

I. High Seas Drift Net Enforcement

No illegal HSDN activity was reported during this period.

II. US/Russian Maritime Boundary Enforcement

Monitoring the US/RS Maritime Boundary (M/B) continued to be the primary enforcement priority for the Coast Guard. Foreign fishing activity continues to be significantly higher than in the past few years.

- Coast Guard C130's flew 43 sorties totaling 309.7 hours
- Coast Guard HEC/MECs patrolled the M/B for 36 days
- Activity for this period peaked on 25 October, when 88 vessels were detected by a Coast Guard C130 flight fishing within 50 nm of the M/B in the RS EEZ





Per agreement reached in September between LtGen Prokhoda and RAdm Barrett, the Coast Guard is now providing the Russian Federal Border Service twice a week with reports of vessel names, locations and activities of Russian and other FF/Vs operating within the 1.5 NM (RS) and 5 NM (Other) buffer zones on the M/B.

The format for reporting M/B activity has been changed in response to comments received from our October report.




Figure 3. 1997-1999 M/B Incursions into U.S. EEZ





Figure 5. 1997-1999 Average Detections by Coast Guard C130 Aircraft 0-50 NM in RS EEZ

Figures 1 and 2 are scatterplots of peak activity days in October and November. Figure 3 shows the number of incursions made by foreign fishing vessels detected by C-130s. Figures 4 and 5 show the maximum and average number of detections observed within 0-50 nm. Please see Appendix A for a summary of all M/B cases for the period 01 Oct - 30 Nov, 1999.

Figure 4. 1997-1999 Max Detections by Coast Guard C130 Aircraft 0-50 NM in RS EEZ

III. Donut Hole

No foreign fishing vessel activity was detected in the area during the reporting period. The Fisheries Agency of Japan provided notification that the Research Vessel Kaiyo Maru No. 3 was scheduled to conduct research within the Donut Hole from 23 Nov - 3 Dec.

IV. Dixon Entrance Enforcement

No illegal foreign fishing vessel activity was detected in Dixon Entrance during the reporting period. Most fisheries in the vicinity are closed for the year.

V. IFQ At-Sea/Dockside Enforcement

No significant IFQ violations were detected this period during Coast Guard at-sea and dockside operations. For this reporting period, the Coast Guard conducted the following activity:

VI. Bristol Bay Red King Crab Fishery

During the State Bristol Bay Red King Crab fishery, the Coast Guard conducted both preseason safety training and in season search and rescue standby as part of Operation Northern Safeguard. On October 11, the Coast Guard offered seminars covering immersion suits, vessel stability and damage control training in Dutch Harbor. Five people attended the immersion suit training and 3 people attended the stability/damage control training. Coast Guard personnel also jointly boarded 75 vessels with ADF&G officers performing tank inspections. During these boardings, Coast Guard personnel would determine the level of stability training possessed by the master, determine if a stability letter/book was available, and determine if the vessel was overloaded as compared to the limitations defined in the vessel's stability letter/book. Of the 75 vessels boarded, 2 were found to be overloaded. Two Captain of the Port orders restricting the movement of the vessels were issued by MSD Unalaska. Both vessels corrected the discrepancies and were able to sail prior to the fishery.

In addition to activities ashore, the Coast Guard maintained a continuous High Endurance Cutter presence, equipped with an HH65 helicopter, in Bristol Bay to provide search and rescue presence. Also, an HH60 helicopter was a staged in Cold Bay to respond to search and rescue cases. During the fishery there were no major search and rescue cases. The following details apply:

- 2 Coast Guard cutters patrolled for a total of 16 days
- C130's flew 7 sorties for 32.3 hours
- HH60/HH65 helicopters flew 27 sorties for 36.1 hours

For the upcoming Bering Sea Opilio Crab fishery, the Coast Guard will forward deploy an HH60 helicopter to St Paul Island and assign a helicopter equipped high endurance cutter to maintain a SAR presence. In addition, Coast Guard Marine Safety personnel will be in Dutch Harbor and perhaps additional ports checking stability.




Figure 6. Historical Overview of CFVS Statistics



IX. Miscellaneous Admin

During this reporting period, Coast Guard personnel attended and participated in the North Pacific Anadromous Fisheries Commission Annual Meeting and the Annual Meeting for the Convention for the Management of Pollock Resources in the Central Bering Sea.

Coast Guard personnel also staffed two booths at Fish Expo in Seattle Washington. The Coast Guard provided information on communications, technology, law enforcement and commercial fishing vessel safety. Over 600 people participated in a Coast Guard survey regarding emergency communications throughout Alaska.







1999 HEC/MEC EMPLOYMENT (815 DAYS)









Boarding Statistics




Derby/IFQ Boarding Statistics

ENFORCEMENT REPORT FOR THE PERIOD 10/9/99 THROUGH 11/30/99

National Marine Fisheries Service Alaska Enforcement Division

During the reporting period, NMFS and the Coast Guard opened a total of 87 cases. NMFS initiated 77 of these investigations.

Further action was also taken on 104 pending cases during the reporting period. Eleven investigations were closed as unfounded, four investigations were closed due to lack of evidence, and eight investigations were closed due to lack of Enforcement resources. Eight cases were referred to other Regions or other agencies. Nine cases were handled with written warnings. Twenty-two cases were handled with summary settlement payments totaling \$50,465. Fourteen cases were settled through voluntary abandonment of forfeited proceeds and property valued at \$2,736. Fourteen cases were referred to NOAA General Counsel. General Counsel issued 11 NOVAs for a total of \$155,725 in penalties and settled 3 cases for \$2,875 in penalties.

ALASKA ENFORCEMENT DIVISION LAUNCHES WEBSITE

Attached is an example of the AED website as seen on the Internet. This is a new item for the AED and the Office for Law Enforcement nationally. The website has links to the Alaska Region and to our other enforcement divisions around the United States. In addition, there is information about and photos of our offices around Alaska with contact telephone numbers and other useful materials. VESSEL MONITORING SYSTEM

Recently the Fishing Company of Alaska (FCA) volunteered to install VMS equipment on their Atka Mackerel fleet. Guy Holt, AED VMS contract specialist, is in Seattle at the time of this report, overseeing the installations. We are again using Argos Mar GE units, produced by North American CLS (NACLS), which will send location reports every half hour. We will use NACLS' "ELSA" software to receive and plot the data from the test vessels and will provide the data to the AK. Region for potential integration with "Atlas" observer data on an experimental basis.



NMFS ALASKA REGION INVESTIGATIVE PRIORITIES FISHING YEAR 2000

Listed below are the investigative priorities of the NMFS AED for the Alaska Region. These are published so the various user groups will know where we expect to place the majority of our investigative efforts during the coming year. Particular emphasis will be placed on seeking compliance in these broad categories with primary focus on the subcategories listed.

1. OBSERVER CASE INVESTIGATIONS

- a.) General and/or sexual assaults against observers.
- b) Interference with observers.
- c) Bribery
- d) Pre-sorting of hauls.
- e) Failure to obtain necessary observer coverage.

2. ESA/MMPA

- a) Lethal taking of Stellar Sealions in western range.
- b) Illegal fishing in critical habitat areas (western range).
- c) Lethal taking of Endangered species in Alaskan waters (e.g.; Cook Inlet Belugas, Humpback whales, Fur Seals).

(Remaining ESA/MMPA cases below remaining priorities on this list)

3. Record keeping and Reporting Violations

- a) Closed area fishing violations.
- b) Willful or grossly negligent mis-reporting or failure to report harvesting activities.
- c) Willful or negligent mis-reporting of landing or shipment reports.
- d) Totality of reporting errors over time or in large numbers of errors.

4. IFQ program

- a) Closed area fishing violations.
- b) Illegal landing activities with particular emphasis on R.B. participation
- c) Willful or grossly negligent mis-reporting or failure to report harvesting activities.
- d) Willful or negligent mis-reporting of landing or shipment reports.
- e) Totality of reporting errors over time or in large numbers of errors.

We will watch for <u>significant</u> non-compliers in all of these areas and have a balanced effort in returning them to compliance. This means a balance of effort in all four categories. 10 cases in one category and only one in the other may be indicative of an imbalanced approach.

In general, if a potential case is not from one of the categories above, it likely does not raise to the level of where we will pursue it. This is not etched in stone as sometimes a very serious issue may arise from some other regulatory area and we will have to evaluate the case on it's merits and weigh it against how impacted we are with work load from the above priorities at the time the issue is discovered. It is possible that a case, not on the priority list, may be so serious that we have to suspend or drop a higher priority case to address the newly identified problem.

YEAR END AED STATISTICS

Attached is a partial review of 1999 AED annual statistics. The information is partial in two respects:

- 1. The data is a summation of activities through November 30, 1999 leaving 30 days in the calender year for further case investigation/resolution.
- 2. The information does <u>not</u> include IFQ effort which is reported separately in an IFQ annual report. I will integrate these reports in the future so that all data can be reviewed in one document.

In general, we completed 50 boardings in the non IFQ/CDQ fisheries. These boardings are listed below in the tables immediately following this section of the enforcement report. The tables address the following:

- Table 1 the number and type of boardings/inspections conducted in 1999.
- Table 2 a summary list of locations where boardings/inspections occurred in 1999.
