Dear Chairman Olson,

The small boat fleet remains an integral component of coastal communities in maintaining working waterfronts throughout Alaska. As a member of that flect and outreach coordinator for Alaska Marine Conservation Council we appreciate the steps the Council has taken to maintain this fleet. One of the greatest challenges in limiting access into fisheries with excess capacity is providing a means for entry level opportunity. When access to fisheries is regulated through catch shares and limited licenses, the cost to enter increases dramatically. This cost creates an economic barrier for young fishermen looking to enter into commercial fishing and work their way up. In the GOA cod sector split action, the Council addressed this issue through a set aside of non historical quota, allowing growth in the jig sector.

Further steps are needed to manage the jig fishery in a manner that allows the sector allocation to succeed. We encourage the Council to develop a purpose and need statement and move forward with an analysis. In addition, a set of alternatives will need to be formulated and we recommend moving forward those outlined in the discussion paper. Based on discussions with the fleet in Kodiak, the preferred alternative at this time is Alternative 3, the reverse parallel structure. We believe this alternative would provide the greatest opportunity to fish in federal waters when weather conditions are most favorable. This action would increase the likelihood of harvesting the jig quota, attaining OY and meeting the goals of the action in providing substantial entry level opportunity.

The jig fleet is committed to working with the Council and would like to see a management structure in place at the same time the sector split goes into effect. Fishermen in Kodiak and other coastal communities are trying to adapt to limited opportunity as a result of restricted access. With a structure in place geared to provide year round fishing opportunity, the jig fishery can serve to round out a diversified fishing portfolio. Combination vessels depend on a variety of fisheries to weather the ups and downs, particularly young fishermen who may have high payments in accessing fisheries with higher entry cost. We appreciate the opportunity to transform the jig fishery into a viable entry level opportunity.
