I. High Seas Drift Net (HSDN) Enforcement

On 16 May USCGC MELLON began a patrol of the high seas, concentrating enforcement efforts in the North Pacific Anadromous Fish Convention (NPAFC) Area. A Coast Guard HC-130 is currently staged out of Misawa Air Base in Japan and has flown a total of 27 hours of HSDN aerial patrols. No HSDN or IUU vessels have been detected by these flights. A Canadian CP-140 and HC-130 aircraft will follow with two additional Japan deployments.

Two members of the District 17 Enforcement Branch participated in the NPAFC annual meeting held in Busan, South Korea from 16-20 May to discuss coordination of multilateral enforcement efforts during the 2016 HSDN patrol season. Five countries have committed surface and air assets to combat IUU fishing in 2016. Russia will provide surface and air assets from Kamchatka and Sakhalin Districts. Both China and Korea have scheduled to deploy patrol vessels in the North Pacific, and Japan has committed to approximately 200 hours of patrol flights.

II. U.S./Russian Maritime Boundary Line (MBL) Enforcement

Activity along the MBL was light at the beginning of the reporting period and has significantly increased since the Russian pollock fishery opened on 15 May. There has been an average of fifteen vessels operating within 20 miles of the MBL in May 2016. One USCG C-130 and one cutter patrolled the MBL with 19 FFV's sighted in Russian waters and no MBL incursions detected.

III. Halibut and Sablefish Enforcement

Following the IFQ season opening, Coast Guard patrols completed 29 boardings of commercial fishing vessels targeting halibut and sablefish. Of these, there were 26 boardings of IFQ halibut vessels, detecting one safety violation. There were three boardings of IFQ sablefish vessels, detecting no fisheries or safety violations. One fisheries violation was detected onboard a jig vessel targeting Pacific cod that had retained a halibut with no IFQ or subsistence permit. There were 21 boardings on recreational vessels targeting halibut, of which seven vessels received 15 safety violations. There were two boardings on charter vessels targeting halibut, detecting no fisheries or safety violations.

IV. Crab Fisheries


The Coast Guard continued commercial vessel safety enforcement activities on the Bering Sea crab fisheries, with CGC MUNRO and CGC MORGENTHAU conducting five boardings on vessels targeting crab. There was one administrative violation detected for not having an original Certificate of Documentation onboard.

V. Commercial Fishing Vessel Boarding Statistics

There were 87 domestic fisheries and fishing vessel safety boardings conducted by the U.S. Coast Guard during the reporting period. These boardings resulted in a total of 23 safety violations onboard twelve vessels and one federal fisheries violation onboard one vessel. Figures

1 and 2 show the historic trends for boardings and violations. Appendices B and C list the boardings which occurred during the reporting period.


Figure 1. Fisheries Boardings By Year



VI. Commercial Fishing Vessel Safety/Search and Rescue Cases

During the reporting period, 23 safety violations were detected on twelve vessels. There were two voyage terminations during the reporting period for safety violations composing especially hazardous conditions; one vessel had no fire extinguishers or visual distress signals, and another vessel had no immersion suits. A comprehensive list of violations can be found in Appendix C.

There were seven SAR cases involving fishing vessels in U.S. waters, resulting in three lives saved, no lives lost, and one vessel sinking. Appendix A provides a comprehensive list of search and rescue cases involving fishing vessels over the reporting period.

Figure 4. Annual HC-130 Hours





Figure 5. Annual Major Cutter Days

Figure 6. Apr-May HC-130 Hours





Figure 7. Apr-May Major Cutter Days
