I. IUU Fishing & High Seas Drift Net (HSDN) Enforcement

The Coast Guard is in the planning and preparation stages for Operation North Pacific Guard 2024, the service's marquis counter-IUU effort.

II. U.S./Russian Maritime Boundary Line (MBL) Enforcement

Over the period of this report, there were two detections of FF/V's suspected to be fishing across the MBL in the U.S. EEZ. Due to the increased FF/V activity near the MBL, Coast Guard District 17 has increased surface and air patrols along the MBL to deter and detect incursions. Coast Guard District 17 transmitted case packages to the Russian Border Guard for the suspected incursions.

III. U.S./Canadian EEZ Boundary (Dixon Entrance) Enforcement

There was light fishing activity during the reporting period along the U.S.-Canadian EEZ boundary in the vicinity of Dixon Entrance. All Canadian fishing vessels sighted were south of the A-B line and no incursions into U.S. waters were detected.

IV. Marine Protected Resources and Critical Habitat Enforcement

The Coast Guard monitors 151 critical habitat areas around Alaska each month as part of routine cutter and aircraft patrol activity. Aircraft completed 31hrs of patrols during the report period in support of Living Marine and Marine Protected Resources, with no incursions detected.

V. Commercial Fishing Vessel Boarding Statistics

There were 28 boardings conducted on commercial fishing vessels by the U.S. Coast Guard during the reporting period. These boardings resulted in a total of nine fisheries violations onboard eight vessels. Appendices B and C list the boardings with violations that occurred during the reporting period.

VI. Halibut and Sablefish Enforcement

Coast Guard patrols completed boardings on seven commercial and two recreational vessels targeting halibut and sablefish during the reporting period. There were no charter halibut vessels boarded. No fisheries violations were detected on any boarding.

VII. Forward Operating Locations (FOL)

FOL Cold Bay equipped with an MH-60 aircraft for Arctic and Bering Sea SAR coverage was stood up on November 4th.

VIII. Crab Fisheries

Coast Guard prevention units conducted pre-season Stability Compliance Checks in Dutch Harbor and by phone for 25 of 29 participating crab vessels. Inspectors found that vessels were largely in compliance with safety carriage requirements and their stability instructions.

IX. Commercial Fishing Vessel Safety/Search and Rescue Cases

There were three search and rescue (SAR) cases involving fishing vessels in U.S. waters, resulting in seven lives saved. Appendix A provides a comprehensive list of SAR cases involving fishing vessels over the reporting period.

During the reporting period, 21 safety violations were detected on nine commercial fishing vessels, none resulted in voyage terminations. A comprehensive list of safety violations can be found in Appendix B.




Figure 1. Historical Overview of CFVS/SAR Statistics




Figure 2. Annual HC-130 Hours





Figure 3. Annual Major Cutter Days



Figure 5. Annual Patrol Boat Hours to date








Figure 6. October - November Major Cutter Days
