Joint Ventures

NMFS has prepared amendments to 50 CFR Part 602, Proposed Guidelines for Development of Fishery Management Plans. The amendments presently are under in-house review prior to being published in the <u>Federal Register</u> for a 30-day public comment period. The amendments are intended to implement provisions of P.L. 95-354 which amended the Fishery Conservation and Management Act of 1976 to require that in the case of any application for a permit by a foreign vessel which proposes to receive U.S. harvested fish from vessels of the United States, the Secretary of Commerce may approve the application unless the Secretary determines that U.S. fish processors have adequate capacity, and will utilize such capacity, to process all U.S. harvested fish from the fishery concerned. Specifically, the amendments propose to set forth the information which will be required in all FMP's regarding the capacity and extent to which U.S. fish processors, on an annual basis, will process fish covered by fishery management plans.

Amendments to 50 CFR 611, Foreign Fishing Regulations, required to implement certain provisions of P.L. 95-354 related to foreign fishing will be included in the proposed 1979 amendments of 50 CFR 611 which will be published soon.

Permits issued to foreign vessels to receive U.S. harvested Pacific hake and Alaska pollock at sea in 1978 are under review for consistency with provisions of the FCMA, as amended. The findings will be published in the <u>Federal Register</u> for public comment in October 1978.

Foreign Fee Technical Workshop

A report of the Foreign Fee Technical Workshop, held June 22-23, 1978, is available from the International Fisheries Development and Services Division, Office of International Fisheries Affairs, NMFS, Washington, D.C. 20235. A limited number of copies of papers presented at this workshop are also available. Topics included are:

- -- Fishing fees in foreign countries
- --Bycatch fees
- -- Fees for non-fishery natural resources
- -- Foreign demand for U.S. fish stocks
- -- Costs for foreign activities relating to FCMA
- --Bases for levying foreign fishing fees

NMFS will be making further studies to determine the guidelines for the foreign fee schedule in 1980 and beyond.

Congressional Activities

Bills Introduced

Fishery Conservation and Management Act (FCMA) Amendments of 1978
(S. 3483, Hathaway/Mass.; 9/6/78). To amend the FCMA of 1976 in order to assist and protect the domestic fishing industry.

In remarks at the time of introduction, Senator Hathaway stated that his amendments would (1) increase the authority of the Regional Fishery Management Councils over management plans and limit the role of the Commerce Department to that of oversight, (2) make one of the specific purposes of the Act the development of the fishery industry and promotion of the conversion of the industry from overutilized species to underutilized stock, and (3) limit the use of a total ban on fishing as a management tool of last resort only so that such a ban could be implemented only upon finding by both the Council and the Commerce Department that there is an imminent threat to a fishery resource without such a ban.

Committee and Floor Action

Aquaculture (H.R. 9370). On September 12, 1978, the Senate passed H.R. 9370, amended to contain language of S. 3408. This version gives the lead to the Office of Science and Technology Policy rather than to the Department of Commerce as in the House-passed version. House and Senate staffers will try to work out the differences to avert a formal conference.

Endangered Species Act Amendment (ESA) (H.R. 14104). Congressman Leggett (California) introduced H.R. 14104 on September 18, 1978. It replaced H.R. 13807. On September 25, the Committee on Merchant Marine and Fisheries reported H.R. 14104, with amendments (H. Rpt. 95-1625). Briefly, the reported version of H.R. 14104 would:

- extend the ESA appropriation authorizations for the Departments of the Interior and Commerce through fiscal year 1981;
- (2) revise the notice procedure in the Act to improve public notice of proposals to list species as endangered or threatened and designate critical habitat;
- (3) require public hearings in areas affected by a designation of critical habitat;
- (4) establish a procedure whereby Federal agencies can receive exemptions from the requirements of the Act through a six member cabinet level committee;
- (5) review the penalty provisions of the Act by reducing to \$500 the strict liability penalty for anyone except importers and

exporters; make criminal violations of the Act a general rather than a specific intent crime, and subject importers and exporters of fish and wildlife and plants to strict liability penalties of up to \$10,000; and

(6) require a review of the endangered species list at least once every five years.

Fish and Wildlife Act Amendment/Law Enforcement (H.R. 2329). The Senate passed H.R. 2329, with amendments, on September 25, 1978. The House disagreed with the amendments and appointed conferees on September 29, 1978.

Enactments

Outer Continental Shelf Lands Act Amendment (S. 9). To establish a policy for the management of oil and natural gas in the Outer Continental Shelf (includes a Fishermen's Contingency Fund). Approved September 18, 1978 (Public Law 95-372).

Fishermen's Protective Act Amendments (FPA) (H.R. 10878). To extend until October 1, 1981, the voluntary insurance program (Section 7) provided by the FPA and to amend the Section 10 program to broaden its coverage. Approved September 18, 1978 (Public Law 95-376).

COUNCIL REPORTS

New England Council

- o The Council held its meeting in Peabody, Massachusetts, on September 20-21, 1978.
- o Mr. Edward MacLeod resigned from the Council at the end of the month. He had served as the second Chairman of the Council.
- o Mr. G. Paul Draheim joined the Council as Deputy Executive Director, Mrs. Judy Ring was employed as Secretary, and Mrs. Pamela Graham joined the staff as part-time bookkeeper.
- o The Council transmitted the final version of the herring management plan to the Secretary (DOC) and requested implementation as soon as possible. The staff drafted herring regulations to implement the plan.
- o The Council adopted management objectives for ocean perch and for pollock. It reviewed management objectives for red crab for further consideration at its next meeting.
- o It submitted revised groundfish trip limitations for incorporation in the groundfish management plan.
- o The Scientific and Statistical Committee (SSC) met in Woods Hole, Massachusetts, on September 26 to review the scallop research contractual proposal, and the economic and biological data needs for the new groundfish management plan.
- o The Council recommended denial of additional Japanese longline fishing permit applications on the grounds of high and wasteful mortality of tuna, unauthorized fishing for billfish, and high mortality of billfish.
- o The Council continued to review specific problems of the groundfish fishery with the intent of incorporating solutions into the groundfish plan.
- o The staff met with NMFS personnel to coordinate red crab plan preparation, agree upon silver hake research needs, coordinate multi-species management planning, and economic and biological data needs and models for development of the groundfish management plan.

Mid-Atlantic Council

The Council met in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, on September 12-14, 1978. During the meeting the Council took the following action:

- o Created a special committee to consider the matter of surf clam vessel licenses.
- o Requested that the Secretary of Commerce extend the surf clam/ocean quahog FMP through calendar year 1979 specifying that the optimum yield for calendar year 1979 remain the same as those for calendar year 1978.
- o Recommended that the Secretary of Commerce take necessary action to reduce trip limitations in the groundfish fishery to the lowest possible level with the beginning of the new fishing year to assure that the fishery does not close prior to mid-Atlantic fishers having an opportunity to participate in the fishery and suggested that if that is not possible, the fishing year begin on November 15.
- o Considered the question of a workshop on the environment of the mid-Atlantic bight relative to fisheries and requested that the Council's Environmental Committee prepare a plan and budget for such a workshop.
- o Reviewed the proposed Gear Conflict Regulations and agreed that appropriate action should be taken to implement them as soon as possible.
- o Endorsed the proposed Agreement for Multilateral Cooperation in the Northwest Atlantic Fisheries.
- o Reviewed the paper produced by the National Marine Fisheries Service as a result of the Governors Island meeting on foreign fishing regulations and endorsed the concepts in that paper subject to further review after the concepts have been put in the form of proposed regulations.

The Council will meet again in Philadelphia on October 10-12, 1978.

South Atlantic Council

The following is a summary of the highlights of the Council meeting held September 25-28, 1978, in Raleigh, North Carolina. Summary prepared with Council concurrence by Charles A. Oravetz, Southeast Regional Office, NMFS.

- o Council approved five new permits for Japanese longliner tuna vessels.
- o Council will be represented at the Tri-State Coastal Recreational Conference in Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, October 23-24, 1978, by Council member Edwin Joseph.
- o Council discussed the proposed sanctuary status for Looe Key and decided to continue its present policy of management through development, in cooperation with the Gulf of Mexico Council, of a coral FMP. The plan will take into consideration the broad ecological needs of Looe Key as well as other sensitive reef areas.

- o Jo Ann Weaver of the General Accounting Office attended the Council meeting. She is preparing a report on Council activities with regard to consideration of NMFS/USCG enforcement procedures and needs.
- o The Council reviewed activities on the development of a snapper/grouper FMP and decided that it will be necessary to reassess decisions made to date and develop an administrative record. This will include defining the fishery, the management unit, and establishing a complete MSY (maximum sustainable yield) and OY (optimum yield)... A steering committee meeting will be held, together with the task team, to determine MSY on October 4-5, 1978, in Charleston. A second meeting to determine OY and other parameters in a plan will be held in November.
- o Chairman Hardesty, upon reviewing the merits of the administrative record development process, decided there is a need to apply this procedure to the development of all plans. He is especially anxious to begin such activities on the billfish plan.
- o Discussion was held on the stone crab FMP being developed by the Gulf of Mexico Council. It was decided to convene a special group in Atlanta on October 11, 1978, to work out a schedule for public hearings on stone crab in the South Atlantic Council area. Such hearings will be held in all four States.
- o The Council endorsed a proposed Sea Grant project by East Carolina University dealing with the collection of social and economic data on the recreational boat fishing fleet.
- o The Council reviewed a request from the North Pacific Council for support on its effort to kill H.R. 39 in the U.S. Congress. It was decided to take no action on this request on the advice of Mr. Irwin Alperin (Council member representing the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission) who indicated this legislation will not be approved by the Congressional Committee in its present form.
- o The Council considered the need for increased observer coverage on foreign vessels in response to a request from the Mid-Atlantic Council. Both the New England and Mid-Atlantic Councils have recommended foreign vessels be afforded 100 percent observer coverage. The South Atlantic Council decided that 100 percent observer coverage should not be made a mandatory requirement in all plans or for all fisheries in the South Atlantic area.
- o The Council decided to support a reduction in the incidental catch of river herring by foreign vessels operating in the silver hake fishery to 100 tons annually. The previous limitation has been 500 tons annually.
- o The Council reviewed the fiscal year 1979 budget as adjusted by NMFS. A draft letter commenting on the reduction and the philosophy behind it was approved by the Council for submission to the Regional Director.

A request was made that this letter receive high priority in the preparation of a response so it may be discussed at the next Council meeting to be held in Hilton Head, South Carolina.

- o The Council decided to contact the Gulf of Mexico Council to terminate the arbitration procedure to develop joint recommendations on a boundary between Councils. This decision was based on information that arbitrators, Bill Utz and Lawrence McHugh, had reached an impasse in selecting a third member for the arbitration team. The Council is developing an alternative approach for arriving at a solution to the boundary issue.
- o The Council set up dates for a series of committee meetings during the first three weeks of October:

October 5 - Scientific and Statistical Committee, mackerel FMP, New Orleans, Louisiana

8:30 a.m. to 12 noon, Personnel Committee, Charleston, South Carolina

October 5-6 - 1:30 p.m. to 2 p.m., Snapper/Grouper Steering
Committee with leaders of task team, Charleston,
South Carolina

October 10 - Joint Mackerel Management/Steering Committee,
Atlanta, Georgia

October 17-18 - 11 a.m. to 2 p.m., SOPP's (Statement of Organization, Practices, and Procedures) Committee, Charleston. South Carolina

- o A standing committee was established to select members for the SSC. It will be chaired by Edwin Joseph, and will include as members Harold Allen Irwin Alperin, and O. B. Lee. The SSC is authorized to have up to 16 members. Eight members have currently been appointed. Council members were asked to recommend SSC membership.
- o The Council met with Governor Jim Hunt of North Carolina. The urgent need for data on which to base fishery management decisions was discussed in considerable detail. Governor Hunt indicated he will consider means to collect data such as saltwater fishing licenses with his staff and, if appropriate, with the Governors of other southern coastal states.
- o The October meeting of the Council will be held in Hilton Head, South Carolina, on October 31 to November 2, 1978. Some Council members will attend the dedication of the Charleston Laboratory on October 31, 1978, prior to the Council meeting.

Caribbean Council

The Council did not meet in September. However, the staff continued to work on revisions of the spiny lobster and reef fish fishery management plans, and also worked on a RFP for migratory coastal pelagics.

Gulf of Mexico Council

The following is a summary of the highlights of the Council meeting held September 6-8, 1978, in Corpus Christi, Texas. The summary was prepared with Council concurrence by Charles A. Oravetz, Southeast Regional Office, NMFS.

- o Messrs. John Mehos and Theodore Food were elected Chairman and Vice Chairman, respectively.
- o The stone crab FMP was reviewed, modified, and discussed at great length by the management committee and endorsed by the Council. The plan will be redrafted by the task team, the EIS and EIA prepared, and public hearings are rescheduled for October. Every possible effort will be made to have the plan implemented by February 15, 1979, in order to prevent conflict between stone crabbers and shrimpers in the Florida Keys.
- o NOAA's Office of Ocean Management reviewed the proposed designation of the Flower Garden Reef off Texas as a marine sanctuary. The Council did not endorse the designation.
 - o The Council considered, but made no recommendation, on nine additional Japanese permit applications to longline in the Gulf.
 - o Council voted to award a contract with the Center for Natural Areas of Washington, D.C., to develop a coral FMP. This plan is a joint effort with the South Atlantic Council. Scheduled date of completion is July 31, 1979.
 - o All proposals to develop an FMP for coastal herrings were rejected. NMFS has been asked and will prepare a profile of the fishery. The method of further development of the FMP will be decided after the profile is completed.
 - o The draft reef fish plan was reviewed, and the contract for the plan will be extended up to 3 months to allow for modification of the objectives and plan format and preparation of an EIS.
 - o Ms. Bethyln McClosky, new Council member from Louisiana, was appointed chairwoman of the Public Information Committee. Additional committee reassignments were made by the Chairman.

- The Regulatory Measures Committee passed a motion which Council approved to use the state boating registration system as the primary means for enumerating the number of vessels fishing in the FCZ.
- Council deferred any action on the bilifish FMP until November because ICATI (International Commission for Conservation of Atlantic Tunas) is in the process of revising the MSY for billifish in the northwest Atlantic and the Southeast Fisheries Center, NMFS, is conducting a billifish survey which will be available in November.
- o Action on approval of phase one of the mackerel FMP was postponed because of the delay in obtaining comments from the SSC.
- The Council approved a meeting schedule for 1979. The next Council meeting will be October 16-18, 1978, at the Downtown Holiday Inn, Tampa, Florida. This will be in conjunction with meetings of the Gulf and Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commissions.
- December 5-7 in Galveston, Texas.

Pacific Council

- The Council did not meet in September. The next meeting of the Council is scheduled for October 11-13, 1978, in Los Angeles, California. Among items on the October meeting agends are considerations of the first draft of the groundiish management plan and two requests for permits to harvest coral.
- Public meetings on a proposed salmon moratorium were held along the Oregon coast during the week of September 25. The "town hall" meetings, sponsored by the Oregon commercial fishing industry, were to solicit input into draft State legislation to limit access in the ocean salmon troll and charter fisheries commencing in 1980. The Council has deferred consideration of a Federal moratorium on new entrants into the ocean consideration of a Federal moratorium on new entrants into the ocean commercial salmon fisheries to allow the States an opportunity to institute their own systems.
- Council Chairman Martinis, Council member McKean and several Council staff members reviewed the draft GAO (General Accounting Office) audit report with GAO personnel in Portland, Oregon. Response to the report was generally good.
- A meeting was held August 31 in Sacramento to consider curtalling the ocean chinook salmon fishery of the Klamath River in California. The request by the Secretary of Interior for an emergency closure by the Secretary of Commerce was the result of a threatening situation which developed when the Indian commercial and the river sport fisheries were closed to meet escapement goals. Since most of the Klamath chinook salmon had returned to the immediate vicinity of the river and most of the ocean fleet had left for albacore, no change was recommended in the offshore regulations.

- Requests for nominations to replace current salmon advisors have been sent to Pacific Coast fishery organizations. The two-year terms of the advisors will expire this fall. The Council has recommended that the present membership serve until completion of the comprehensive salmon management plan to maintain continuity but because of internal changes in some organizations, the Council asked appropriate groups if they desired any change of representation.
- The Council has instituted a public comment period in conjunction with its monthly meetings. Members of the public may address the Council after registering on sign-up cards. The subjects of testimony need not necessarily pertain to agenda items.
- o Halibut regulations for 1979 will be the subject of some discussion during the October meeting of the Council, since it presently appears that the U.S.-Canada Halibut Convention will be abrogated in April 1979. Also under discussion will be the suggestion that Congress appropriate money to establish a Halibut Division within the Northwest and Alaska Fisheries Center of NMFS to carry on the work now being done by the Halibut Commission.
- o Council Chairman Martinis, Vice Chairman Fullerton, and Executive Director Nakatsu are expected to attend the annual Council Chairmen's meeting in Kona, Hawaii, October 24-25, 1978.

.North Pacific Council

The regular meeting of the North Pacific Council was held at the Centennial Building, Sitka, Alaska, on September 28 and 29, 1978. The Scientific and Statistical Committee (SSC) and Advisory Panel (AP) also met in the Centennial Building on September 27 and 28, 1978. These groups also met concurrently with the Council during the meeting.

A public hearing was held Thursday, September 28, beginning at 3:30 p.m.

The following is a summary of the highlights of the meeting.

o <u>SSC Membership</u>

The Council unanimously approved reappointing members Messrs. Alan Milliken, Ed Miles, George Rogers, Jack Robinson, Donald Bevan, and Donald Rosenberg, with Jack Robinson as Vice-Chairman, and approved the appointment of Jack Lechner to replace Carl Rosier on the SSC. They discussed revising the SSC Charter to include eleven members, but upon the recommendation of the Finance Committee left the number at ten with the tenth position to be filled with a marine mammal specialist.

o Public Hearing Cancelled

Due to the good attendance at the public hearings held on the troll salmon fishery management plan in Juneau, Ketchikan, Petersburg, Pelican, and Sitka between September 22 and 27, the public hearing scheduled for October 5, 1978, in Ketchikan, Alaska, was cancelled. Mr. Scott Stafne, attorney for the Alaska Trollers Association concurred with this action.

o Halibut Working Group

The Council reviewed 14 recommendations drawn up by the Halibut Working Group at their meeting in Seattle on September 18. These included beginning immediate negotiations with Canada with the aim of continuing joint research after April 1, 1979; in the event this is unacceptable to Canada, 13 other recommendations were made which included terminating the IPHC on April 1, 1979, as scheduled; transfer management of halibut stocks off Alaska to the North Pacific Council and the stocks off Washington, Oregon and California to the Pacific Council; transfer the staff of the Halibut Commission, through legislation if necessary, to a special division of NMFS to continue their current research function; and others.

Congressman Don Young of Alaska attended the meeting briefly on September 28 and asked the Council to draft these recommendations in the form of legislation and forward them to him in Washington, D.C.

The Council unanimously adopted the 14 recommendations as their policy and action was initiated to implement them.

o Election of Chairman for 1979

The Council unanimously elected Mr. Clement V. Tillion as the new Council Chairman for 1979, and Mr. Harold Lokken as Vice-Chairmen, effective October 1, 1978.

o Herring FMP (Fishery Management Plan) Steering Group Appointed

A Council steering group consisting of Dr. John Harville, Pacific Marine Fisheries Commission, Dr. Ronald Skoog, Alaska Department of Fish and Game, and Mr. Jim Campbell, Anchorage, Alaska, was appointed by the Council to work with the Management Plan Development Team on the herring fishery management plan.

o SSC Meeting for October

The SSC will meet on October 25-26, 1978, at the NMFS Northwest and Alaska Fisheries Center in Seattle in advance of the November 2-3 Council meeting. Due to scheduling conflicts there will be no formal SSC meeting on November 2 and 3; however members of the SSC will be present at that meeting to present their report to the Council.

o INPFC (International North Pacific Fisheries Commission) Confirmation

The Council approved Council members Harold Lokken and Clement V. Tillion to continue as Council representatives on the INPFC.

o Finance Committee Report

Mr. Jim Campbell, Acting Chairman of the Finance Subcommittee reported the Finance Committee met on September 28 and reviewed the joint venture study contract with the University of Alaska. They recommended approving payment of the contract. They also reviewed the Dames & Moore Report (herring socio-economic studies) and approved final payment of the contract. They discussed the reduction in the fiscal year 79 administrative budget but took no action at this time. They heard a report from the SSC on the cost of the Shrimp Workshop which is projected to cost \$14,000.00. The subcommittee recommended the Council fund \$3,500 of that amount. The University of Alaska Sea Grant program has already committed \$4,000 and it is expected that ADF&G (Alaska Department of Fish and Game) and NMFS will fund the remainder. The Finance Committee recommended not increasing the SSC from 10 to 11 members at this time. For reasons of economy they feel the membership should remain at 10. If at some future date an increase is needed, the Finance Committee asked for a cost estimate before they reviewed the matter. The Council unanimously approved the Finance Committee recommendations.

o Tanner Crab FMP for 1979

The Council heard testimony from Mr. Jay Hastings, representing the Japanese Tanner Crab Industry, regarding the amendments to the tanner crab fishery management plan the Japanese Tanner Crab Industry had asked for during the August meeting. Mr. Hastings asked the Council to postpone considering those requests until the November 2 and 3 meeting after meeting with the U.S. crab industry to get comments on the proposals.

The revisions to the tanner crab fishery management plan for 1979 were deferred until the November 2 and 3 meeting.

o Miscellaneous

During the meeting the Council heard reports on several research contracts: (1) coded wire tag recovery program on chinook and coho salmon; (2) pilot observer program for troll salmon fishery off Alaska; (3) study of the socio-economic impacts of a commercial herring fishery in western Alaska; (4) study to determine the effects of hyraulic clam harvesting in eastern Bering Sea; (5) assessment of spawning herring and capelin stocks at selected coastal areas in the eastern Berring Sea; (6) investigation of joint U.S./foreign ventures, and (7) investigation of the continent of origin of sockeye and coho salmon.

The Council also heard reports from the National Marine Fisheries Service and the United States Coast Guard on current foreign fishing activity off Alaska.

G Incidental Species Group Report

The Council's working group on "incidental" species met September 28 to revise a first draft of a position paper on this problem. They expect to have a report for the Council at the November meeting.

o November Meeting

The next meeting of the North Pacific Council will be November 2-3 at the Westward Hilton Hotel in Anchorage, Alaska

Western Pacific Council

- o On September 2, the Council's office was moved to larger quarters. The address remains the same, 1164 Bishop Street, Honolulu, Hawaii 96813; only the room number has been changed to 1608. An open house was held on September 29 to introudce the new office to local Council members, advisers and friends.
- o On September 19, Mr. William Bodde, Director of the Pacific Islands
 Affairs Office in the Department of State visited Chairman Wadsworth Yee
 to consult concerning negotiations with the United Kingdom over islands
 of disputed soverighty in the central and South Pacific and United
 States participation in a proposed South Pacific Fishery Management Agency.
- o A joint meeting of the Spiny Lobster Planning Team and the Hawaii members of the Spiny Lobster Advisory Sub-Panel was held on September 25 at the NMFS Southwest Fisheries Center Laboratory in Honolulu. The discussion centered around the minimum size limit for spiny lobster recommended in the Council's draft FMP for the lobster fishery of the Northwest Hawaiian Islands. A new firm which plans to begin shortly to produce frozen lobster tails from that area testified that the proposed size limit would adversely affect this new venture in two ways: (1) by reducing the catch rate to an uneconomic level and (2) by limiting their production to a range of lobster tail weights that would be difficult to market.
- o Because of the change in the channel for financial support for the State and Territories, from the Council to the NMFS Region, arrangements were made to place administrative personnel in Hawaii and American Samoa temporarily on the Council's staff, in order to provide time for the local Governments to pick them up under their own hiring procedures.

- o On September 21, the Executive Director participated in a meeting with the Pacific Council, NMFS, NOAA, Department of State, and Coast Guard officials at the Southwest Fisheries Center in La Jolla, California, to consider amendments to the draft preliminary management plan for pacific billfishes and sharks. It was decided to modify the plan to provide separate optimum yield figures for each of the major geographical areas of the region, to include the Northern Marianas and to provide OY levels for wahoo and mahimahi. It is hoped that the amended plan will be ready for implementation around the first of the year.
- o The Council established a retirement plan for its permanent employees, to become effective October 1, 1978. After considering a number of alternatives, the decision was for a Group Individual Retirement Account Program.
- o Approval was received from NMFS-NOAA for addition of an economist, Grade GS-12 equivalent, to the Council's regular staff, and preparations were made to begin recruiting for that position.
- o No meetings of the Council or the SSC were held during the month. The next meeting of the Council will be held at the Kona Hilton Hotel in Kailua-Kona, Hawaii, on October 23, to be followed at the same location by meetings of the eight Council Chairmen, and a meeting of MAFAC (Marine Fisheries Advisory Committee). The next meeting of the SSC will be at the Maui Surf Hotel on November 21-22, 1978.
