NOT JUST FEEDING PEOPLE, BUT FEEDING PEOPLE WELL

<u>Background</u>

SeaShare is the only organization that focuses on seafood as a source of nutrition for food banks across the country.

230 Million Servings of lean protein have been donated since 1994.

We started in Alaska, with the Prohibited Species Donation Program.

25 year later, only 10% of the fish we donate is Prohibited Species Catch.

2018 Results

Last year SeaShare and its partners donated over 6 million servings of seafood across the United States.

Donations of Prohibited Species Catch reached 5.5 million Pounds.

That's 22 million servings from fish that would have otherwise been thrown overboard.

Current Participants

The National Marine Fisheries Service amended our permits in January, then again in May, to update the list of participants:

- ▶ 136 Catcher Boats
- ▶ 11 Shoreside processors
- → 38 At-Sea Processors
- 2 re-processors in Puget Sound
 (to inspect, trim, steak and re-pack)

2018 PSC Donation Volumes from BSAI & GOA

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355,085 pounds of PSC salmon
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- + 41,950 pounds of PSC halibut
- = 397,035 total pounds

Distribution of PSC Donations

▶ 59,700 pounds distributed in Alaska.

All at 0 cost to the receiving agencies.

▶ 337,335 pounds were distributed in other states: WA, CA, OR, MO, CT.

Feeding America reimbursed SeaShare for a portion of the downstream costs to ship, hold, re-work, and package fish for their food banks.

Giving back in Alaska

- Fishermen, processors, and financial partners have all asked us to do more to help hungry families in Alaska.
- 40% of Alaskans live in or near Anchorage, so we started there.
 Other population centers include Fairbanks and Juneau.
- Sending frozen seafood from Dutch Harbor and Kodiak to other locations in Alaska is difficult.
- The Terry Shaff Memorial Fund was established in 2014.
 The goal was to increase the capacity for donations to remote villages.

Anchorage and the Mat-Su Valley





- ▶ Truckloads are sent to the Food Bank of Alaska and Bean's Café.
- ▶ Just last month we sent 18,000 pounds of frozen seafood to them.

Fairbanks



- ► Fairbanks Community Food Bank provides a variety of services to needy families
- ▶ SeaShare sends at least 1 container per year to help feed families there.

Seafood donated across Alaska

Almost 200,000 pounds of fish have been distributed in Alaska over the last 12 months:

- Canned Salmon sent to the Food Bank of Alaska via AML.
- Breaded Alaska pollock portions sent to Bean's Café and the Children's Lunchbox via Tote.
- Breaded Alaska pollock portions sent to our freezer in Dillingham via AML.
- Breaded Alaska pollock portions sent to our new freezer in Bethel via Lynden Air Freight.
- ▶ Ling Cod steaks sent from Kodiak to Chignik via regional Air Taxi.
- Halibut and salmon sent to Nome and Kotzebue via USCG Air Station Kodiak.
- ► Halibut and salmon donated to USCG food Pantry, Kodiak (during Gov't shutdown).
- Alaska Pollock fillets donated in Kodiak.
- Sablefish steaks donated in Kodiak.
- Breaded Alaska pollock portions sent to Southeast Alaska Food Bank in Juneau.

SeaShare sent the first load to Bethel in April:


12,000 pounds of frozen Wild Alaska pollock portions.

AML barge took the fish to ANC. Then Lynden Airfreight shipped to Bethel as they had room on their Hercs, because there is no barge service with frozen storage to Bethel.
