I. IUU Fishing & High Seas Drift Net (HSDN) Enforcement

There were no HSDN enforcement activities conducted during the reporting period.

II. U.S./Russian Maritime Boundary Line (MBL) Enforcement

There was medium to low activity along the MBL through October and November. Overall there was an average of 1-2 vessels per day detected within 20 miles of the MBL. There have been no detected incursions by FFVs into the U.S. EEZ this season.

III. U.S./Canadian EEZ Boundary (Dixon Entrance) Enforcement

There was light fishing activity during the reporting period along the U.S.-Canadian EEZ boundary in the vicinity of Dixon Entrance. All Canadian fishing vessels sighted were south of the A-B line and no incursions into U.S. waters were detected.


IV. Marine Protected Resources and Critical Habitat Enforcement

The Coast Guard monitors more than 151 critical habitat areas around Alaska each month as part of routine cutter and aircraft patrol activity. Since September 20th the Coast Guard conducted 3 flights out of Kodiak and Nome in support of Marine Protected Resources and NOAA's Protected Resources Division. There were no violations detected on these flights, but assistance was provided in support of several ongoing open investigations by NOAA OLE.

V. Commercial Fishing Vessel Boarding Statistics

There were 44 federal fisheries boardings conducted by the U.S. Coast Guard during the reporting period. These boardings resulted in a total of 6 safety violations onboard 6 vessels. Figures 1 and 2 show the historic trends for boardings and violations. Appendices B and C list the boardings that occurred during the reporting period.



VI. Halibut and Sablefish Enforcement

Coast Guard patrols completed 43 boardings on commercial, charter, and recreational vessels targeting halibut and sablefish during the reporting period. There were 39 boardings of IFQ halibut or Sablefish vessels, detecting 6 safety violations. There were 4 boardings on recreational vessels targeting halibut with no violations.

VII. Forward Operating Locations

Air Station Kodiak also deployed two MH-60s to Kotzebue through November 1st to support Search and Rescue coverage, community engagement, and Protected Living Marine Resources activities.

Air Station Kodiak deployed an MH-60 to Cold Bay for the Bering Sea crab season opening. The MH-60 remained in Cold Bay through 6 November.

VIII. Crab Fisheries

The CGC ALEX HALEY conducted 3 boardings on fishing vessels targeting crab. Representatives from District 17's Commercial Fishing Vessel Safety division travelled to Dutch Harbor, AK prior to the crab opener to conduct courtesy safety exams and outreach.

The MH-60 is scheduled to return to Cold Bay on 15 January 2020 as activity increases in the Bering Sea and Aleutian Island crab and trawl fisheries.

IX. Continuing Operations during COVID-19

In the early onset of the Coronavirus epidemic, there was a significant decrease in boarding activity due to early risk assessments in conjunction with medical and industry measures. Based on efforts in industry, abiding by the Alaska State Health Mandates, and the Coast Guard's own safety and health guidance and policy, the Coast Guard has resumed all enforcement efforts and patrols with the exception of circumstances that arise on a case by case basis. The Coast Guard has taken very measured precautions to ensure the safety of its members and the public while carrying out its mission sets. The Coast Guard is committed to ensuring the health and safety of the public and are closely monitoring local COVID-19 trends. Our crews are following all the latest CDC safety guidance as we continue to perform our statutory missions in Alaska. Boarding safety precautions include determining COVID-19 exposure risks by asking a series of preboarding questions and ensuring boarding team personnel are wearing full personal protection equipment including masks and gloves. We are committed to safely conducting critical operations while maintaining precautions to prevent the spread of COVID-19.



Swift and decisive measures taken by the fishing industry and the State of Alaska have all assisted with Coast Guard actions to maintain operational readiness.

X. Commercial Fishing Vessel Safety/Search and Rescue Cases

During the reporting period, 6 safety violations were detected on 6 vessels. A comprehensive list of violations can be found in Appendix C.

There were 6 search and rescue (SAR) cases involving fishing vessels in U.S. waters, resulting in 2 lives saved and 1 vessels lost during the reporting period. Appendix A provides a comprehensive list of SAR cases involving fishing vessels over the reporting period.


Figure 3. Historical Overview of CFVS Statistics



Safety Statistics by Year


XI. Coast Guard Resource Summary





Figure 6. Annual H60/65 Hours

Figure 7. Annual Patrol Boat Hours





Figure 9. Oct – Nov Patrol Boat Hours
