the February 2011 meeting, and as reflected in the Council's newsletter from that meeting, the Council anticipates selecting a preliminary preferred alternative at its April meeting and then taking final action at its meeting in June, in Nome. This fast track schedule poses significant problems for the owners and substantially limits their ability to have a meaningful role in the decision-making process. In particular, consideration of this topic at the June meeting will effectively exclude the owners as they also participate in the South Unimak and Shumagin Islands June salmon fishery, a mainstay of the Alaska Peninsula fishing economy. The workplan presented to the Council on this subject at the February meeting (agenda item c-3(b)(1)) recognizes


that the ability to conduct outreach under this schedule is very limited. This is contrary to the Council's commitment to stakeholder involvement described in section 3.10 of the Council's Statement of Organization, Practices and Procedures, and in sharp contrast to the extensive outreach process the Council undertook in relation to chinook salmon bycatch in the Bering Sea trawl fisheries.

The inclusion of alternatives for mandatory cooperatives is also problematic for consideration on such a compressed schedule. Unlike the Bering Sea pollock fishery, whose participants had several years working in a cooperative structure, the GOA pollock fishery does not have a history of cooperatives. The owners thus have very limited experience to draw upon in commenting on the co-op alternatives and trying to understand how they would work in the GOA. The discussion paper on cooperatives presented to the Council (agenda item c-3(b)(2)) highlights the potential difficulties of an amendment package that includes both a hard cap and cooperatives, and how this could significantly increase the time needed to develop this action.

As stated in the workplan, the Council's timeline for taking action on this issue assumes that an EA will be the appropriate NEPA document and that the preferred alternative would have to support a finding of no significant impact (FONSI). That assumption is questionable considering the requirements of NMFS Policy Directive 30-124-01 (July 22, 2005). The agency determined that an EIS was required for adoption of an amendment to address chinook salmon bycatch in the Bering Sea, and will likely also be required for a similar amendment package in the GOA.

The owners emphasize that they are committed to working with the Council to control chinook salmon bycatch in their pollock fishery, but simply do not see how they can effectively provide meaningful input on this issue under the current, fast track schedule. Please encourage the Council to consider the impact of this schedule on the stakeholders who stand to be most affected by this action. Thank you.

WHEREAS, salmon bycatch measures have not yet been implemented in the Gulf of Alaska (GOA) groundfish fisheries; and

WHEREAS, the Chinook salmon is critically important to the Kenai, Kasilof, and Anchor River economies; and

WHEREAS, the Chinook salmon is an integral part of the Cook Inlet eco-system; and

WHEREAS, salmon of all varieties play a key role in the economy of the Kenai Peninsula Borough; and

WHEREAS, sport fishing guides and charters, commercial set netters and drift fishers, and personal use and subsistence fishers all suffer adverse impacts from poor Chinook salmon stocks; and

WHEREAS, many agencies and organizations are dedicated to the health and survival of the Chinook salmon, the official state fish of Alaska;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE ASSEMBLY OF THE KENAI PENINSULA BOROUGH;



SECTION 3. That copies of this Resolution be provided to Governor Sean Parnell and all members of the North Pacific Fisheries Management Council.



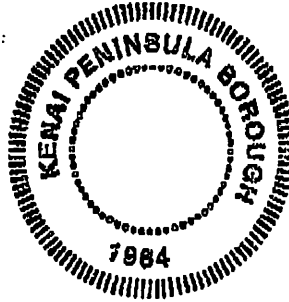

Dear Chairman Olson,

World Wildlife Fund (WWF) commends the North Pacific Fishery Management Council for continuing to fast track fishery management measures that would reduce Chinook (*Oncorhynchus tshawytscha*) salmon bycatch in Gulf of Alaska (GOA) pollock (*Theragra chalcogramma*) trawl fisheries. Chinook salmon is an important species in the Alaska ecosystem, a valuable food source for Alaskan residents, and a significant contributor to the economy. To allow for the continued loss of this remarkable species as bycatch is unacceptable. When seafood consumers see the Marine Stewardship Council (MSC) label on GOA Pollock products -- a label that carries a message of sustainability and stewardship -- they expect that fisheries managers are doing all they can to reduce wasteful bycatch of other species in the pollock fishery. To ensure the standards of the MSC continue to be met, the GOA Pollock fishery must take immediate action to reduce the number of Chinook salmon caught and killed in their fishery.

The National Marine Fisheries Service has estimated that over 43,000 Chinook salmon were discarded in the 2010 GOA Pollock fishery, a number that exceeds by orders of magnitude the 2009 level of 2,564 Chinook taken in the same fishery. As noted in the Council problem statement in the Environmental Assessment of Chinook Salmon Bycatch in the Gulf of Alaska Pollock Fishery of March 20, 2011, levels of Chinook bycatch were "unacceptably high" in 2010; there are no salmon-specific bycatch control measures currently in place; and there is evidence that some of the Chinook taken as bycatch are from west coast stocks that are protected on the Endangered Species Act list. WWF urges the Council to move forward on this high priority issue so that the National Marine Fisheries Service can implement bycatch control measures in time for the 2012 Pollock A Season.

WWF supports the selection of Alternative 2: *Establish a Chinook salmon Prohibited Species Catch (PSC) limit for the directed pollock fishery (hard cap, by regulatory area) and increase observer coverage on vessels under 60 feet.* Additionally, for Component 1 under Alternative 2, WWF recommends the lowest PSC hard cap option: 15,000 Chinook salmon. This number will provide an immediate incentive to the directed Pollock fishery to reduce Chinook salmon

bycatch, may allow additional opportunities to harvest Chinook salmon by commercial, recreational and subsistence users, and will allow for additional Chinook to remain in the GOA marine and aquatic ecosystems.

It will be important to have accurate counts of Chinook bycatch in order to truly reduce the number of salmon caught and wasted by the GOA pollock fishery. Therefore, WWF supports implementing Component 2 under Alternative 2: *increased observer coverage on vessels under 60 feet in the GOA directed Pollock fishery until the observer program re-structuring regulations are implemented*. Increasing observer coverage from zero to 30 percent on the smaller sized vessels will allow for more accurate extrapolation estimates of salmon bycatch in this fishery. Full retention of salmon bycatch will also contribute to greater accuracy of bycatch estimates as well as accountability by the cooperatives.

While WWF first and foremost recommends the adoption of Alternative 2, we also support the concurrent selection of Alternative 3: *require membership in a mandatory salmon bycatch control cooperative in order to fish in the directed pollock fishery*. Bycatch control cooperatives would allow the GOA Pollock fleet to be responsive to a reduced Chinook salmon PSC limit while retaining their current fleet structures, harvest timing, and relationships within the Western and Central regulatory areas. However, Alternative 3 should not be implemented without Alternative 2.

It is WWF's view that salmon bycatch in the GOA Pollock fishery must be reduced. Alaskans cannot afford to allow Chinook salmon to be incidentally caught and discarded in the groundfish fishery at the unprecedented high bycatch levels reached in 2010. Salmon are a culturally, economically, and biologically key component to life in Alaska. Therefore, the Council should take immediate action to implement the tools it has at hand to reign in the problem: a hard cap of no more than 15,000 Chinook salmon per year GOA-wide to ensure Chinook return to their spawning grounds year after year.

Dear Chairman Olson,

Alaska Marine Conservation Council is dedicated to protecting the long-term health of Alaska's oceans and sustaining the working waterfronts of our coastal communities. Our members include fishermen, subsistence harvesters, marine scientists, small business owners and families. Our ways of life, livelihoods and local economies depend on sustainable fishing practices and productive oceans. The Gulf of Alaska provides a plethora of commercial, sport and subsistence fisheries which are revered world-wide.

We support the North Pacific Fishery Management Council moving forward with measures to set a prohibited species catch (PSC) limit on Chinook salmon in the Central and Western Gulf of Alaska (GOA) for the directed pollock fishery. We encourage maintaining the expedited timeframe in keeping this action as a high priority. We believe this action is long overdue as there have been no measures implemented to reduce and/or control Chinook or other salmon species bycatch in GOA groundfish fisheries. The cumulative impacts on Chinook salmon stocks must be considered. As stated in the initial review draft:

Bycatch of salmon in the GOA pollock fishery reduces the common property pool of the salmon resource. Bycatch removals may reduce the targeted subsistence, commercial, personal use, and sport catch of Chinook salmon and thereby the welfare (e.g., revenue, utility) of salmon harvesters who have recognized salmon access privileges (e.g., Alaska Limited Entry Permits) and established priority harvesting rights and historical dependence (e.g., subsistence). Chinook removals may, over time, reduce the value of Chinook salmon access privileges as well as reducing the economic, social and cultural benefits for subsistence and other non-commercial users of this resource.

("Chinook Salmon Bycatch in the Gulf of Alaska Pollock Fishery," pp. 17-18)

In 2010, Kodiak Island Chinook salmon escapement was well below the previous 10-year average. Returns to the Karluk River did not meet the lower escapement goals despite closures to the subsistence, sport and commercial fisheries. At a time when a significant



number of river systems are struggling with escapement goals, it is time to establish a conservative bycatch cap.

We support a cap of 15,000 Chinook and the requirement of membership in a mandatory salmon bycatch control cooperative in order to fish in the directed pollock fishery.

The cooperative agreement structure would be required to retain all salmon bycatch for increased biological sampling, include vessel reporting hotspots, a system of information sharing, a monitoring program and a set of contractual penalties for failure to comply. The cooperative structure must be designed to facilitate minimizing Chinook bycatch. The historic average bycatch amount is nearly 19,000 Chinook for the Central and Western GOA from 2003-2010. Management measures should limit Chinook bycatch to less than the average. This objective can be met with the option for a 15,000 Chinook bycatch cap.

The analysis estimates that a 15,000 Chinook cap will result in significant loss of revenue to the pollock fleet and processing plants. However, this assumes that fishing practices will not change. The purpose of the bycatch coop is to create new tools to improve success at avoiding bycatch. As stated in the problem statement, "Management measures are necessary to provide immediate incentive for the GOA pollock fleet to be responsive to the Council's objective to reduce Chinook salmon PSC."

We are concerned about the low returns of Chinook salmon to numerous river systems and the consequences that has for the directed salmon fisheries and our communities. We urge the Council and the pollock industry to share the responsibility for conserving our Chinook stocks. The combination of a bycatch cap and a coop holds promise for achieving important Chinook conservation benefits while providing practical means for the pollock fleet to comply.

Dear Chairman Olson, Dr. Balsiger, and Council Members:

The unmanaged bycatch of Chinook salmon in the Gulf of Alaska groundfish fisheries is a grave problem that warrants prompt action by the North Pacific Fishery Management Council and National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS). We have learned from past experience that fixed-area and voluntary closures do not adequately reduce salmon bycatch, and, therefore, a Prohibited Species Catch (PSC) hard cap limit must be enacted. At this April 2011 meeting, the Council should select a preliminary preferred alternative that would allow no more than 15,000 Chinook salmon to be taken as bycatch in the Gulf of Alaska pollock fisheries. The Council also should consider an alternative that reduces or eliminates pollock fishing in October, when the majority of Chinook bycatch occurs.

Chinook salmon (*Oncorhynchus tshawytscha*) are the largest and rarest of the Pacific salmon species. Particularly in Alaska, where wild salmon are the lifeblood of commercial, sport, and subsistence fisheries, Chinook are revered. Salmon generate more jobs than any other fishery in Alaska,¹ and Alaska's state fish is, to no surprise, the Chinook salmon.

Chinook salmon must make epic offshore migrations into the Gulf of Alaska before returning to their natal streams in Alaska, Canada, and the Pacific Northwest. Along the way, they encounter a gauntlet of threats, including the the Gulf of Alaska pollock fishery. Several stocks of Chinook, including some of those caught as bycatch in the Gulf of Alaska, are protected under the Endangered Species Act. In 2004, over \$160 million taxpayer dollars were spent on the recovery of endangered Chinook salmon stocks from the Pacific Northwest.

Yet to date, no effort has been made to minimize the effects on those salmon caused by the Gulf of Alaska groundfish fisheries. Last year 54,178 Chinook salmon were killed as bycatch by the Gulf of Alaska groundfish fisheries.² This bycatch exceeded the limit allowed by the 2007 incidental take statement, which evaluated bycatch of only 40,000 fish. We understand that

NMFS, as required by the Endangered Species Act, reinitiated Section 7 consultation in November 2010 to analyze the impacts of the Gulf of Alaska groundfish fisheries on endangered salmon. NMFS and the vessels fishing for pollock risk violating the Endangered Species Act if the fishery is allowed to proceed in 2011 before the reinitiated consultation process is completed.

In addition to the Endangered Species Act, the unmanaged bycatch of Chinook salmon in the Gulf of Alaska pollock fishery calls into significant question NMFS's compliance with the Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act (MSA), the Pacific Salmon Treaty, and the Convention for the Conservation of Anadromous Stocks in the North Pacific Ocean. It is time now to implement a meaningful Chinook salmon bycatch cap for the Gulf of Alaska groundfish fisheries. A PSC hard cap for Chinook salmon must be enacted to reduce the overall number of salmon taken as bycatch in the Gulf of Alaska pollock fishery.

To signal to those who care about salmon that a meaningful bycatch cap would be in place by 2012, the Council should select a preliminary preferred alternative that would establish a hard cap of no more than 15,000 Chinook salmon. This cap is more than reasonable and is fair; in context, this would allocate to the pollock fishery more Chinook than last year's commercial harvest of Chinook in the Kodiak region, the combined Kodiak and Cook Inlet sport harvest of Chinook, or the Bristol Bay subsistence harvest of Chinook.

In addition, the draft EA/RIR/IRFA discloses that there is not enough information to address some of the key questions relating to salmon abundance in the ocean, the status of individual salmon stocks, and the proportion of individual salmon stocks being killed as bycatch. Since NMFS is unable to provide this information, the Council must be conservative in the amount of Chinook salmon they allow to be taken by the pollock fishery in the Gulf of Alaska.

We should expect that through innovations in fishing gear and fishing techniques, research on salmon behavior and habitat, and improvements in management we could further reduce salmon bycatch on a trajectory toward zero. The Chinook bycatch cap should be reviewed annually and reduced accordingly. Such a review would include whether escapement goals were met, whether subsistence and commercial salmon needs were satisfied, updates on the stock-of-origin of the bycatch, and new insights in ocean research.


In addition to the hard cap, the Council should consider an alternative that reduces or eliminates the late pollock fishing season in October, when the majority of Chinook bycatch occurs.

Further, previous consultation processes have not addressed cumulative impacts on Chinook stocks being caught as bycatch both in the lower 48 whiting fishery and Alaskan groundfish fisheries. Analyses for the whiting fishery have not mentioned potential effects from bycatch in Alaskan trawl fisheries, and analyses for the Alaskan groundfish fisheries have not mentioned impacts from lower 48 trawl fishing. In addition, while the problems inherent in rebuilding these critically important Oregon and Washington stocks are caused in large part by escapement-return failures, they certainly may be exacerbated by bycatch in groundfish fisheries in both the Pacific and North Pacific. These combined effects on salmon stocks are having effects not just in the lower 48 and Alaska, but also internationally. NMFS must address these issues in its renewed consultation process.

Finally, funding should be secured for comprehensive salmon management and research, including identification of the stock-of-origin and age of every salmon caught as bycatch. The Council should investigate funding options for this program, including funds from exercising the authority to level fines pursuant to MSA §313(g) and funds from proceeds generated by allocations of fish associated with exempted or experimental fishing permits.

By reducing and minimizing wasteful bycatch, more salmon will survive to spawn in the rivers and streams of Alaska, the Pacific Northwest, and Canada. We will continue to work with you and support your efforts on this issue.

We, the undersigned, urge the North Pacific Fishery Management Council to continue to expedite measures to reduce Chinook salmon bycatch in Gulf of Alaska pollock trawl fisheries.

In 2010, the incidence of observed Chinook bycatch in the directed fishery reached unprecedented levels which were unacceptably high. To date there are no control measures to reduce Chinook bycatch. This results in a lack of incentive for the trawl fleet to alter their behavior to reduce this waste.

We favor a Prohibited Species Catch (PSC) limit of 15,000 Chinook salmon for the Gulf of Alaska. This amount represents a reasonable cap which will provide immediate incentive to reduce Chinook salmon bycatch. We also recommend a mandatory cooperative, which will provide the responsible fleet mechanisms to achieve the goal. We support expanded observer coverage for trawl vessels which currently carry no observers to provide additional data necessary to base sound management decisions.

The salmon resource in the Gulf of Alaska is an important part of what defines our community and economy. This level of bycatch is unacceptable and puts undue hardship on Alaska commercial, sport, recreational, personal use, and subsistence harvesters.
