Resolution 2014-28

A RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE DEVELOPMENT OF A BERING SEA FISHERIES ECOSYSTEM PLAN BY THE NORTH PACIFIC FISHERY MANAGEMENT COUNCIL

- **WHEREAS:** The Bristol Bay Native Association, Inc. (BBNA) is an Alaska Native non-profit corporation and tribal consortium serving the 31 federally recognized tribes in the Bristol Bay Region; and
- WHEREAS: The North Pacific Fishery Management Council is considering developing a Bering Sea Fishery Ecosystem Plan; and
- WHEREAS: BBNA tribal members are a part of the Bering Sea ecosystem and possess valuable traditional knowledge about the Bering Sea and southwest Alaska region; and
- WHEREAS: Commercial fishing, particularly of salmon, but also cod, crab, herring, pollock, halibut, groundfish and other species has been the economic engine of southwest Alaska; and
- WHEREAS: Marine resources are a critical component of the subsistence way of life for indigenous peoples in the Bering Sea region, including cultural, spiritual, nutritional, and economic sustenance and should be accounted for in fisheries management; and
- WHEREAS: Commercial fishermen and subsistence fishermen and hunters must be accounted for as part of the rich Bering Sea ecosystem; and
- **WHEREAS:** The impacts of climate change have introduced new uncertainties that justify a new way of considering feedback and rapid changes in the environment in management actions;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Full Board of Directors of BBNA urges the North Pacific Fishery Management Council (Council) to develop and adopt a Bering Sea Fisheries Ecosystem Plan which establishes clear statements about how the Council will weigh competing ecosystem values; provides regular points in management processes to integrate information from the region's traditional knowledge holders; ensures the protection of species that are important to subsistence fishing and hunting species; and effectively manages the Bering Sea ecosystem's health for the benefit of all users.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that BBNA urges that the process used by the Council in developing a Bering Sea Fishery Ecosystem Plan fully incorporate traditional knowledge and include direct participation by tribal representatives and subsistence and commercial fishermen from the Alaska Native communities of the Bering Sea region.
