SUBJECT: Management Plan Scheduling Subcommittee meeting May 3, 1978

The North Pacific Council's subcommittee on management plan scheduling, chaired by Don Bevan, met at 8:30 a.m. May 3, 1978 in room 330 of the East Building of the Northwest and Alaska Fisheries Center in Seattle. Subcommittee members present were Harold Lokken, Don Collinsworth, Ron Skoog, Phil Chitwood, Don McKernan and Jim Branson.

The group established three goals for the meeting:

- 1. Plan development schedule should make a reasonable Council load.
- 2. Develop criteria for plan development.
- 3. Recommend priorities in which the plans should be developed.

The group concurred with Chairman Lokken's recommendation to appoint a Council subcommittee for each management plan. The subcommittee would do a preliminary review and develop initial recommendations for the plan before it is addressed by the Council as a group. With a thorough job by the subcommittees, the plans should not require a full Council review prior to printing and submission for the public hearing process. The group also agreed that one in-house review prior to public review and comments was sufficient, rather than the two reviews adopted by the Council several months ago.

The committee agreed that a reasonable workload, that should not be exceeded, was two plan reviews at a single Council meeting - preferably one preliminary review and rewrite after public comments, and one final review and approval for submission to the Secretary.

The group then laid out and approved as a recommendation to the Council the following schedule for Council reviews on the first eight management plans:

- 1. Ocean salmon October, November meetings
- 2. Bering Sea groundfish January, February meetings
- 3. Tanner crab revision October, November meetings
- 4. Bering Sea shrimp April and May meetings
- 5. King crab February, March meetings
- 6. Bering Sea herring March and April meetings
- 7. Gulf of Alaska groundfish May and June meetings
- 8. Bering Sea clams June and July meetings

An expansion of the Council meeting schedule based on the above recommendation is in attachment B.

The subcommittee identified five other management units, and suggested that they be developed one-a-year starting in 1979. They prioritized those management units in the following order:

- 1. Scallops 1979
- 2. Shrimp (except Bering Sea) 1980
- 3. Dungeness crab 1981
- 4. Snails 1982
- 5. Coral 1983

It was recognized that two other management units, halibut and ocean salmon west of 175° East, would probably need development, but because of the uncertainty of the negotiations with Canada it was impossible to put a starting date on them at this time. The effective date of the first eight management plans and the beginning date of the other seven management units identified is shown on attachment A.

The development schedules for each of the first eight management plans are shown in attachment C.

Among the other recommendations of the subcommittee were:

- The Council appoint a lead agency and plan development team for the Bering Sea shrimp FMP.
- 2. That total costs for management plans, including unreimbursed personnel time from other agencies, be computed for each management plan developed in order to get a realistic cost figure.

The subcommittee agreed to meet to review the recommendations as further developed by the Executive Director at 7:30 p.m. May 24 in the conference room of the Council headquarters in Anchorage.

Dear Jim:

I have just received your mailing of May 15 having to do with FMP schedules and priorities.

With regard to the timing of individual FMP development and revision I have only one comment: I remain appalled by the time required for review! Using the Gulf of Alaska Groundfish FMP, 1st revision, as an example, to have a draft to mail to the Council on January 5, 1979 will require final drafting to commence by early December 1978. That, in turn, will require that status of stock evaluations and estimations of DAH occur during October-November 1978. At that time, the last year of record for foreign fishery data will be 1977 (final, detailed statistics of which are due to us by May 1978 and it will take the period May-November to get them in the computer and analyzed). Although some research and observer data through mid-1978 would be available, the bulk of the information which will be used to evaluate stock condition will be three years old before the FMP becomes effective (1977 data vs 1980 FMP)--this is nonsensical!

If there is to be no relief from this kind of review time--six months in the Council (Jan. 5 - June 29); $4\frac{1}{2}$ months in the Washington review procedure--I find it very difficult to justify the effort we now expend in management-related research because the status of stocks two or three years ago is only of marginal interest to managing this year's fishery. In my opinion, if we must live with this time frame, we could simply set ABC proportional to the overall foreign CPUE (e.g., if the overall CPUE of pollock in the Gulf declines 10 percent in 1978, the 1979 ABC of pollock in the Gulf drops 10 percent from that of 1978); set 0Y equal to 75 percent of ABC (to provide some biological and economic cushion); make a few phone calls to processors each fall to guestimate DAH; set 20 percent of every 0Y in reserve (as a DAH cushion), and let it go at that. There is just no sense in trying to be precise or high-powered in our management activities if we can not apply the results of that activity in a timely manner.



Now, to your specific questions, vis-a-vis the two groundfish fisheries:

Best time of year for plan to go into effect--I do not believe it makes any difference because, as you mentioned, there is only little seasonality to the fisheries.

- 2. Data availability--reevaluation of the status of stocks can be completed by August.
- Cutoff date for new data--there really should be no such cutoff so that management can respond to changing situations; however, given the unrealistic formalities of FMP development and revision, I would agree with you that we should all put on our blinders at the end of the Council's public review period. I worry a bit about going into public review with incomplete data; even though the data became available during the review period, the public will not be able to comment on them. On the other hand, at least part of the purpose of public review is to obtain more data--Catch 22?
- Other fishery units--none that came to mind. Rather than separating out individual species for separate plans, we should consider lumping together some of those we already have because of the ecosystem relationships between them all and the fact that U.S. capacity, markets, competition for grounds, etc. are not very neatly separated.

In closing, I agree that we, collectively, have made substantial progress and that the program is worthwhile. I am concerned, however, that the "system" may (has?) stiffle an orderly progression to something better and inhibit innovation. Let's just keep chipping away.
