When I arrived here this week, I considered the fact that we were going to make some kind of decision today relative to IFQS (indiscernible) to one part and disturb the other. But I realized another thing, that it didn't matter what the obstacles were that are faced, we did have to come forward with solution because we're stuck. (indiscernible) referred to that recently in his remarks.

I look at this motion as a solution. Granted, some of the (indiscernible) overlooking that are not well fleshed out. Some of these are conception. But I see in this motion the possibility of reestablishing forward progress. And forward progress with some equality for both sides.

I'm very interested in the proposal for the transferable seat program. I've heard of the charter industry, both those folks that have charter IFQ qualify and those folks that don't repeatedly saying that they're not harvesting fish. They're providing transportation. It's the angler, the client that harvest the fish. The charter industry is not out there to catch the fish, sell the fish. I would very much like to see an analysis of a directed access program that addresses the charter industry, and that's to provide service as opposed to bring home the flesh of the fish.

If we don't go forward with this motion, we are going to deny ourselves an opportunity to examine things that weren't available to us in 2000. And I think we should take advantage of that opportunity. And there I'd like to express my appreciation to Alaska for doing the (indiscernible) work in pulling this together.
