

NPFC Background

- Convention area covers high seas in the North Pacific
- Management of fisheries resources other than those covered by other regional fisheries management organizations (RFMOs)





NPFC Background

- Treaty-based RFMO with authority to adopt legally binding measures
- Objective is sustainable management of fisheries resources and protection of related marine ecosystems
- Entered into force 2015, USA became party in 2017
- Members meet regularly (usually annually) in a Commission meeting to make decisions
- Subsidiary work occurs through Technical and Compliance Committee, Scientific Committee, and Finance and Administration Committee
- Nine members: Canada, China, EU, Japan, Republic of Korea, Russian Federation, Taiwan (participates as Chinese Taipei), USA, and Vanuatu
- One cooperating non-contracting party: Panama



NPFC Priorities

- Management of pelagic species: Pacific saury, chub mackerel, spotted mackerel, Japanese sardine, neon flying squid, and Japanese flying squid
- Bottom fisheries (North Pacific armorhead and splendid alfonsino) and prevention of significant adverse impacts on deep-sea vulnerable marine ecosystems
- Development of monitoring, control, and surveillance tools and robust compliance processes to combat IUU fishing
- Improved stock assessments and scientific advice



Recent Challenges (2019-2022)

- NPFC meetings and operations (including high seas boardings and inspection) significantly affected by COVID-19
- Russian chair of the organization further affected ability to meet following Russia's invasion of Ukraine
- Secretariat turnover and obstacles to remotely hiring a new Executive Secretariat
- Vacancies in officers (subsidiary chair/vice chair positions)
- No in-person meetings between July 2019 and March 2023
- Organizational atrophy due to inability to make progress for several years in science, management, or compliance and few members investing in improving NPFC process, transparency, and governance

More Recent Developments (2022-2023)

- Significant U.S. and NPFC accomplishments over the past year to address concerns about the direction of the organization
- New Executive Secretary from Canada selected and onboarded in late 2022 through virtual meetings, despite roadblocks from Russia
- Changes to U.S. delegation leadership and engagement, as well as increased presence from among from U.S. delegation in subsidiary body leadership roles: Alisha Falberg (TCC Chair) and Dan Hull (FAC Chair)
- In-person annual meeting in Sapporo, Japan in March 2023 delivered on many longstanding priorities

March 2023 Annual Meeting Highlights

USA achieved its major priorities in the negotiations

• Adopted measure to enhance monitoring and

management of transshipment

 Secured significant improvements in rules related to transparency of organization

 Resolved COVID-related concerns that had affected ability to conduct HSBI on Chinese vessels

 Adopted U.S. proposal on consideration of climate change in the work of the Commission

• Adopted measure to help rebuild overfished Pacific

saury

 Worked closely with Canada to adopt new measures on sharks and marine pollution

 Replaced Russian chair with highly qualified chair from Japan and vice-chair from Korea



U.S. Interests and Priorities

- Improve NPFC MCS tools (e.g., HSBI, observers, VMS), compliance, and enforcement in the North Pacific to combat IUU fishing and support broader maritime security interests
- Contribute to growth in NPFC scientific capacities to support science-based management
- Consider opportunities to strengthen management of bottom fisheries and protect VMEs, including on Emperor Seamounts and for overlapping fisheries interests in U.S. EEZ
- Further improve transparency and effective governance of NPFC
