DECEMBER 2024 AND FEB 2025 MEETINGS

- Preliminary Dec and Feb 2025 schedules posted under Council's E Staff Tasking agenda – subject to change
- Dec: AP scheduled for Tuesday through Fri
 - Groundfish and NSRKC harvest specifications & charter halibut measures
 - Other actions:
 - Crab C shares discussion paper
 - Program Reviews: IFQ, Amendment 80
 - BSFEP Climate Change Taskforce final report
- Feb Special Meeting: AP scheduled for Tues through Fri
 - 2 issues Chum salmon bycatch, Cook Inlet salmon specs



OPTIMIZING SSC AGENDA TIME

- SSC has ~15 days of agenda time per year; can't keep adding meetings
- Increasingly, insufficient agenda time for the SSC to take up all the issues it would normally review
 - Trend is unlikely to change, esp as proposed legislation increases SSC tasks
- SSC/Council leadership have been working on other solutions
- But need to set expectation that SSC will not be able to review everything
 - Include all when possible
- Intent is to provide transparency about how those decisions are made
 - Opportunity for feedback



TYPES OF SSC AGENDA ITEMS (1/2)

- all harvest specifications and related documents (SAFE reports, Plan Team reports, ESRs, Econ SAFE and ACEPO, spatial management policy analyses) – HIGHEST PRIORITY
- b) initial review management analyses (peer review to ensure that the best scientific information is available for the Council to make its policy decisions) CASE BY CASE
- LAPP reviews and other retrospective reports of Council actions ONLY
 WHEN debuting LAPP reviews for new programs or using a new format
- d) ecosystem and climate reports (FEP team and taskforce reports and products, climate/IRA work) – PRIORITY, AS POSSIBLE

TYPES OF SSC AGENDA ITEMS (2/2)

- e) research priorities and other data collection-related items (e.g., survey changes, ADP, EDR changes, SSPT reports) **PRIORITY**
- f) Exempted Fishing Permit (EFP) applications and sometimes final reports CASE BY CASE
- g) national or regional guidance with a scientific component that affects Council management (e.g. National Standard guidelines, Regional Climate Action Plans) PRIORITY/ CASE BY CASE
- h) scientific presentations or workshops that are informational but important learning for SSC members to provide better advice to the Council in future (e.g., annual SSC workshop; marine mammal status updates) CASE BY CASE
 - anything else that the Council requests the SSC to review (e.g., crab conservation plan). **HIGH PRIORITY**

- Council modified management alternatives
- Requested additional analysis
- Next review is scheduled for February 2025

Programmatic Evaluation (II)



- Council received a presentation on engagement planning
- Expressed interest in two-way engagement on the PEIS
- Supported delaying formal scoping until after the next initial review of the chum salmon bycatch DEIS

Current status

- Agency held 2 preliminary engagement sessions in April, May
- Relevant comments at Council climate workshop in June
- Next step tentatively scheduled for April 2025, formal scoping to follow

- Council may provide direction, but no action is required






DIFFERENT TYPES OF OUTREACH AND ENGAGEMENT


STAFF RECOMMENDATION: RAC MEETINGS



- Regional Subsistence Advisory Councils (RACs)
- Prior experience with Amendment 91
 - Council and staff shared alternatives, impact analysis to-date, answered technical questions, and listened to input from RACs and residents
- Does not inherently limit the Council from considering other options and invitations



STAFF RECOMMENDATION: WINTER 2025 RAC MEETINGS








TRADEOFFS OF USING THE RACS AS A FORUM



- Existing relationships
- Familiarity with issue
- Established venues, dates,
 and locations





- Schedule leaves little flexibility
- Not Tribal governments
- Analytical tradeoffs





NEXT STEPS AND POINTS FOR CONSIDERATION

Any outreach and engagement effort must be balanced with staff analytical workloads and funding constraints

- With additional input, staff would contact RAC coordinators about interest and scheduling
- The AP may recommend an approach on how to move forward to the Council
 - Not pursue formal outreach and engagement at this time, unless formally invited
 - Consider the Winter 2025 RAC meetings
 - Some other venue or approach
