Dear Sarah,

I am writing to express interest in participating in the Social Science Planning Team. Over the past two years I have participated as a member of the Bering Sea Fishery Ecosystem Plan (FEP) team providing expertise on subsistence issues and incorporating local and traditional knowledge into ecosystem planning for this region. In addition, I am assisting on the outreach plan for the FEP. I compiled the data and wrote the section on subsistence, and assisted council staff in writing the sections on local and traditional knowledge. My own dissertation work involved working in coastal communities in several areas of Alaska to examine societal and economic factors influencing the wellbeing and livelihoods of fishing communities.

Currently I am a coastal community resilience specialist for Alaska Sea Grant in the College of Fisheries and Ocean Sciences and the Alaska Center for Climate Assessment and Policy at the International Arctic Research Center, University of Alaska Fairbanks. I work in coastal communities throughout Alaska from the Bering Sea to Southeast to facilitate workshops and other activities related to coastal resilience that includes addressing monitoring, mitigation, and adaptation activities to local stressors from climatic and ocean changes. Prior to my faculty position at UAF, I spent 15 years at the Alaska Department of Fish and Game conducting social-science research and managing the subsistence program in Southern Alaska. I've worked extensively in rural communities from the Arctic to Southeast Alaska and published 37 technical publications and several journal articles and book chapters on subsistence economies in Alaska including recently leading a chapter on subsistence economies for the Arctic Council Sustainable Development Working Group sponsored publication, Economies of the North. As the regional manager at ADF&G I attended 5-7 regulatory meetings a year to present data for the Board of Fisheries and Game to make informed decisions. Much of this involved understanding Board needs for information, developing and seeking funding for research projects to collect both quantitative and qualitative data, and then preparing the data for Board review at the next meeting cycle to enable informed decisions.

Recently I have been working with federal agencies, mainly the USFWS to, to conduct workshops in coastal communities throughout Alaska to understand science questions and needs from a community perspective. As part of this I attended NPFMC meetings with Federal colleagues to share activities occurring in coastal communities with the Council. Having attended meetings and being part of the Bering Sea FEP team I am very interested in the work of the Social Science Planning Team. Hopefully my experience, past experience, and current work would be useful for the Council, especially in bringing local perspectives to the decision-making process.
