Halibut/Sablefish IFQ Program

#### **ACTION REQUIRED**

Review request from Seldovia Village to be included as an eligible community to purchase halibut and sablefish commercial quota share

#### **BACKGROUND**

In April 2002, the Council approved Amendment 66 to the Gulf FMP, to allow eligible communities in the Gulf of Alaska to purchase commercial halibut and sablefish catcher vessel quota share (QS) in IPHC Areas 2C, 3A, and 3B for lease to community residents. The final rule for this program was published on April 30, 2004, and the program was effective June 1, 2004. Overall, this amendment modifies the existing IFQ Program by revising the definition of eligible "person" that may hold halibut and sablefish quota share, with restrictions as developed by the Council.

The regulation allows small, rural, coastal communities in the Gulf of Alaska that have documented participation in the commercial halibut and sablefish fisheries to form a Community Quota Entity (CQE) non-profit organization to purchase and hold quota share on their behalf. The implementing regulations include a list of criteria to define eligible Gulf of Alaska communities that may participate in the program. Communities must meet all of the criteria outlined below, such that an eligible community must:

- be recognized by the U.S. Census as a municipality or census designated place, located on the Gulf of Alaska coast of the North Pacific Ocean;
- have a population of not less than 20 persons and not more than 1,500 persons according to the 2000 U.S. Census;
- is not accessible by road to larger communities;
- have documented historical participation in the commercial halibut or sablefish fisheries; and
- be listed on Table 21 to part 679.

The historic participation criterion listed above is specifically defined in regulation as communities for which a resident has recorded a commercial landing of halibut or sablefish between 1980 - 2000 according to Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission (CFEC) data for permit and fishing activity (69 FR 23861, 4/30/04). The Council and the implementing regulations specified that communities meeting the above

criteria at final action would be listed as a defined set of qualifying communities in regulation. Any change to the list of eligible communities (see Table 21 to part 679) requires Council action to recommend such change and Secretary of Commerce approval of the change through a regulatory amendment. The final Council motion on this issue, including the list of eligible communities that was included in regulation (Table 21), is attached as Item D-2(a)(1).

The Council's action and the final rule also explicitly state that communities not listed as eligible could apply to the Council to become eligible and would be evaluated using the same criteria. On December 13, 2004, representatives of the Seldovia Village Tribe submitted a letter petitioning the Council to add Seldovia Village as an eligible community under this program. This letter is attached as <u>Item D-2(a)(2)</u>.

Seldovia Village is located adjacent to the City of Seldovia, on the south shore of Kachemak Bay (see attached map attached behind memo). The 2000 U.S. Census indicates Seldovia Village has a population of 144 persons. Currently, there is no governmental entity explicitly representing the community of Seldovia Village, as there is not a municipal government, tribal government, or community association whose constituency is limited to, or defined by, those who are residents of the geographic area that constitutes Seldovia Village. The Seldovia Village Tribe IRA (Indian Reorganization Act) is a Federally recognized Indian Tribe, which includes residents of Seldovia Village and residents of the City of Seldovia (Alaska Community Database Community Information Summaries, Alaska Division of Community Advocacy). Thus, while Seldovia Village is recognized by the U.S. Census as a census designated place separate from the City of Seldovia, there is not currently an entity on whose behalf a non-profit CQE could receive and administer quota share.

While Seldovia Village residents may have historical participation in the fisheries of the Gulf of Alaska, the community does not appear to meet the eligibility criteria under this program. Staff from NOAA Fisheries, Alaska Region, Restricted Access Management Division have examined their permit records and confirmed that there is no record of a person with a given address of "Seldovia Village" ever holding a quota share certificate for commercial halibut or sablefish (Phil Smith, pers. comm., 12/22/04). Further, no such community is listed in the CFEC permit files, and the annual permit and fishing activity report compiled by CFEC shows no commercial permit and fishing activity documented by CFEC for residents of Seldovia Village.<sup>2</sup> Therefore, while Seldovia Village may meet the remaining criteria, it does not appear to meet the specified criterion for historical participation. Staff recommends that should Seldovia Village contend that it does meet all of the criteria as defined above, the community would be responsible for demonstrating its eligibility.


The issue of whether Seldovia Village should be designated as an eligible community to form a CQE to purchase and hold halibut and sablefish quota share on its behalf arose during the public comment period on the proposed rule to implement this action. In addition, the issue arose as to whether individual residents

Staff notes that Seldovia Village was not included on the list of potentially eligible communities in any iteration of the analysis supporting this action, nor was it included on the list in either the proposed or final rule.

The annual CFEC report "Permit & Fishing Activity by Year, State, Census Area or City" provides information broken out by State, Alaska census areas, Alaska communities, and a grand total for the year regardless of residency. Residency of fishermen is based on the residency they claimed and the address provided (http://www.cfec.state.ak.us/gpbycen/rptdesc.htm).

share held on behalf of the City of Seldovia, which is an eligible community under the program. The Council motion and the implementing regulations require that only permanent residents of the community represented by the CQE are eligible to lease IFQ derived from community-held quota share. The public comment provided noted that residents of Seldovia Village, which is adjacent to the City of Seldovia (see attached map), have historically participated in the commercial fisheries operating out of the City of Seldovia. As a result, and in light of the historic linkage between the City of Seldovia and Seldovia Village in terms of participation in commercial fisheries, NMFS clarified the final rule for this program such that residents of Seldovia Village are considered eligible to lease IFQ derived from quota share held on behalf of the City of Seldovia. Thus, while Seldovia Village is not currently eligible to designate a separate CQE and purchase quota share, the final rule was modified to address the issue of potential participation by Seldovia Village residents.

In sum, according to the eligibility criteria developed for this program and the landings and permit data considered, Seldovia Village does not appear to be an eligible Gulf of Alaska community under this program. Upon request of the Seldovia Village Tribe, this issue has been scheduled for Council consideration at this meeting. This process is consistent with that used for other communities that previously petitioned for eligibility (Akutan, Haines, Saxman, Klukwan). The Council action at this meeting may include, but is not limited to: 1) determining that the current evidence is sufficient to initiate an analysis for a regulatory amendment to add Seldovia Village as an eligible community; or 2) requesting more information on this issue prior to initiating an analysis; or 3) determining that the current evidence is sufficient that Seldovia Village does not meet the criteria for eligibility and thus not initiating an analysis to that effect.



#### Council Motion on Community Quota Share Purchase – Gulf FMP Amendment 66 April 10, 2002

The Council recommends to allow eligible Gulf of Alaska coastal communities to hold commercial halibut and sablefish QS for lease to and use by community residents, as defined by the following elements and options.

#### Element 1. Eligible Communities (Gulf of Alaska Communities only)

Rural communities with less than 1,500 people, no road access to larger communities, direct access to saltwater, and a documented historic participation in the halibut and/or sablefish fisheries.

Communities meeting the above criteria at final action will be listed as a defined set of qualifying communities in regulation (see attached list). Communities not listed must apply to the North Pacific Fishery Management Council to be approved for participation in the program and will be evaluated using the above criteria.

#### Element 2. Ownership Entity

- New non-profit community entity
- New non-profit entity formed by an aggregation of several qualifying communities
- New regional or Gulf-wide umbrella entity acting as trustee for individual communities

#### Element 3. Use Caps for Individual Communities

1% of Area 2C and 0.5% of the combined Area 2C, 3A and 3B halibut QS, and 1% of Southeast and 1% of all combined sablefish QS.

Communities in Areas 3A and 3B cannot buy halibut quota share in Area 2C and communities in Area 2C cannot buy halibut quota shares in Area 3B.

#### Element 4. Cumulative Use Caps for All Communities

Communities are limited to 3% of the Area 2C, 3A, or 3B halibut QS and 3% of the SE, WY, CG, or WG sablefish QS in each of the first seven years of the program, with a 21% total by area, unless modified by the Council through the five-year review.

#### Element 5. Purchase, use and sale restrictions

<u>Block Restrictions</u> (Block restrictions are retained if the community transfers QS.)

- Allow communities to buy blocked and unblocked shares.
- Individual communities will be limited to 10 blocks of halibut QS and 5 blocks of sablefish QS in each management area.

- Restrict community purchase of blocked halibut quota share to blocks of shares which, at the time
  of the implementation of sweep provisions (1996), exceeded the following minimum poundage of
  IFQ:
  - (a) For Areas 2C and 3A, minimum halibut IFQ poundage of 3,000 lbs.
  - (b) For areas SE, WY, CG, and WG, minimum sablefish IFQ poundage of 5,000 lbs.

<u>Vessel Size Restrictions</u> (Vessel size restrictions are retained if the community transfers the QS)

Quota share held by communities under this program would be exempt from vessel size (share class) restrictions while the QS is owned and leased by the community.

Transferability of halibut QS in Areas 2C and 3A from commercial to community entities is restricted to B and C category quota share.

#### Sale Restrictions

Communities may only sell their QS for one of the following purposes:

- (a) generating revenues to sustain, improve, or expand the program
- (b) liquidating the entity's QS assets for reasons outside the program. In that event, NMFS would not qualify that entity or another entity to hold QS for that community for a period of 3 years.

#### **Use Restrictions**

Leasing of community quota share shall be limited to an amount equal to 50,000 pounds of halibut and 50,000 pounds of sablefish IFQs, inclusive of any IFQ owned, per transferee.

Leasing of community quota share shall be limited to an amount equal to 50,000 pounds of halibut and 50,000 pounds of sablefish IFQs, inclusive of any IFQ owned, per vessel.

#### Element 6. Performance Standards

Communities participating in the program must adhere to the following performance standards established by NMFS in regulation:

(a) Leasing of annual IFQs resulting from community owned QS shall be limited to residents of the ownership community. (Residency criteria similar to that established for the subsistence halibut provisions shall be used and verified by affidavit.)

The following should be seen as goals of the program with voluntary compliance monitored through the annual reporting mechanism and evaluated when the program is reviewed. When communities apply for eligibility in the program they must describe how their use of QS will comply with program guidelines. This information will be used as a benchmark for evaluating the program.

(b) Maximize benefit from use of community IFQ for crew members that are community residents.

- (c) Insure that benefits are equitably distributed throughout the community.
- (d) Insure that QS/IFQ allocated to an eligible community entity would not be held and unfished.

#### Element 7. Administrative Oversight

Require submission of a detailed statement of eligibility to NMFS prior to being considered for eligibility as a community QS recipient. The statement would include:

- (a) Certificate of incorporation
- (b) Verification of qualified entity as approved in Element 2
- (c) Documentation demonstrating accountability to the community
- (d) Explanation of how the community entity intends to implement the performance standards

Require submission of an annual report detailing accomplishments. The annual report would include:

- (a) A summary of business, employment, and fishing activities under the program
- (b) A discussion of any corporate changes that alter the representational structure of the entity
- (c) Specific steps taken to meet the performance standards
- (d) Discussion of known impacts to resources in the area.

#### Element 8. Program Review

Council review of the program after 5 years of implementation.

The Council also recommends forming a community QS implementation committee, in order to ensure that the program is implemented as intended.

We are not part of the City of Seldovia and have a large amount of fisherman who fish and would very much like to take part in this program. We are located outside of the City limits of Seldovia and encompass a much larger area than that of the City of Seldovia with almost as many residence.

We have been making our living on the sea and will continue to do so. We see this program as a way to help Seldovia Village grow economically and a way to help those that are not able to outright purchase fishing quotas whether small or large. We have been told that we are not a community but if you look on the 2000 census you will see that the Seldovia Village is clearly counted separately from the City of Seldovia.

We were on the Original list of Communities when it first came out and now have been taken off. We would greatly appreciate you placing us back on the list as the 43<sup>rd</sup> community able to get use of this program. Those that live outside the City limits of Seldovia were not eligible but may now participate in the City CQE program if written into the City's program.

This is good for the short term, but as the Seldovia Village continues to grow, we need to have CQE shares that will be able to increase the amount of money that could be made by our fishermen and our community in turn helping our economic base. This will also help the economic base of the City of Seldovia since that is where we do a major portion of our shopping and our sole source for gas and fuel for our boats, cars and homes.
