



Upper Cook Inlet Coho Salmon

In 2015 the commercial harvest of coho was 123,000 fish. This indicates a total coho return to Cook Inlet of 1.2 million, leaving over one million coho for sport harvest, escapement and a large harvestable surplus.




Upper Cook Inlet Pink Salmon

Pink salmon returns to Cook Inlet are largely unmonitored. Estimates for even year returns range from several million to over 20 million. Clearly there is a large harvestable surplus.




Upper Cook Inlet Chum Salmon

Chum salmon returns to Cook Inlet are largely unmonitored. Recent catches compared to historical data indicate a large harvestable surplus of chums.
