> NATIONAL MARINE FISHERIES SERVICE ENFORCEMENT REPORT FOR THE PERIOD SEPTEMBER 19, 1994 THROUGH DECEMBER 1, 1994

During the reporting period NMFS and the Coast Guard opened a total of 197 investigations. NMFS initiated 182 investigations.

Further actions were also taken on 160 pending cases during the reporting period. Seven investigations were closed as unfounded. One investigation was closed due to lack of enforcement resources. Three cases were suspended and six cases were closed due to lack of evidence. Ten cases were handled with written warnings and five cases were settled with summary settlement penalties totalling \$6,475. Eighty-seven cases were settled through voluntary abandonment with forfeited proceeds and property valued at \$97,966. Twenty-one cases were referred to NOAA General Counsel. General Counsel issued 14 Notices of Violation assessing a total of \$295,678 in penalties. An additional 6 Notices of Violation were settled by General Counsel with penalties totalling \$10,000.

IFO PROGRAM PREPARATIONS

The 19 Fishery Enforcement Officers will complete initial basic training on December 22. Agency specific follow-on basic will begin on January 6 and Sontinue through February 17. All training has gone according to plans and the officers have done outstanding work when compared to their other federal counterparts. Agency specific IFQ training will be incorporated in this next session with industry participation and interaction.

IFO FRAUD INVESTIGATIONS NEAR COMPLETION

The IFQ Fraud unit is in the process of investigating several application fraud cases and is nearing completion on some of those cases. Criminal and civil charges are anticipated in these cases with completion anticipated in early 1995.

NMFS AED PARTICIPATES IN FISH EXPO

NMFS IFQ fraud investigation coordinator, Jeff Passer, participated in the recent Fish Expo in Seattle. Jeff worked in both the NMFS IFQ booth and the NWED Law Enforcement booth. In both cases Jeff answered questions regarding IFQ regulations and our enforcement plan for the 1995 season. We feel working closely with industry will help prevent accidental mistakes under the regulations and help foster a closer working relationship between NMFS enforcement and the public. We anticipate a series of public meetings between now and the beginning of the IFQ fishing season in coastal ports in both Alaska and Washington state.

U. S. COAST GUARD ENFORCEMENT REPORT 9/1/94 - 11/30/94

1. ENFORCEMENT/SAFETY SUMMARY.

A. INTERNATIONAL FISHERIES. The International front has been quiet for three months. Russian (RS) trawl activity continued in the Russian zone along the US/RS Convention Line into late November this year. There have been no further encroachments into U.S. waters since the July incidents which were noted in our previous report to the Council. The Coast Guard has monitored activity in the area and provided both cutter and aircraft patrols the past three months. The donut hole moratorium continues to be observed by all parties; the only related activity observed was the sighting of the Japanese scientific research vessel KIYOSHI MARU #2 in the area in November. Following the October meeting of the North Pacific Anadromous Fisheries Commission (NPAFC), the Coast Guard is working with NMFS to develop the resource effort required for High Seas Driftnet enforcement in 1995.

B. DOMESTIC FISHERIES.

- 1. Following the September halibut opener and Pollock-B, activity was relatively light during end of year fisheries. Compliance with the emergency rule establishing a Salmon Savings No-Trawl Area in the East Bering was high. As has been the case in recent years, a Coast Guard high endurance cutter with a deployed helicopter was assigned in the Bering Sea during the bairdi crab fishery, primarily as a Search and Rescue (SAR) platform.
- 2. For 1995 the Coast Guard plans high resource efforts during the major early season groundfisheries in both the Bering Sea and Gulf of Alaska. As was the case last year we will also be working closely with the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) to identify undocumented aliens working in the fishing industry. The Food and Drug Administration has also inquired about riding an Alaska Patrol (ALPAT) cutter early this year to conduct similar surveys to what they did in the Washington, Oregon, California (WOC) fishery last year.

- 3. The Coast Guard continues to work with NMFS Enforcement in developing our cutter and aircraft resource requirements for the 1995 start of the IFQ Halibut/Sablefish Fishery.
- C. FISHERIES TRAINING TEAM. LT Mike Cerne, the Commanding Officer of the North Pacific Regional Fisheries Training Center in Kodiak, is in attendance at this council meeting. He formerly served as Operations Officer in CGC YOCONA in Kodiak. In October instructors from the training team and representatives from selected CG units and NMFS attended a two week training session on North Pacific fisheries. Representatives from major associations were a key element in the training to provide the class an industry perspective of regional commercial fisheries. In 1995 team members will be used to train our cutter and air station crews in both classrooms and out on the grounds to improve the professionalism of Coast Guard patrols and boardings.
- D. FISHING VESSEL SAFETY. Seventeenth District fishing vessel safety and law enforcement staff attended both the October Pacific Fishing Trade Show and the December Fish Expo in Seattle. We started manning Coast Guard booths with a "tag team" of fishing vessel safety and law enforcement reps at COMFISH in Kodiak last year, and it is our intention to continue this approach so we may provide "one-stop shopping" for fishing industry customers.

- b. 2 Medium Endurance cutters (MEC) patrolled for 33 days.

- e. C-130 aircraft conducted <u>89</u> long-range surveillance; flights for <u>608.6</u> hours.
- f. HU-25 aircraft conducted <u>5</u> surveillance flights for <u>15.8</u> hours.
- g. H60/H65 aircraft conducted $\underline{55}$ surveillance flights for $\underline{197.9}$ hours.
