Gordon Williams, Board Regional Advisory Board Representative. His Board voted to basically endorse a similar management scheme as 1983 and to continue Alaska's rebuilding program and a harvest level that has some restraint for conservation. In the absence of a treaty, a three-cycle rebuilding program is the only reasonable alternative. Mr. Williams said he felt that the computer models used to arrive at management schemes should be looked at carefully and not taken as the "gospel" because the basic assumptions used in these models may be interpreted in different ways. His Council did not arrive at a definite concensus regarding season dates, but it was generally agreed that July 1 would be unacceptable. Closing the FCZ during the single-species fishery probably did not contribute to conservation of chinooks because it forced fishermen into shallower waters where the abundance of chinook was greater.

Jim Martin, Levi George, Columbia River Inter-Tribal Fish Commission. Levi George read a written statement submitted by Tim Wapato of the Commission which encouraged work toward a coastwide conservation program. Specifically, the Commission proposed that the state of Alaska, the Columbia River treaty tribes, and the States of Washington and Oregon request the U.S. government to inquire of the Canadian government whether it would be willing to discuss formulation of an inter-nation agreement limited to the conservation of naturally spawning chinook salmon stocks of common concern. At the U.S.-Canada negotiations a workable program was very nearly reached and Mr. George encouraged the Council and Board to build upon that work.

Earl Krygier, Alaska Trollers Assn. ATA submitted a proposal for the 1984 chinook troll fishery which suggested the opening and closing dates of the season with consideration of the conflict with the halibut fishery, and a status quo harvest level.

Ed Wojeck, Alaska Trollers Assn. There is no knowledge of a conservation effort on the part of the Canadians. Their harvest rates continue to increase while stocks decline. He feels a separate chinook treaty would be giving up the resource to Canada. The ATA proposal for the 1984 season takes care of the Alaska stocks on a three-cycle rebuilding program.

Bob Fishel, Juneau. Mr. Fishel spoke on net-scarred salmon. He trolled the first two weeks of the 1983 season and caught seven net-scarred fish, which he feels is a significant number. He thinks a lot could be done in the squid fisheries by changing the net size and the way the net is hung.

Harold Thompson, Sitka Sound Seafoods. Mr. Thompson requested the Council and Board consider a chinook opening date of June 5 because of the problems anticipated by processors if both halibut and salmon are being harvested at the same time.

<u>Walt Pasternak</u>, Juneau. Spoke in favor of a June 5 opening date for troll salmon for the 1984 season only. He is also in favor of maintaining the status quo for harvest goals, but feels the hatchery fish should be added to the total.

Dave Pitcher, troller, Ketchikan. Each year, the Canadians fish more and more and increase their historical catch record for the purpose of treaty negotiations. It is important to break this pattern. Urged the Council to forget about treaty proposals and protect the chinook stocks in Alaskan waters. Any actions to protect other stocks should be dependent on accomplished equal Canadian actions. Alaskan salmon management since Statehood has been very successful and he has a great deal of confidence in the Board of Fisheries. During a meeting of trollers in Ketchikan recently, opening of the troll season was discussed. A majority in that area felt that they would like to see the season open on May 15; however, they had two concerns. One was that a later date, if carried on over several years, would somehow end up being the traditional opening date for the troll season. The other was that earlier in the season they would be catching a different mix of stocks than those they would catch later in the season and felt it would be more healthy to spread the effort over a number of different stocks.

Tony Guggenbickler, Wrangell, troller, member of ATA. Feels that chinook mortality during the coho-only season has been satisfactorily minimized. A limited coho-only fishery is necessary to the trollers. Supports a June 5 opening date for chinook for 1984.

Lance Ingle, Wrangell, troller, member of ATA. Thinks the Alaska troll season should begin on May 15 but realizes the conflict with the halibut opening, so for the 1984 season only, he would support an opening no later than June 5. He supports the status quo for the 1984 troll catch and asked that the FCZ not be closed.

Dave Peters, Port Angeles, Wa., ATA. Pointed out that the government is blaming the declining chinook stock on its own citizens while allowing foreign trawl and high sea gillnet fishery in areas of chinook abundance. Disagrees with a treaty with penalizes Alaskans for their conservation efforts and rewards Canadians for overfishing. Supports the status quo for 1984 harvest levels and an opening date no later than June 5.

John Wilcox, Juneau Hand Troll Assn. Feels that any treaty which allows Canadians to fish while Alaskans cannot is flawed. Until a treaty is signed, harvest should be regulated by availability, not politics. The coho 10-day emergency closure was supposed to be for one year only, not an annual event. During recent years there have been above-average escapements and still have had the closure imposed.

Charles E. Wilber, troller, Sitka. Would like to have a May 15 opening, but because of the conflict with the halibut season in 1984, he would support an opening no later than June 5. Also supports the status quo for 1984 harvest levels, increased by aquaculture fish.

The reductions have proven successful in improving escapements in 8 of the 9 Alaska index systems from 1981-83. Similar improvements have not happened in Canada or Washington. Future requests for reductions cannot be viewed as conservation efforts, but efforts in allocation. Urged Board to hold the line; Alaska has already made its contribution to conservation with positive results.
