Relating to the interception of Alaska salmon on the high seas.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

WHEREAS Alaska's salmon represents one of the state's most important renewable resources; and

WHEREAS more than 40,000 people are employed in commercial fish processing and harvesting jobs in the state during the salmon season, and thousands of other people in the transportation and service industries in the state benefit from this economic activity; and

WHEREAS the Alaska commercial salmon industry contributes millions of dollars annually to state and local government treasuries through taxes, assessments and fees, and salmon fishing and processing represent the economic backbone of many coastal communities in the state; and

WHEREAS salmon is a mainstay in the diets of state residents who harvest the great fish by rod and reel, net, and fishwheel for personal and family consumption; and

WHEREAS recreational fishing for salmon is an experience enjoyed by most state residents each year; and

WHEREAS more than 1,000,000 salmon originating in the state are estimated to have been harvested on the high seas by Japanese fishing fleets during 1983; and

WHEREAS high seas interceptions deprived Alaska of commercial fishing opportunities valued at more than \$19,000,000 to fishermen, and more than \$36,000,000 to seafood processors; and

WHEREAS this lost opportunity cost the state treasury

roughly \$500,000 to \$800,000 in lost fisheries business tax revenue alone; and

WHEREAS the interception figures include 106,000 chinook salmon from South Central Alaska stocks, more than the combined catches of recreational, commercial and subsistence fishermen in Cook Inlet in 1983; and

WHEREAS foreign fishing fleets catch billions of pounds of fish and shellfish in the state's 200-mile fishery conservation zone each year;

BE IT RESOLVED that the Alaska State Legislature respectfully requests the U.S. Department of State to vigorously pursue negotiations that will lead to complete elimination of high seas interceptions of salmon of Alaska origin; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that the Alaska State Legislature respect-fully requests U.S. Congress to adopt amendments to the Magnuson Fishery Conservation and Management Act preventing nations that intercept Alaska-bound salmon on the high seas from receiving allocations to harvest groundfish in the United States' 200-mile fishery conservation zone.

COPIES of this resolution shall be sent to the Honorable Ronald Reagan, President of the United States; the Honorable George Schultz, Secretary of State; the Honorable Robert Dole, U.S. Senate Majority Leader; the Honorable Thomas P. O'Neill, Jr., Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives; and to the Honorable Ted Stevens and the Honorable Frank Murkowski, U.S. Senators, and the Honorable Don Young, U.S. Representative, members of the Alaska delegation in Congress; to Mr. William Gordon, assistant administrator for fisheries, National Marine Fisheries Service; and to Mr. James Campbell, chairman, North Pacific Fishery Management Council.

Dear Mr. Schultz:

During the December 1984 North Pacific Fishery Management Council meeting, the Alaska Department of Fish and Game and the Alaska Board of Fisheries presented new information documenting very large interceptions of salmon of North American origin by foreign high seas fisheries. Results of research by the Fisheries Research Institute of the University of Washington indicate that in addition to previously documented salmon interceptions, from 200,000 to 700,000 Alaska chinook salmon were harvested annually between 1978 and 1983 by Japanese mothership and land-based gill net fisheries. These fisheries operate both within and beyond the Exclusive Economic Zone of the United States. At that time, the Council, along with the Alaska Congressional delegation and the State, strongly urged the State Department to move as quickly as possible to terminate this wasteful high seas salmon fishery.

To this end, the governments of the United States and Japan held discussions on the high seas salmon interceptions June 13-14, 1985, in Tokyo. Regrettably, little progress was made at solving the fundamental interception problems. Additional government—to-government discussions have been scheduled for August 19-23 in Seattle.

Interceptions of North American salmon and steelhead in the landbased and mothership fisheries, even since the renegotiation of INPFC in 1978, impact inshore fisheries by about \$20 million annually. Unfortunately, much of this impact falls on areas in Alaska which are economically depressed and totally resource dependant. In some cases the high seas fishing mortality actually exceded the inshore harvest.

Every time we complete a study in a new area or on a new anadromous species, we discover interception impacts previously not imagined. We cannot afford to debate exact interception percentages, dropout rates, yield and mortality losses while this economic and management loss continues.

Progress must be made to terminate the high seas interception of North American salmon and steelhead. All cooperative fisheries development programs under the jurisdiction of this Council between the United States and Japan, as well as our views on fisheries allocations, are strongly influenced by this salmon interception issue. The Council

therefore requests the State Department to redouble its efforts to expeditiously resolve this problem. With a unified United States position, I am optimistic that these items of mutual concern can be successfully negotiated:

This letter verifies that I support the petition to restore and reestablish the jurisdiction of the pot sanctuary in the Eastern Bering Sea from Cape Sarichef east to Bristol Bay. It is requested that no trawling be permitted in this area by either foreign or domestic fishermen.

Employing hard on-bottom trawl gear in the sensitive King Crab and Halibut nursery area, shows poor resource management. I will site some of the things that prove this to be true.

Since 3/85 to7/27/85 incidental catch figures of Red King Crab are up to 732,500 ,with Tanner Crab figures up to 428,104.

Joint Ventures site actual rates and guideline rates per metric ton of sole, etc. Lets look at these figures in terms of poundage and totals mentioned previously. Red Crab at 732,500, approximately 3,600,000 pounds. Tanner Crab at 428,104, approximately 960,000 pounds.

The Sole Venture is to continue through September, 1985. Lets then add August and September incidental catches, and most important of all, lets try to imagine the damage done to our resource by two main wires, two trawl doors, and trawl net digging up the ocean floor. Multiply that damage by approximately 40 Joint Venture vessels, and then by approximately 6 months of trawling time and you can see why trawling in the Pot Sanctuary would and is currently endangering the King and Tanner resources. I can speak from my years of experience about on-bttom trawling.

On August 9,1985 I attended, Industry Bering Sea Incidental Catch Workgroup, a meeting. I heard information to the fact that the Foreign fishing fleet have caught their Yellow-Fin sole quotas year after year outside the Pot Sanctuary.

Why then is the Yellow-Fin sole being harvested at the expense of other resources?

Dear Mr. Campbell,

This letter is written in support of reestablishing the $po\tau$ sanctuary in the Bering Sea.

The Joint Venture Yellow Fin Sole fishery which employs hard on bottom trawl gear is operating six months out of the year in an extremetly sensitive nursery area for Red King Crab. To my knowledge this fishery could survive outside of the pot sanctuary as foreign allocated Yellow Fin Sole fisheries have quite well for years. Risking the future of the Red Crab fishery for a fishery with abundant stocks outside of this area, is totally out of line. Incidental catch rates as well as mortality rates not recorded by damage done by gear employed by this fishery have risen greatly, as the fleet has gone form six vessels in 1981 to forty two vessels in 1985. It is my hope the future of the Red Crab fishery in the Bering Sea, the only area in Alaska showing possible sign of recovery, be spared and the Yellow Fin Sole fishery moved OUT of this sensitive area.

However, with almost 800,000 King Crab being caught as incidental catch there will be no chance of recovery for that limited species The FIV ALEUTIAN No. 1 did the King Crab pot survey for the National Marine Fishery for Bering Sea in June and July of 1985. The majority of King Crab found was in the pot sanctuary. It would be a crime against nature to let this needless destruction of King Crab due to the Yellow fin sole fishery. Petition tó restore and reestablish the jurisdiction of the Pot Sanctuary in the Eastern Bering Sea from Cape Saricheff east to Bristol Bay. It is requested that no trawling be permitted in this area by either foreign or domestic fishermen.

The below listed individuals petition the North Pacific Fisheries Management Council to establish the above described area as a pot sanctuary to conserve and encourage the growth of immature king crab and halibut resources. The area was opened to American draggers on an experimental basis in 1981, bearing on the resulting impact on halibut and king crab resources.

The undersigned make this request with full knowledge that American trawlers engaged in the yellowfin sole joint venture fishery with the (Soviet) Marine Resources Co. are employing hard on-bottom trawl gear in this sensitive king crab and halibut nursery area. Since April 1, 1985, they have caught incidental to the target species, over \$00,000 immature king crab, most of which were traumatized to an extent they will be unable to survive.

If the fishery is allowed to continue in this area, the potential value lost to the Pacific Northwest and Alaskan fishing industry is estimated to be in excess of \$30 million dollars annually.

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If the fishery is allowed to continue in this area, the potential value lost to the Pacific Northwest and Alaskan fishing industry is estimated to be in excess of \$30 million dollars annually.

The petitioners make this request with the knowledge that king crab stocks must be protected in this area, with an historically precedented gear restriction, or it is doubtful that stocks will be able to rebound to levels that will permit viable harvests in the future.
